Col. Gould, who is recruiting men from the relocation center, will interview those interested at the reports office in the Public Works building directly north of the Ad buildings.

Accompanying Col. Gould is Sorgeant Shinoda.

Enrollment in this school

calls for no difficult prerequisites. Any male who can understand Japanese is qualified, and a profound knowledge of Japanese is not necessarily required.

Pamphlets entitled "An Appeal to All Americans of Japanese Ancestry and Their Parents" have arrived from Camp Savage. These pamphlets, written in English and Japanese, are available to those interested as approximately 25 copies have been distributed to each block office and also the Contor library. Outlining the need, nature and objectives of this school, the pamphlet states:

"In time of war, it is of vital importance to know the language, culture and customs of your foe. this purpose this school was established at Savage shortly after the present war began and has been functioning in high gear since. The main object of the training here is to prepare men to be skilled languago specialists. After an intensive course of six months, men are sent out into tho field."

The nisei as draftees and as voluntoors, "havo participated in actual combat in Europo, in Africa, in the Pacific, in India and in Eurma, and have shown in action those qualities of loyalty and do votion worthy of the finest traditions the Japanese in America have long upheld."

HIEF CLAYTON REMINDS **EVACUEES OF RADIO BAN**

In a statement issued today, Bert Clayton, chief Internal Security, warned Center residents against failure to turn in "Failshort-wave radios. ure to do so is a violation of Department of Justice regulations since the ban on the use of such radios was issued by that agency and not by stated chief Clayton.

Merely disconnecting the short-wave attachment will not be sufficient. After alteration, the ramust be brought to the Internal Security office for inspection by Edwin E. Marshall, assistant Internal Security officer:

No ponalty will bo enforced if the regulation is complied with by July 24. After that date all radios in the Center found to have short-wave attachmonts will be confiscated, and the owners will be subject to sovere penalties.
