ARMY TO TAKE NISEI WOMEN

Latest War Department announcement revealed that a limited number of American-born women of Japanese descent will be accepted for enlistment as members of the Women's Army Corps.

"The date of enlistment for these women will coincide with the date of general enlistment in the WAC, attendant upon the conversion of the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps on Sept. 1 into a corps of the Army of the United States," stated the teletyped report.

Adoption of the plan was the result of the recent Army's successful recruitment of American men of Japanese descent. The War Department feels that this would give the loyal women an opportunity to serve their country. The accepted women will not be placed in special units.

Project Directors in an administrative instruction approved by Director Dillon S. Myer on July 5.

The order reads that a defendant may be ordered to pay a fine of a fixed sum not to exceed \$300 as an alternative to serving a fixed period of imprisonment. In other words, an offender against the community law and order may not be required by the project courts both to pay a fine and serve a jail term for the same offense.

All money received as a result of such sentences will be paid into the miscellaneous receipts fund of the United States Treasury in accordance with Federal law, the order says.

WRA states that both Project Directors and judicial commission members at a number of centers have found that limiting punishment to imprisonment or the withdrawal of privileges was a weakness in the project penal procedure and have recommended that project courts be permitted to follow the customary American sentencing procedure of fining certain types of offenders.

Residents who order glasses through the hospital will have to pay for them in full.

Eligible people may order through the social welfare department through Wilma Van Dusseldorp. Those eligible are families with average center incomes of less than 12 dollars per month. For these people the social welfare will pay for the glasses in full.

For families with incomes between 12 and 15 dollars per month, the welfare department will pay one half.

All families whose average incomes including clothing allowance are 15 dollars or more must pay for their glasses in full.

The proposed meet with Jerome on Sunday has been cancelled.

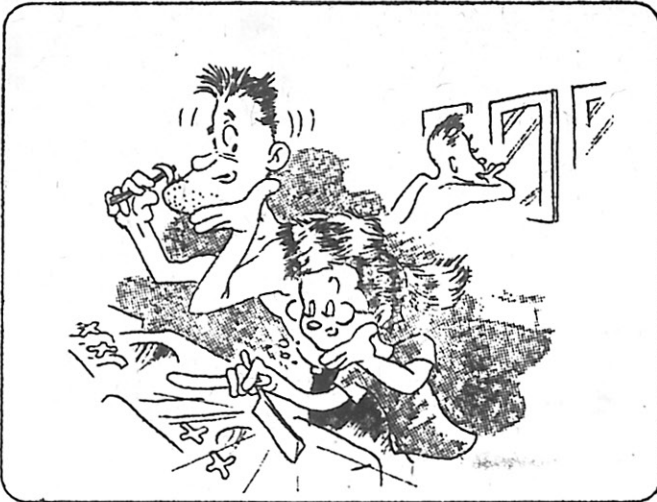
Block 9 Downs Flames, 3-0

EDITORIAL RELOCATION

With the primary motive of the WRA directed toward the resettlement of the West Coast evacuees in Midwest and Eastern localities, problems of various sorts have come to the fore.

The idea of relocation is not and cannot be contested as being the best solution to the postwar rehabilitation of the Japanese-Americans. Neither can the efforts of the WRA be minimized in this respect. However, improvement in the resettlement program can be and must be made ere the latest of government's program is dealt a death blow.

Resettlement, heretofore, has affected only a portion of the project residents and these have been wholly in the 20-30 nisei group. Some of these people have been able to acquire jobs which will allow them to care for one or two dependents but the vast majority have found that they are only able to make both ends meet.

Restrictions in certain unions, prejudiced attitudes of employers or employees and lack of nisei skilled men have been some of the main factors interfering with the employment of nisei. These then indicate what manner of approach would be necessary for the WRA to achieve its most important objective--relocation.

On this side of the fence, we have 85% of the center residents who have never left the relocation centers and many who, in the present light, cannot consider departure from here even though they may earnestly desire to do so. Where previously these men have owned and tilled their own farms or managed their own businesses, they are confronted now with the problem of starting all over again from the bottom up.

The hue and cry on the outside may sound the call "Clear the relocation centers" but the cart must not be placed before the horse. Until such time as when families, large and small, can find opportunities to go out, relocation will never reach its main goal.

One encouraging trend of late is the announcement of Relocation Officer Shirrel of Chicago that the various offices in the Midwest are endeavoring to find possibilities for relocating family units, but the success or failure of resettlement will depend upon the success and failure of the relocation officers and the WRA as well as the project constituents.

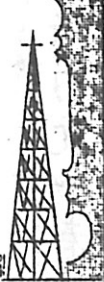
