EVACUEES MUST FILE PROPERTY REPORTS

Curtis Will Supply Necessary Papers

Every person subject to the jurisdiction of the United States and having on May 31, 1943, any interest in any property in any foreign country or every person with whom any foreign organization was allied, will be required to file a report not later than August 31, 1943. This is in conjunction to the special regulations under Executive order No. 8389, as amended, and Executive order No. 9193.

Required in the report will be information about all property located and payable in a foreign country on May 31, 1943. This would apply to any interest and any property damaged, destroyed or seized between January 1, 1935 and May 31, 1943 as a result of the war or a scorched earth policy or confiscation by any country at war with the United States in which the persons making the report or any foreign organization allied with him was affected.

However, persons who own less than a total of \$10,000 worth of property in all foreign countries are not required to file a report unless they own foreign bonds payable in United States dollars, or interest in allied foreign organizations, patent license agreements, franchises and concessions, and any contracts specified by the Secretary of the Treasury. Anyone having an interest in property coming within these classifications must file a report, regardless of its value.

Forms as well as further details regarding these reports may be obtained at the project attorney's office at the east end of ad building 2.

HOUSING: SURVEY TO START SOON

The community welfare section will begin their housing survey starting August 26. They will visit every apartment and check the housing situation.

This survey is being done to make preparations for Tule Lake transfers.

Mrs. Lou Alice Steams of McCrerey, Arkansas is coming to this center to become the head of the housing unit in the community welfare section.

TULE LAKE TRANSFERS EXPECTED, JOHNSTON

To allay the segregation rumors brought about by a story carried in the Granada center newspaper, Project Director Ray D. Johnston presented the following statement.

"In clarification of the unofficial report circulating in the center stating that Rohwer will not receive any Tule Lake trans-

fers, I would like to issue this information.

"At the Denver conference, no definite figures were quoted for transfers to Rohwer. However, we were notified to prepare housing facilities for a maximum center total of 8,500. How many will be transferred here will depend upon the requests made by the Tule Lake residents.

"As for rumors concerning the closure of the center, we have been advised that the center will not be closed in conjunction with the segregation program.

BLOCKED LIFE INSURANCE DATA

Attorney Jack Curtis released the following information on blocked life insurance policy.

"By the terms of General License 86 recently granted by the United States Treasury Department certain transactions are permitted with respect to blocked life insurance policies. A blocked life insurance policy is defined as one in which a national of a blocked country has an interest.

The transactions permitted are: (1) payment of premiums and interest on

policy loans, (2) the issuance, servicing or transfer of any blocked life insurance policy if the only blocked interest is that of a member of the armed forces of the U.S. or a person accompanying such forces, an officer or employee of the U.S., or a citizen of the U.S. residing in a blocked country not in enemy territory and (3) the issuance, servicing, or transfer of any blocked life insurance policy in which the only blocked interest (other than the persons named in 2

above) is that of a beneficiary. The general license also permits the use of dividends, cash value or loan value of any blocked life insurance policy for payment of premiums or policy loans and interest, for purchase of paid up insurance, or as an accumulation to the credit of the policy on the books of the insurer.

However, it is specifically provided that the license does not authorize (1) payment to the insurer from any blocked account

in which an enemy national has an interest (with certain exceptions) or any other blocked account except one belonging to the insured or the beneficiary, (2) payment by an insurer to a national of a blocked country unless such payment is made by a deposit in a blocked account in a bank in the U.S. and in the name of the one to get the benefit of the payment, or (3) any transaction with respect to any blocked life insurance policy issued by a company which is a national of a blocked country or which is not doing business in the U.S."

MILWAUKEE AREA OFFERS FARMING OPPORTUNITIES

A farm family of four in the Milwaukee, Wis., area earning wages of \$75 a month is as well off financially as a city-dweller with a salary of from \$1860 to \$1892 a year, according to a study recently released by the Home Economics Department of the University of Wisconsin. The average farm in the Milwaukee area, the University reports, furnishes shelter worth about \$25 a month, half the yearly supply of fuel for heating, and about 75 per cent of the food used by the farmer and his family. Fuel supplied by the farm would cost about \$40 if paid for out of cash income, and food raised and consumed at home adds another \$500 to \$532 to the average farm family's actual income.

To a family of three a farm job near Milwaukee at \$75 a month is worth from \$835 to \$860 a year more than an urban job at equivalent wages; to a family of four, from \$960 to \$992 more; to a family of five, from \$1085 to \$1125 more; and to a family of six from \$1280 to \$1328 more.

REFUNDS TO BE PAID BY CO-OP

Patronage refunds will be paid by the Co-op in about the middle of October, to all patrons in proportion to their individual purchases up to Sept. 30. Holders of coupon book covers must notify the Co-op office of new and old address even though his membership is void.

GRANADA

Lt. General Robert C. Richardson Jr., military governor and commander of the Army's Hawaiian Department, declared that Americans of Japanese descent "are just as much American citizen as I am." The statement was made before a student assembly at the University of Hawaii. "You are not responsible for what your ancestors did any more than I am for what the English did 300 years ago--and they did some pretty bad things", Lt. General told his audience, which include some Japanese-American students.

HERB KURIMA TOSSES ONE-HITTER AS LOCALS DEFEATED, 7-1

Held to a single solitary hit by the perless pitching of Herb 'Moon' Kurima, the Rohwer All-Stars were decisively trounced, 7-1, in the odd game of the three-game series with the Denson All-Stars Sunday before a throng of 2000 fans.

The lone hit garnered off Kurima produced Rohwer's lone tally of the tilt.

Kaz Hiromoto started the fourth stanza by reaching first on a miscuo by short-stop Hiro Tahara, who over-threw first, Hiromoto, advancing to second on the overthrow. Tak Horita then drove in Hiromoto by obtaining the only safety off the servings of 'Moon' Kurima.

While the local nine were stymied by Kurima, the Denson nine wasted no time, scoring a run in the second frame on a hit and an error. The run scored in the third inning was also unearned. Bill Tsukamoto socked a single to right and ended up at third when the rightfielder let the ball go through him. Yosh Tsukamoto promptly squeezed in brother Bill.

With two away in the fourth, Will Kagawa walked Bill Tsukamoto and Hiro Tahara to set up another scoring opportunity. Yosh Tsukamoto hit a roller to third and Bill scored when the grounder took a bad hop. Tahara dented the plate when Shago Kuraoka let go a wild heave in an attempt to catch Yosh Tsukamoto going into second.

The visitors scored their fifth run in the eighth on two errors. Two more markers dented home plate in the ninth on three hits.

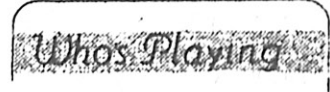

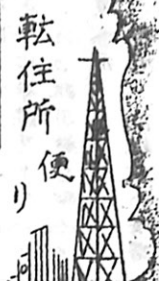
