"Though the WRA will provide 31 cents per day per person in cash allowances, the ration value of the food will remain 45 cents. The change merely means that we will be able to purchase from the Quartermas-

CHECKS NEED SIGNATURES

"Starting Monday, all bearers of postal money orders must have identification signatures of their block managers on the checks," stated C. V. Updegraff, who is temperarily acting as postal officer.

A recent request by the postal inspector for the district included that money orders be cashed only upon positive identification. To facilitate such identification, postmaster C. R. Bricker and Undegraff are compiling a file of block managers' signatures for the post office.

The new system calls for the receiver of checks to have his block manager sign the checks which will then be verified with the filed names and, if acceptable, cashed.

DEFENSE

The War Training program, now in progress in the public schools of Dos Moines, Iowa, invites nisei boys through C. J. Schollenberger, representative of the schools.

Since the program is subsidized by the federal government, there is no charge to anyone who wishes to attend the school. It is operated on a 24-hour basis and the individual may arrange to attend classes during his free time. The courses usually require an 8-hour day and take from 6 to 10 weeks.

received, jobs will be provided to enable students to provide their subsistence while attending school.

Suitable housing may be obtained within a radius of 10 blocks of the school.

No guarantee of employment is made, as no federal agency is allowed to make this type of guarantee, but it is felt that students can be placed immediately after completion of training.

Inchine operator training: Learn to operate 1 or 2 machines commonly found in machine shop.

Acotylono wolding: Thaining on light or heavy rotal for wolding in war industry. Light wolders omployed locally; heavy welders, Atlantic and Pacific coasts.

Are wolding: Welding light and heavy metals. Light are welders hired locally, heavy are welders on Atlantic, Pacific, gulf coast in ship building.

EDITORIAL TOTALITARIAN BELIEFS

The recent visit of the newspaper and radio men into the Center to allow them the opportunity of seeing relocation life as it actually exists has resulted in the publication of many articles pertaining to the Rohwer and Jerome projects.

Rohwer and Jerome projects.

The uncensored news reports obtained by the unescorted press men indicate that the visitors were able to get factual and unprejudiced views of the conditions and effects noticeable here. However, on some points, their interpretations have not been entirely correct.

For example, one of the articles states that Buddhism is a "state religion which in its outward exemplification might be compared to the neo-paganism which the Nazis have devised to oust the Christain faiths in Germany -- truly a religious exis."

Buddhism is neither noo-pagan in concept nor an outgrowth of totalitarian beliefs. It is rather a spiritual belief, based upon the teachings of Buddha, who was born in India roughly about 2400 years ago.

As an international religion, Buddhism ranks in the numbers of adherents with Christianity and Mohammedanism. As a philosophy, it is recognized by some of the greatest minds in the world today.

Contrary to the general fallacious belief, the Buddhists do not worship idols or images. However, they do have ornate temples and lavish alters--similar to the Catholic churches.

The sermons and strict adherence to the teachings of Buddha, involving in a narrow sense, the following of the Eight Noble Paths, the liberal Buddhist Ten Commandments, are fundamental to the Buddhist creed.

A majority of the Contor people profess Buddhism as their creed and it is true that most of them are the older residents. Over half of the nisei are Buddhist in background, and the trust that can be placed in a Christian nisei can just as safely be placed on a Buddhist nisei.

Lot us not forget that it was religious intolerance that aided in peopling the North American continent and that the right to profess any religion (as long as it is not contrary to the welfare of the nation) is one of the basic ideals of democracy.

Relocation life is not exactly a wholesome one for anyone but it has been beneficial in various, unusual ways. It has made individuals more conscious of little things.

Women spend hours walking along roads, looking for colored rocks to garnish the tin can flower pots at home. Men spend days carving grotesque pieces out of tree roots and trunks so that they have something to add to the atmosphere of their barrack homes.

City people who have had no farming experience patiently labor over their meager crop of radishes and cucumbers, enjoying the rapture of producing something in a world gone amuck with martial destruction.

Appreciation of simple things in the vast pattern that is life is the key to happiness in a concentrated sphere such as a relocation center.

OH, YES, LIFE
Life has its major and minor ups and downs. The evacuation was a major one and it has been preceded and succeeded by many minor ones. Curfews, contraband control, travel restrictions, breakdown of family unity, separation from friends and productive activities were "catastrophies."

On the credit side of the ledger, however, we have found many who are friends of democracy for equality's sake and not personal betterment. We have begun to understand the principles of cooperation for the benefit of the whole community-we have lessened the value of monetary rewards.

But there are crises that we must meet. Out of the doldrum of camp life, it is possible for a defeatist attitude to WPA or IWW beliefs to cling to our youths. We want the development of a philosophy of determination to carry us through the postwar period.
