M.I.S. TEAM IN CENTER

Recruiting Men Will Interview Interested Savage Applicants

Lieutenant Colonel Gould, recruiting officer for the MIS Language school, Camp Savage, Minn., is scheduled to be here today.

Col. Gould, who is recruiting men from the relocation center, will interview those interested at the reports office in the Public Works building directly north of the Ad buildings.

Accompanying Col. Gould is Sergeant Shinoda.

Enrollment in this school

calls for no difficult prerequisites. Any male who can understand Japanese is qualified, and a profound knowledge of Japanese is not necessarily required.

Pamphlets entitled "An Appeal to All Americans of Japanese Ancestry and Their Parents" have arrived from Camp Savage. These pamphlets, written in English and Japanese, are available to those interested as approximately 25 copies have been distributed to each block office and also the Center library. Outlining the need, nature and objectives of this school, the pamphlet states:

"In time of war, it is of vital importance to know the language, culture and customs of your foe. For this purpose this school was established at Savage shortly after the present war began and has been functioning in high gear since. The main object of the training here is to prepare men to be skilled language specialists. After an intensive course of six months, men are sent out into the field."

The nisei as draftees and as volunteers, "have participated in actual combat in Europe, in Africa, in the Pacific, in India and in Burma, and have shown in action those qualities of loyalty and devotion worthy of the finest traditions the Japanese in America have long upheld."

CHIEF CLAYTON REMINDS EVACUEES OF RADIO BAN

In a statement issued today, Bert Clayton, chief of Internal Security, warned Center residents against failure to turn in short-wave radios. "Failure to do so is a violation of Department of Justice regulations since the ban on the use of such radios was issued by that agency and not by WRA," stated chief Clayton.

Merely disconnecting the short-wave attachment will not be sufficient. After alteration, the radios must be brought to the Internal Security of-

fice for inspection by Edwin E. Marshall, assistant Internal Security officer.

No penalty will be enforced if the regulation is complied with by July 24. After that date all radios in the Center found to have short-wave attachments will be confiscated, and the owners will be subject to severe penalties.

Clayton also cautioned the residents to refrain from taking lumber on the high school field since no more lumber can be allotted to the school auditorium.

COMPENSATORY LEAVES DEFINED IN WRA RULING

Any worker absent for more than three days must secure a doctor's certificate and sick leave is limited to fifteen days for any one illness, according to a recent WRA instruction.

Outside workers, except those paid on a part-time basis, who report for duty and in the judgment of the division head are unable to work because of weather conditions, will be given authorized absence for the

day and will be paid for such time, but workers excused for reasons other than illness or bad weather will be given "leave without pay" and will not be paid for such time.

The instruction also provides that evacuees inducted into the army may receive money payments for overtime worked before their departure from the Center; in all other instances, overtime must be taken in compensatory leave.

ICE HOUSE TO BE READY SOON

Lack of insulation material has delayed the building of the ice house, but the needed supplies are expected in a day or two. James R. Rhyno, Public Works head, stated that ice storage facilities will be ready in a matter of days.

OPPORTUNITIES IN MID-WEST

Covering employment possibilities for evacuees in the states of Kansas, Missouri, Iowa and Nebraska, is Relocation Supervisor Vernon R. Kennedy with offices in Kansas City, Mo.

There are five metropolitan districts--Kansas City, St. Louis, Des Moines, Omaha and Wichita.

Although wages are not as high as in some industrial centers, the cost of living is somewhat lower in this section.

Suitable housing can be secured with some effort, but is readily available only in Des Moines. The attitude towards evacuees is especially good there,

largely because of the excellent support given the relocation program by the Des Moines Register, an unusual newspaper with a circulation of 360,000 in a city of only 170,000.

From five to ten evacuee families can be placed with little difficulty in the smaller cities and towns. There are practically unlimited opportunities for relocation in this area on a family basis.

The normal method of employment on farms is at a monthly wage ranging from \$60 to \$90 a month with a tenant house, use of a cow, garden space and opportunity to raise chickens pro-

vided. If other members of the family are employable, work is generally available.

School bus transportation is available in most of the rural areas.

Relocation supervisor Kennedy is a native of the state of Washington, attended St. Mary's College at Oakland, Calif., served overseas 18 months in the first world war, spent five years in the Orient and the Philippines and had extensive business experience.

For several years he was state deputy labor commissioner in Sacramento, California.

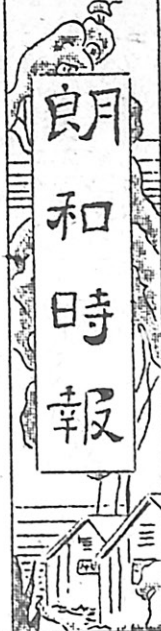
