Tule Lake Selected As Special Segregation Center

With the announcement that Tule Lake Relocation center has been designated as the segregation center, Project Director Johnston makes the following statements concerning this new program.

1. The segregation center is very definitely not a punishment center nor is it a place for trouble-makers. The purpose of the segregation program is to separate those whose loyalty to the United States is in any way questionable from those who look to the United States as their country and their

UNAUTHORIZED LEAVES FROM CENTER OUT

Leaving the Relocation Area without a proper pass is a violation of WRA regulations, and the Project Director warns that all violations of this regulation will be punished.

Arrangements are now being made for swimming and fishing within the Relocation Area and passes will not be required so long as the individual remains on WRA property.

A large drainage ditch runs across the relocation area three miles west of the Center and three miles of this ditch will be available to residents of this Center for fishing or swimming. Maps will be furnished each block manager, showing the Relocation Area and the location of the ditch.

Where repatriation has been asked by the head of the family alone, other members of the family will be interviewed to determine their wishes. All persons who retracted their request prior to July 1, 1943, will be given individual hearings before decision is reached about their segregation.

6. The cases of those who gave unsatisfactory answers to Question 28 will be considered individually and each will be determined upon its own merits. These persons will be called in for interviews so that each may state his case.

7. Procedure will be available in the segregation center for hearing appeals of those cases who feel that they were unjustly segregated.

8. Lumber and other materials necessary for crating household effects will be provided for those leaving.

CANNERY: NEW PLANT TO BE DONE SOON

Just north of the hospital house is the site of the new cannery plant. This site was chosen so that live steam may be piped for heating directly from the hospital boiler.

The cannery will be 50 by 25 feet and 8 feet high. Three steam vats 20 feet long and two feet in both height and width will also be installed.

Under the supervision of Henry Iwana, the floor as well as the actual erection will be completed in about two weeks.

RELOCATION IN AGRICULTURE

Definite trends of re-settlement in agricultural work has become noticeable in recent months, according to a WRA release.

Relocation outlook in the rural areas by mid-July seems to indicate the following conditions.

Approximately half of the 8000 workers who left the relocation centers to engage in agricultural pursuits are on seasonal work leave. Seasonal job offers will decline until September when sugar beet, bean

and potato harvest starts in the Rocky Mt. area.

A great demand for year-around single "hired hands" will be coming in from the corn belt (Nebraska to Ohio) with room and board provided. Wages may seem comparatively low but lower costs will make possible as much savings as elsewhere.

Married couples and families will find that employment possibilities in the "hired man" category, as well as caretakers for

estates or as employees on corporation type farms will be available.

Entrance into new communities as farm operators appears limited by the lateness of the season and community acceptance (competing with the farmers from the start may be undesirable).

Community reactions in small towns may be greater at first but once the evacuee is accepted, staying in smaller communities will be highly satisfactory.

"I hope that the police department will be accorded the same cooperation that it has received in the past under the direction of Al," stated Kawasaki, who was the manager of Block 8.
