

# INTERNAL SECURITY REVAMPED

"All of the members of the internal security department have been instructed to be courteous in every respect to all residents of this Center and we feel that, on the other hand, the residents will show their appreciation by giving the police officers the same kind of consideration as are shown them by the police officers"-P.H. Cain.

"Motivated by the two-fold purpose of according the residents of this Center the best protection and securing the fullest cooperation from them, the internal security department," announced Acting Chief Internal Security Officer Pearson R. Cain, "has been reorganized.

"With the abolition of the position of block monitors, they have been replaced by police officers.

"The Center has been divided into districts or 'police beats' composed of six blocks each--33 evacuee blocks, block 36, high school and elementary school. In addition the administrative, warehouse and hospital districts are patrolled regularly.

"Two or three men are on duty in each district from 8 a.m. till midnight and between midnight and 8 a.m. the Center is patrolled from the

## CHAIRMEN, MEMBERS OF COMMITTEES APPOINTED

Empowered by the provisions of the charter of the community council of the Jerome Relocation Center, Council Chairman Frank Arakawa last Wednesday afternoon appointed the

chairmen and members of the various Council committees.

Article III, Section 1, Subsection E of the Center charter reads:

"The Chairman may appoint members of the Council to committees which may be deemed necessary to carry on the work of the Council."

## RELOCATION REVITALIZED

"With the Organization for Center Relocation Planning scheduled to be established this Friday at a joint meeting of the representatives of the administrative staff, council and non-council groups, the existing Jerome Relocation Guidance Committee will be automatically dissolved but its members will be likely absorbed by the new setup"--William C. Love.

Matters of the establishment of the Judicial Commission and the appointment of the Council members of the Relocation Planning Commission were postponed till the next regular session of the Council scheduled for tomorrow at 2 p.m. at 14-9-A. By that time the Council is expected to have completed the draft of the Manual on Judiciary.

Prior to the business session which was held in the USO reception room, 20-12, the Council held a joint meeting with the Block managers.

Council Executive Secretary William Konishi read the Council's resolution extending to Paul A.

Incidentally, Whitaker, Taylor and Melton are all "aggie" men. Whitaker is a graduate of Mississippi State College (formerly Mississippi A. & M.) of State College, Miss. while Taylor and Melton are graduates of the University of Arkansas of Fayetteville, Ark.

## Requisition

Under a program developed and released by the War Foods Administration on May 28, 1943, State and County USDA (United States Department of Agriculture) War Boards are authorized to requisition idle farm machinery.

Idle farm machinery is defined as farm machinery or equipment used in the production of crops, live stock, live stock products, or other

(Cont. from page 1) and representatives of the Community Council held in the Committee's headquarters and library at 20-1-A.

Acting Relocation Program Officer William C. Love briefly outlined the organization for Center Relocation Planning, thusly:

1. Creation of a Relocation Planning Commission to be composed of members of the Council Relocation committee (members not yet appointed) and representatives from non-council groups like the board of directors of Consumer Enterprise, religious groups (Protestant, Buddhist and Catholic), Parent-teachers Association, board of education, block managers, Community Activities Trust, YMCA, YWCA, USO, public health, newspapers and other organizations. An executive secretary shall be appointed.

2. Formation of a Relocation Committee composed of members of the administrative staff with the relocation officer as executive secretary.

3. Organization of a Relocation Executive Board composed of three representatives each from the Relocation Planning Commission and the Relocation Committee, directly responsible to the project director and with the relocation officer as executive secretary and the executive secretary of the Relocation Planning Commission as an ex-officio member--total of eight members.

Council Chairman Frank Arakawa informed the meeting that the community council will take up the matter of the organization of the Council's relocation committee at its regular session

at 2 p.m. at 14-9-A.

He also recommended that letters be sent to the various non-council groups asking them to send representatives to the joint meeting of the Relocation Guidance Committee and the Council Relocation Committee slated for this Friday at 10 a. m. at 20-1-A. His recommendation was made into a motion and adopted.

The joint meeting, furthermore, decided to postpone indefinitely the formal opening of the relocation office until such time that the Relocation Planning Commission is organized.

At the outset of the meeting, Acting Relocation Program Officer Love stressed:

"The purpose of resettlement is to relocate people in happy situation, instead of making the relocatees look back and feel that they have been mis-located.

"Relocation is a problem which vitally concerns the residents themselves and should be handled more and more by them. About 75 percent of the administrative staff meetings is, it is safe to say, devoted to discussions on relocation.

"This week was the biggest resettlement week so far since the boom days. To date this week (last Friday) 31 have resettled, of which number 17 were Issei. By the end of the week the total may reach.

"Three district relocation supervisors and their staff members are scheduled to arrive here in January and discuss resettlement problems with the residents. Relocation is expected to reach its peak in March."

agriculture products, or for transportation of such products, which is not now in use, and which a county USDA War Board certifies will not be used for agriculture production unless requisitioned.

If farm machinery or equipment is being used for the production of crops or agriculture products, War Boards have no authority to requisition under this program.

The first step in requisitioning farm equipment is for the chairman of the county USDA War Board to communicate with the owner indicating that an eligible purchaser stands ready to purchase the specified equipment at the ceiling price or at a fair appraised value.

If the owner fails to accept or reject the offer within 10 days from the date of the letter a request is made for requisitioning.

When a owner receives such a communication from any

County War Board, he is requested to get in touch, immediately, with Evacuee Property Office.

There is very little time available, and if the WRA is to be of any assistance in forestalling the requisitioning, action will have to be prompt.

If the owner has plans for relocating which necessitates the use of the equipment, full particulars may be presented to the State War Board and a request be made to postpone the action until further investigation can be made.

The Evacuee Property Office has an inquiry from a prospective purchaser for domestic or Japanese manufactured "sake" wine in 100, or more, case lots. Those interested please call at the Evacuee Property Office for particulars.

central office. There are three shifts-- 8 a.m. to 4 p. m., 4 p.m. till midnight and midnight to 8 a.m.

"The police officers have been instructed to enforce all laws and regulations of the War Relocation Authority.

"They are being instructed twice each week in various methods of police work and are showing intense interest and enthusiasm in their work as police officers.

"Negotiations are now in progress to purchase uniforms for all members of the internal security department which will add greatly to their appearance and prestige.

"Each police officer is equipped with a night stick (Louisville Slugger), badge and whistle.

Positions as police officers are still open for capable men.

"The internal security office has

been rearranged so that police officers will have quarters to themselves where they may assemble for instructions and for their own personal pleasure.

"The west room of the internal security office has been divided into two sections--one for passes and the sergeant's office and the other for the appointed personnel officers.

"Leaflets are being prepared for the use of all police officers and for any official who desires to have a copy.

"Those leaflets contain instructions regarding the duties of all members of the internal security department, information concerning arrests and insanity cases and all phases of police work which are conducive to an efficient police department."

"The leaflets are being prepared at the Kansas City office and will be available within a short time.

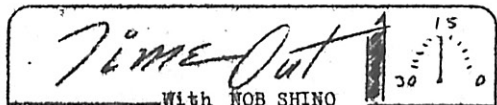

## WOMEN'S ROLE EMPHASIZED
