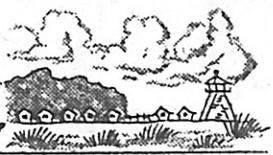

COMMENCEMENT

Rohwer High Graduates 152 Seniors

At 7:45 o'clock Friday night, 152 seniors of the Rohwer high school will be passing another milestone as they receive their diplomas in a twilight ceremony at the western end of Block 35.

An open invitation is extended the public to attend the commencement exercises. There will be a reserved section for parents of the graduates.

Attired in blue and

white caps and gowns, the graduates will march in to the Processional played by Tokio Inouye. The invocation will be given by Dr. Shokichi Hata, following which, welcome will be extended by Bob Sasaki, class president.

Carrying out the theme, "Cross Roads," graduates Alice Nakamura and Toshiko Aikawa will speak on the Past; Ronnie Senzaki and Betty Lou Hunter, the Pre-

sent; and Fumiko Mmonoi and Tets Kojima, the Future.

Diplomas and special awards will be presented by Superintendent J. A. Trice.

Benediction will be given by Adjutant Takemaru Hirahara.

During the graduation exercises, musical numbers will be given by the high school mixed chorus, directed by Leola Parsley; high school band, directed by Alton Cole; and a piano solo by Masako Tabuchi.

Class officers of the Class of '43 are Bob Sasaki, president; Joe Matsuo, vice president; Ruth Kambara, secretary; and Henry Okano, treasurer. David L. Cook, Margaret Tomioka and Mesdames Martha Gublo, Louise Beasley and Mildred Howell, are class advisers.

RESETTLEMENT IN DENVER AREA HALTED FOR 180 DAYS

The rapid influx of evacuees into Denver, northern Colorado and Otero county has caused a saturation in that area. Acute housing conditions as well as limited good job offers are other evident conditions.

In view of these factors, Relocation supervisor Harold S. Choate of the Denver district has requested that all indefinite leaves to that section be discouraged or denied for a period of about six

months.

Choate, in a letter to Project Director Ray D. Johnston stated that the former Japanese, the voluntary evacuees and the newly relocated nisei have increased the Oriental population. Other evacuees have drifted to northern Colorado from the south or from other states to further raise the figure.

He urged that all residents leaving the Center be instructed not to accept jobs in other localities and then leave for that area.

Denver and the following seven northern counties will be closed to indefinite (Continued on page 2)

Two hundred recruits are needed and candidates must be 16 years of age and over. A few exceptions are being made to allow boys of 15 years to work if they are physically strong.

Arrangements for this plan were made through the local PTA, school officials, and the WRA.

All persons discovering pools of stagnant water that make mosquito breeding possible are requested to notify Mrs. Jane K. Doi, medical secretary at the hospital.

Hospital officials will supervise the eradication of larvae found in tin cans, old bottles or in any other place where water can be found.

Lt. Patch was recently transferred from the 766 MP Battalion in Camp Robinson to Rohwer to replace Captain Russell P. Hastings as commanding officer of the MP unit here. Hastings is at present assigned to the Hereford Internment camp in Texas.

"I thought that the recent open house for the newspaper men was very good," continued Patch who also revealed that he was a civil engineer in Payette, Idaho, prior to his army service.

Lt. Patch is assisted by 1st Lieutenant John N. Edwards (Plans and transportation) and 2nd Lieutenant Earl T. Burroughs (Personnel, mess and exchange.)

An enlisted man for twelve years prior to his commission, Lt. Burroughs was raised from the ranks. He stated that the men have enjoyed the many softball games between the MP and the Center teams.

nite leaves for the next six months while short term leave to these counties to interview employers and seek agricultural opportunities will also be refused.

However, seasonal work offers coming from Supervisor Choate's office may be taken by those who are interested in such jobs, the report continued.

SUMMER SESSION STARTS

During the five weeks of summer vacation, over 2,000 local students will have fun and worthwhile activities at the Summer Leisure Time program starting Aug. 9 under the co-directionship of Margaret Sorenson and Ira Holland.

Appointed and evacuee staffs from Education and CA, totaling over 60 counselors, instructors and coaches, will be in charge.

Assisting the counselors and instructors will be a number of junior leaders, older boys and girls from the high schools.

The 25 different activities and interest groups are divided into three types: active (early mor-

nings and evenings); crafts and hobbies (late mornings and afternoons); and quiet (afternoons).

Active interest groups include: softball, tumbling, volleyball, indoor and outdoor games and parties, camping and picnics, hiking and nature study, folk dancing, social dancing and trips in the Center to points of interest.

Craft and hobby groups include: drawing and painting, woodcarving, clay modeling, etc., model building, crocheting, and embroidering, knitting, sewing, weaving, dramatics, music, marbles and clubs.

Quiet interest groups include: moving pictures,

story telling, reading, fishing, singing and music hour (records).

