## WAC: TOMORROW IS REGISTRATION

Tomorrow morning, Lt. Elizabeth Ellis of the Pine Bluff recruiting station will be in Rohwer to interview girls who are interested in the newly organized WACs.

Lt. Ellis will be at the Reports office in the Public Works division just north of ad. building 1. Mental tests and full information about the WAC training program will be made available.

Depending upon the interest shown, she will stay here for the afternoon.

Requirements call for an educational background of two years in high school. However, persons without two years of secondary training may qualify by passing the mental test.

## RESIDENTS MUST REGISTER TO GET INTERVIEWS, JOBS

Requisitions for workers in all departments and sections must be filed in open form, not specifying any particular worker or workers to be assigned. Workers may not be placed at work until appropriate assignment documents have been issued. Unemployed persons must contact the Employment division for placement.

## NEW AMENDMENT AFFECTS JAPAN-EDUCATED EVACUEES

The provision in section 60.4-3B of the "Handbook on Leave" that provides the project directors the right to grant indefinite leaves in advance of leave clearances to male U.S. citizens has been amended.

## LUMBER, ROPE FOR TULE BOUND

Lumber, rope, twine and paper boxes will be furnished for repatriating families who are going to Tule Lake within ten days of their departure, stated Tom Makino, head of the Public Works division.

Block managers are now in the midst of a survey for requirements, and after a tabulation is made, will issue as much material as possible within a reasonable amount as families are to do individual crating. Freight items are to be crated and not solidly boxed.

The directors are no longer authorized to grant indefinite leaves to citizens who have returned to the United States since 1935 and who have lived ten years or more in Japan after the age of six, or have received all, or most of their formal education in Japan, or who have had formal education in Japan after the age of fifteen.

Persons falling into one or more of these categories will be granted indefinite or seasonal leaves only after leave clearance hearings have been held for them. This would mean that a short delay would be necessary for these citizens to obtain clearance approvals.

## OWNERS MUST MUZZLE PETS

The Internal Security department revealed today that all dogs and cats must be either kept muzzled or be put in an enclosure by their owners for a period of 90 days. Many of the stray canines and felines have been exterminated but a few are still running loose. It is necessary that these animals be captured and removed before a rabies plague is started, according to the IS.

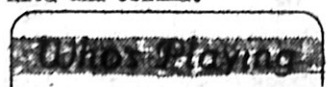
## ROHWERING 20'S COP B' TITLE

Sticking his head out from the canvas-topped truck, he waved a final goodbye, not the weak-waving kind, but a strong-armed salute that did not waver. And that unforgettable smile was still on his face. That's Gengo Miyahara, a right guy. I don't think none of us will ever forget him, for to yours truly, to have known him is an honor.

Regardless of which nation a man pledges allegiance to, good sportsmanship and fair play qualifies him to be a man that society will respect.
