Project Director Ray D. Johnston left Rohwer last night for Denver, Colo., to attend a WRA conference. He was accompanied by Dr. J. B. Hunter, Community Services director; Jack Curtis, Project attorney; and Austin Smith, Reports officer.

The four will confer with WRA officials from the ten projects and Washington on workable details for the coming segregation.

Discussions on community management, reports and law are also scheduled to be held before the return of the men on July 31.

HEAT WAVE HITS ALL ARKANSAS

With the hottest days recorded in Little Rock since September 4, 1939, Arkansas residents have been sweltering during the past week with the mercury widely reported as rising well over 100 degrees.

Ole man Sol started his blazing grind Saturday when the temperature hit 104 degrees in Conway, located north of Little Rock, 107 degrees on Sunday and 108 on Monday labeling it the hottest spot in Arkansas.

Monticello, about 25 miles from this Center, which had the reputation of being the hottest town in Arkansas is still near that title with the temperature hitting over 104 degrees.

With no letup of this heat in sight, residents are praying for King Thor and the accompanying rain.

TRUCK ACCIDENT HURTS SECOND BL. 34 WORKER

Block 34 was given a second jolt Tuesday when another of their residents met with an accident.

Hoshio Yokoi was run over across his shoulder and chest when he was struck by a truck.

Only a week ago Tuesday, Bob Arakawa, also of Block 34, cut his fingers on the power saw.

Arakawa and the newer victim of fate, Yokoi, are resting in Ward 8 of the Center hospital.

North of Block 16 was the scene of this new mishap. While shoveling dirt to be taken to the various blocks, Yokoi was glanced

by a truck driven by a fellow worker. He slipped and rolled beneath the truck which ran across his chest and shoulder. Luckily Yokoi received only a broken shoulder bone.

Yokoi is well known among the issei and the sumo fans for his fine showing in that sport. Being one of the best from Stookton, he will be missed by his supporters.

He will be resting for some weeks under the care of Dr. Hajime Kanagawa.

JONES REPLACES MILLER AS CHIEF

OWI RELEASES INFORMATION ON XMAS PACKAGES TO OVERSEA MEN

With many members of Center families serving in the US armed forces Overseas, this bit of postal information about Christmas packages should be helpful.

The Office of War Information announced that during the period, September 15 and October 15, designated as Christmas mail month for soldiers Overseas, Christmas packages may be mailed to American soldiers without presentation of a request from the soldier.

Christmas gift packages must be within the present limitations of weight and size: five pounds in weight, 15 inches in length, and 33 inches in length and girth combined.

All packages must bear the designation "Christmas Gift Parcel," and only one package will be accepted for mailing by the same person for the same address during any one week.

Perishable articles will not be accepted and the mailing of fragile articles is discouraged.

Mon.: Soldier magician from nearby USO performed during recreation period at night. Had cookies and punch a la USO style.

Tues.: Last supper barbecue out on the sea wall; stunt night.

Wed.: On to New Orleans! Bus arrived late, but it was so packed that the girls had to stand all the way except 3 who either sat with or on some of the passengers. Having had no sleep at all (didn't even get into bed), I slept while standing up. --I. K.

Pvt. Sakai, a neighbor of Pvt. Zaima while in Montebello, is remembered for his extra curricular activities while at high school. He was a member of the varsity football team and worked on the school annual. His parents are also in Poston.

All members of the class are volunteers, most of whom formerly lived on the West Coast. They have answered the call to military duty enthusiastically not only to contribute to winning the war but also to aid in establishing beyond all doubt the loyalty of Japanese Americans to the land of their birth.

RELOCATING FAMILY UNITS

Centering the discussion on possible means of relocating family units, the recent Washington conference of relocation supervisors brought out a plan now being worked on by the relocation offices.

The various sub-offices and the Chicago metropolitan area are together trying to find ten typical American towns between 1,000 and 10,000 population which have favorable

public sentiments. By enlisting the cooperation of all elements of the community such as civic organizations, churches and employers, the relocation offices hope to find opportunities for about six families in or near each town.

For the Chicago area, relocation supervisor Elmer Shirrell has been contacting various communities through representatives for such prospects. Actual of-

fers to family groups are expected to be made soon.

Shirrell emphasized that this plan will give five or six families who are related by blood or who were neighbors prior to evacuation an opportunity to relocate near each other. These offers will be primarily for farm laborers since it is not possible to contemplate crop share, leasing or purchasing of farm land this late in the season.

EDITORIAL

PARTING WAYS

The release on the details of segregation and the news of the Dies committee's calling off of nisei investigation were the highlights of press significance for the nisei this week. The sudden death of Dies' abortive inquiry is however an issue that concerns us only in an indirect way, while segregation is a problem that will affect us personally since an estimated 10-20% of the evacuated Japanese will soon be taken out of the relocation centers and will be placed in a special WRA center.

Segregation, so often-metaphored with a barrel of apples, is not an issue that can be passed over lightly and discussed in a matter of fact way, because it is a problem that has come into prominent existence with and since the evacuation. Its basic origin can be traced not only to the inward feelings of the people but to the effects and conditions of the mass migration.

Some of the Tule Lake-bound people are those who came to the United States recently to either establish business contact or to get an American education. Others have come 30 or 40 years ago with the intention of staying permanently in the country, obeying her laws and making a living for their family here. These have found the test of evacuation too great and too ironic. At any length, they have reached the belief that their place is not in America.

Still others, will be leaving in order to keep the family units together--wives with husbands, children with parents, parents with sons, and relatives with relations. It will never to known how many of these repatriates and disloyals were influenced in their choice by the temporary suspension of their rights, but it is safe to say that the pre-evacuation repatriates would have been negligible.

One of the most vicious weapons used by the anti-Japanese elements on the outside has been the fact that no segregation had taken place in the relocation centers. Last week's ruling will automatically nullify this argument that has been continually brought forward by various racialists. However, it must not be expected that nisei will no longer be the object of barbed criticisms from the same sources. The only difference will be in the method used to undermine our position.

With the policy of segregation now an actuality, it will soon be time for friends to part with friends, members of a family with others, and neighbors with neighbors. We must go our respected ways realizing that each has made his personal choice under the stress and strain of wartime uncertainty.

Let's not look at the differences that exist among us now; let's part old friends, remembering the pleasant relations of the past.



Accident rate took a sharp upswing in the last few days with two evacuee workers injured while on duty. Latest reports from the ward also show that Hoshio Yokoi of Block 34 is doing well. He was thrown under the wheels of a truck and run over the chest by the rear wheel.

MUTUAL COMPENSATION

The WRA does not provide insurance for these accidents though free medical care is provided by hospital. The extent of liability that the government provides to the worker is limited to a set portion of the monthly \$12, \$16 and \$19 pay.

The result is that in event the worker suffers an accident that will deprive him of life or limb, his dependents are prone to suffer destitution upon leaving the Center.

COMPENSATION PLAN

In view of these difficulties, a Center-wide workman's mutual accident compensation plan of some sort may be the means toward aiding unfortunate victims. Such a plan would mean paying into a general fund each month by the 2800 workers a sum of about 10 cents, payable on a quarterly or a semi-annual basis. The fund will be administered by an organization such as the Community Council or the Co-op.

For an accident death of an evacuee worker, a set sum of about \$500 will be paid to the dependents, while for the death of the worker in offtime accidents, \$250 would be adequate.

For injuries, making the person incapable of working, \$250 will go a long way toward aiding the family. Other details could be worked out on similar lines.
