### Relocation Opportunities To Be Given Here

To give a picture of relocation opportunities in the area covered by the Denver relocation office, Harold S. Choate, relocation supervisor, will arrive Thursday and will be available for meetings and individual interviews Thursday and Friday.

Choate has supervision over the area including North and South Dakota, Nebraska, Montana, Wyoming, Colorado, New Mexico and part of Texas.

In addition to a number of employment opportunities, he expects to have share-crop and farm rental opportunities for evacuees interested in relocating in the Denver territory, outside of the saturated counties. He will also do follow-up work on the Tri-County irrigated farm project in Nebraska which was brought to the attention of Center residents by Walter Parmeter two weeks ago.

## HAWAIIAN NISEI UNIT PRAISED

A communique issued to the press Friday from General Clark's headquarters in Italy indicated that the 100th battalion composed of Americans of Japanese ancestry from Hawaii had seen active service as an advance guard unit.

The battalion has displayed superior combat discipline and coolness under fire, it was said. They handled weapons with confidence and skill and morale has been of the highest order.

## Speed Limit Established

The Center speed limit is 20 miles per hour, warned the Internal Security section.

Driving around the school blocks, 23 and 33, is limited to 12 miles an hour and "Drive Slowly" signs will be posted soon.

No more than three persons are permitted to ride in the front seat of any vehicle including the driver and no one is to ride on running boards, fenders and on top of the cabs.

## Evacuees Aid on Michigan Farms

### NISEI SOLDIERS RESCUE 22 AMERICAN PARATROOPERS

WASHINGTON -- The United Nations radio at Algiers said last week that the first fighting participation of American-born Japanese soldiers in this war occurred a few days ago at Benevento, where a detachment was under fire "four long days" and finally entered the town and rescued 22 American paratroopers who had been behind enemy lines for more than two weeks.

"Captain Taro Suzuki, a native of Honolulu, was leading his force forward in that hotly disputed area when their fire baptism came," the English-language broadcast to North America said.

"Three machine guns opened up on us," Suzuki was quoted as saying. Subsequently the Nazis opened everything they had -- they let go with mortars and artillery but our mortars subdued all this Nazi wrath."

The honor of taking their first prisoner was shared by Sgt. Edward Kiota of Honolulu and Sgt. Daniel Wade of Kawai, as patrol leader, the broadcast said, adding that the squad that rescued the paratroopers was led by Sgt. Yutaka Nazu.

The United States Foreign Broadcast Intelligence Service recorded the broadcast.

This means that since February more than one-eighth of the Center's total population has gone out on relocation in one form or another.

### "JAPANESE AMERICANS HELP ON FARMS"

So read the inch-high, seven-column headline on the front page of the Oct. 13 issue of the Hartford Day Spring Hartford, Mich.

To relieve the labor shortage in Van Buren county, 20 nisei from this Center went to Hartford last week and were well-received immediately, according to word from a member of the group.

Following are excerpts from the story run in the Hartford Day Spring:

"Twenty American-born Japanese arrived in Hartford Tuesday and began work on the Buskirk farms near Lawrence where they have been hired to assist with the potato harvest.

"All of these men are American citizens, explained Jerry Mandigo, acting county agricultural agent, and are in no way considered prisoners of war. They are not under guard at any time and have the same rights and protection given other citizens of the United States.

"These workers have been carefully selected," stated Mandigo, "and are loyal American citizens."

We are comparatively idle, absolutely safe, and lavishly free to use our time as we desire, and still, we insist we cannot find a few spare minutes to drop a friendly hello.

Following is a letter from a girl who relates an incident of negligence and procrastination in correspondence:

"For the last four months I meant to write to him. But everyday, it seemed other things occupied my time. As much as I thought of him I had to also think of school activities, studies, and other odds and ends that had to be done. But yesterday, something told me to write. Soon as I came home from school I started. When the newsboy came, again I forgot the letter temporarily. My mind just seems to rove. I wanted to see the daily comic strip. As I glanced at the front page, a familiar picture stopped me. It was a photo of the very boy I had finally started to write to. I became so excited seeing his picture...but my enthusiasm quickly died. Under the picture was a caption, "killed in action."

