# ASSISTANCE GRANTS ALTERED

Subsistence allowances for evacues families relocating hereafter will be calculated on family size and needs according to word received today by Paul & Taylor, Project Erector.

The new plan provides for the same transportation allowances that have here-tofore been allotted but permits a five-day subsistence allowance of \$25 for each person making the trip regardless of number in a family. Under the old procedure, no family was allotted a subsistence allowance of more than \$100.

Relocating assistance grants are based on need; all family members are eligible for subsistence allowances, provided that the cash resources do not exceed tioo per family member.

Evacues who wish to apply for relocation assistance grants may receive full particulars at the congression and leaves offices.

This new regulation will go into effect Monday morning, Nov. 8, according to James H. Wells, administrative officer.

## Relocation favored

(Editorial note: The following editorial which was taken from the Rapid City Daily Jarnal indicating the public feeling in the Black Hills area of South Dakota as eared in a recent issue of the Manzanar Free Press.)

The United States had made pretty much of a mess of its treatment of the Japanese in America. How vile has been its treatment of Japanese American citizens may be sensed by considering what we would think if the same treatment were meted out to us

Our attitude toward the Japanese Americans should be the same as our attitude toward German Americans or Italian Americans. Consider how fearfully short of that standard it had fallen.

Avowed pro-Jepanese have been left mingled indiscriminately with good Americans-left free to argue, taunt, tease, threaten, cajole the good Americans to weaken their Americanism by reiterating the injustice of their incarceration.

They recall to them how little constitutional rights mean if one has a yellow skin and mongoloid features; to ask them why they should expect that they can ever again mingle with Caucasian Americans.

Because pro-Japanese, self avowed, were left mingled with

(Editorial note: President Roosevelt recently, made the following statement regarding democratic rights of American citizens.)

"No loyal citizen of the United States should be denied the democratic right to exercise the responsibilities of his citizenship, regardless of his ances-try. The principles on which this country was founded and by which it has always been governed, is that Americanism is a matter of mind and heart; Americanism is not, and never was, a matter of race or ancestry. A good American is one who is loyal to this country and to our creed of liberty and democracy. Every loyal American citizen should be given the opportunity to serve this country. wherever his skills will make the greatest contribution -whether it be in the ranks, of our armed forces, war production, agriculture, government service or other work essential to the war effort."