The various groups are being organized on the age range basis of 8 years and younger; 9 to 11 years; 12 to 14; and 15 years and up.

Groups will meet Mondays through Fridays from 8 to 9:30 a.m.; 10 to 11:30 a.m.; and 2:30 to 5 p.m. There will also be evening groups from 7 to 9 p.m. for students from the fifth to the twelfth grades.

Any adult and older boys and girls interested in assisting the counselors and instructors are requested to indicate their interest at PS hall 32 or at 35-12-D.

IMPROVEMENT IN SCHOOL PLANS

With July 30 as the last day of school, summer vacation is just around the corner for Rohwer students.

CHILDREN'S BOOK EXHIBIT

Tomorrow morning the Rohwer Relocation library at PS hall 19 will open its door to the Children's book exhibit. Fifty modern books by some of the most outstanding and widely known authors and illustrators such as, Arthur Rookham, Maud and Miska Petersham, Howard Pyle, Dorothy Lathrop, Lynd Ward, Peggy Bacon and many others, will be exhibited.

Topping the many highlights of this display are the two books illustrated by Thomas Handforth, the illustrator of "Moll", and Virginia Lee Burton, the illustrator of "Little House" who both are the winners of the famed Caldecott medal awards. This

award was established and endowed by Frederic G. Melcher in 1937. It is presented by the Children's librarians' section of the American library association annually for "The most distinguished American picture book for children," published in the past year.

The medal is named in honor of the nineteenth century English artist Randolph Caldecott, the first and one of the most famous illustrators of books for children. Thomas Handforth was the winner in 1939 and Virginia Lee Burton in 1942.

Probably the outstanding contribution to the children's library is the donation of four autographed

books with the inscription, "With best wishes to the American Children of Japanese Ancestry" by Elizabeth Janet Gray, 1942 winner of the Nowbery medal award.

The Nowbery medal, named for John Newbery famous London bookseller of the 18th century, is also awarded annually by Mr. Melcher, editor of Publishers' weekly, to the author of the "the most distinguished contribution to American literature for children, published during the preceding year."

The Children's library day was made possible by Mrs. Matilda Rens and the student teachers' child literature class.

341 ACTIVELY ENGAGED IN LOCAL SCOUTING PROGRAM

Latest statistics on the Rohwer Boy scout organization revealed that a grand total of 341 scouters, scouts and cubs are actively engaged in the local scouting program.

The district setup consists of 3 district scout commissioners, 7 district committeemen, 62 merit

badge councilors, 35 scouters and cubbers, 157 scouts, and 77 cubs.

Boy scout troops, numbering four, are: Troop 90 with 41 scouts and 5 scouters; Troop 91, 34 scouts and 6 scouters; Troop 92, 34 scouts and 9 scouters; and Troop 93, 48 scouts and 4 scouters; Cub packs, totaling four, are: Pack 90 with 22 cubs and 5 cubbers; Pack 91, 13 cubs and 4 cubbers; Pack 92, 17 cubs and 1 cubber; and Pack 93, 25 cubs and 1 cubber.

Listed among the many activities undertaken by the scouts is cooking with improvised utensils over hand-made fires. Their practical training, skill and ingenuity was demonstrated at the recent Camporee when scouts changed tin cans into stove tops, open kettles, and reflector-type ovens. Fires, which varied according to the use, were back-log, trench, oven and within-side log types. Patrols made their own menus for the three meals from the list of raw food given.

Outclassed at bat and on the field, the local All-star nine went down to defeat, 5-1, Sunday, against the smooth-working Florin baseball machine at the Junior high diamond before the largest crowd to attend a baseball game in this Centor.

Florin's ace chucker, Herb "Moon" Kurima and Will Kagawa, Lodi's pride and joy, hooked up in a brilliant hurling duol for six innings before the roof fell in for the locals in the late moments of the tilt.

Florin drew blood first when firstsacker Hi Ikeda caught hold of one of Kagawa's pitches on the nose and blasted a tremendous hit over the centerfielder's dome in the fourth frame for a triple, scoring Yase Chono, who had singled. Ikeda died on third as the next man grounded out.

ALL-STAR TILT TAKES TRIPLE TOLL

Things happened fast and plenty in the Florin-Rohwer tilt Sunday. In the seventh inning, Sakae Yamashita; Rohwer All-star backstopper, tagged out Hutch Omachi sliding in from third and in the course of the action, was spiked above the left knee. Taken to the hospital immediately, the injury required seven stitches. Yamashita is now resting at his home in Block 28.

In the next inning, young Sat Oune received a minor spike wound on his hand when he attempted to tag out a Florin player sliding in from first.

A few moments later, the press box roof caved in when the weight of the spectators on the roof proved too heavy. Though nobody was injured, Barry Saiki, OUTPOST editor, received a light tap on the head by the falling roof.

MUTINEERS TOPPLED FROM UNDEFEATED RANKS, 2-0
