Treating Colds

More time is lost from work n the United States cach year by colds than any other condition. A great many remedies have been tried, but up to the present time there is no satisfactory way of treating colds. Some medicines are effective

In a few cases, but medicino is not effective in all cases. Without a doubt, the most effective way of treating a cold is to go to bed and remain there until the cold is subsided. However, a few of us are willing to do so.

In the early stages of a cold occasional medicines will stop the excessive watering of the eyes and the nose in the other instances some of the sulfa of the sulfa drugs will bring about a very rapid recovery.

No one method oan be prescribed which would be suitable in all cases, and for this reason, people with colds; particularly of a severe type, should come to the clinic and allow one of the medical staff to prescribe for thom.

Colds are contactous and are passed from one person to another. For this reason it is tery important that anyone suffering from a cold keep some distance from all other persons, and oover his nose and mouth when he coughs or sneezes.



More than 30 items have been assembled the series, inoluding general information on evacuation and relocation and special articles on summer school programs, student relocation, library services, and adult eduoation. It is expected that the series will be a valuable source of information for educators others interested in the WRA program.