But as time went on, the evacuees began to prove themselves worthy residents of that area, serving in various capacities. Some became air raid wardens and actively participated in community activities.

They are now well-accepted because they are integrated with their community life.

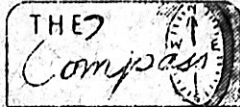
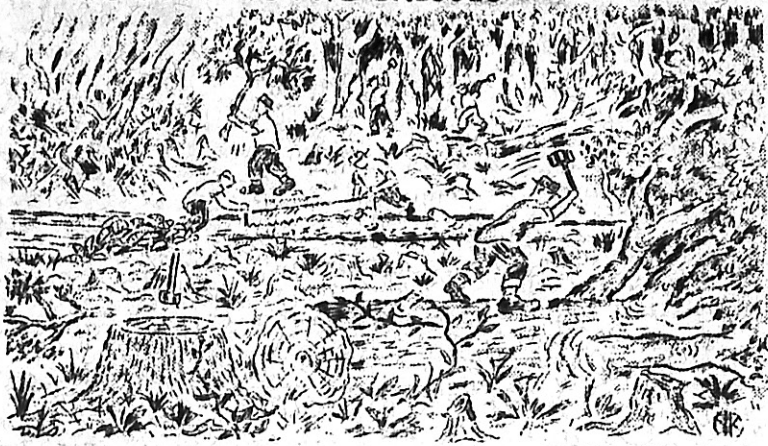
**Denny Stumps His Pop, So He Quits**

## First Nisei Gets Medical License in Colorado

The first license to a Japanese-American evacuee to practice medicine in Colorado was granted recently by the State Board of Medical Examiners to Dr. Howard Suenaga of Denver, formerly of Guadalupe, Calif.

Dr. Suenaga, 34, a graduate of Jefferson Medical College, Philadelphia, has volunteered for military service and is waiting a call to the armed forces.

He was born in Hawaii, as were his parents, who with his wife are residing with him in Denver.

When the evacuation of the West Coast was ordered he was

placed in charge of the Tulare assembly center under orders of the U.S. Department of Health and later at the request of the War Relocation Authority, he was transferred to the Heart Mountain relocation center, so that his skill in surgery could be utilized.

## KOUJI ARIHARA ENGINEERS DENSONITES TO 13-12 VICTORY

Denson high's speedy quarterback, Kouji Arihara, stole the "show" as Coach Dick Kunishima's local Center prep eleven, playing its first grid contest of the season, trimmed Rohwer's Center All-Star lightweights, 13-12, on the losers' field Saturday afternoon.

Arihara, who hails from Wilmington, Calif., and performed on the Banning high B squad there, engineered both of the locals' touchdowns and booted the "precious" winning conversion.

After three minutes of play in the first quarter, Arihara on an end sweep, galloped 38 yards to pay dirt. He kicked the important point after touchdown which proved to be the deciding margin.

Again in the same panel Denson's alert quarterback hit promised land in four plays after one of his mates had recovered a Rohwer fumble on the hosts' 15-yard stripe.

Rohwer marched 65 yards in the last minutes of the first quarter and at the beginning of the second canto tallied its first score. The Tigers' tired, gallant line held like a stone wall as the All-Star lightweights failed to make the conversion on a line plunge by inches.

At half time the score stood at 13-6.

A Denson blocked punt in the last quarter which bounced to the 3-yard line from the 20 paved the way for the losers' last six points. Again they failed to convert on a line thrust.

## TWO FOOTBALL LEAGUES WILL START HERE SOON

7. Two games shall be played on Sundays,

one on Saturday if game does not interfere with high school schedule.

8. Any person disqualified by the referee will be automatically removed from the game and league.

9. Teams must be ready to play 10 minutes after starting time or game shall be forfeited.

10. Each team shall pay a \$10 deposit to insure safe return of football equipment. (This must be paid by Friday, Oct. 22.)

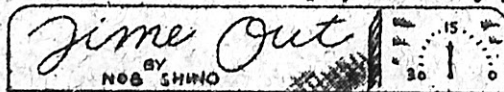
