# SHOPPING FOR XMAS REGULATED

Permission to leave the Center for Christmas shopping this season, according to the memorandum issued to all residents of the Center by Project Director E.B. Whitaker, will be governed by the following regulations.

It is necessary that shopping trips be held to a minimum for several reasons.

1. It is necessary to our local public acceptance that no large number of evacnees shop in any one town on any one day.

We mustrespect the natural feeling among neighboring townspeople that the Center's larger buying power should not be allowed to strip the shelves of their merchants.

All stocks are necessarily low and it is, of course, the first duty of any town's merchants to supply that town's people.

2. It is also necessary that shopping trips be kept to a minimum because of the wartime strain upon transportation facilities.

## DEFINITE DECISION URGED

It is likely, in the opinion of WRA Director Dillon's, Myer in re repatriation, that it will be very difficult, if not impossible, for persons to get their names removed after their names have been submitted to the Japonese Government and accepted by the Government. Evacuees should under-

"As project director I will help in I can for whatever the commission and committee."

Acting Relocation Program William C. Love explained the composition and functions of the Organization for Center Relocation Planning, thusly:

1. Relocation Planning commission composed of council and non-council members appointed by the Council for ocordinating the thinking, activities and plans on resettlement with the other two committees.

2. Relocation committee composed of administrative staff members appointed by the project director for considering disoussions on evacuee reactions to resettlement plans and policies.

3. Relogation Exeoutive board composed of three representatives each from the Relocation Planning commission and the Relocation committee and the executive secretaries of the two committees.

Serving at the disoretion of the project director, the Relocation Executive board functions asthe advisory body of the Relocation Planning commission and the Staff Relocation committee.

"The problem of relocation is now," Love emphasized, "outside of the experimental stage and is taking a new phase.

"Relocation is voluntary until such time as some policy is formulated by Congress, the WRA or by the cool thinking of the evacueen.

"The primary object of the WRA, however, is relocation. The evacuees must ultimately find their place in American society. Resettlement is their vital concern. Relocation will help them to make " use of their skills in various phases of work.

Following Love's explanation of the three new relocation committees, Project Director, Whiteker formally dissolved the Jerome Relocation Guidance committee with thanks, expressing his deep appreciation for what the committee has done for resettlement as a group and as individuals.

Council Chairman Arakawa then appointed, subject to the approval of the Community Council, ' 17 new members to the Relocation Planning commission. Appointments of Councilmen Jisaburo Kasai, Fukuji Sasaki and Masao Itano, Block Manager Koichi Kamikawa, Henry T. Ishino and Shigeichi Kubo were approved by the Council at last Wednesday's regular session.

Kasai served as temporary chairman of the Relocation Planning commission with Ellen A. Noguchi as temporary executive secretary.

Pending approval of the Council at tomorrow afternoon's regular session at 14-9-A, the formal organization of the Relocation , Planning commission is expected to be effected in the near future.

#### PVT. AWAKUNI DEFIES DEATH

Under the three-column two-line head "Japanese Troops in U. S. Army Are Playing Heroic Role in Italy," the Toledo Times (Ohio) in its October 27, 1943 edition carried the following John Lardner by-lined atory:

THE AMERICAN ARMY ADVANCED FORCES WITH IN ITALY, Oct. 25 (Delayed)(NANA) -- There is a unit of American-Japanese soldiers fighting the Germans over a sector of the Allied front line here. We found them bi-vouacked in a sunny tomato field on an Italian farm beyond the north fork of the Volturna river. German shells were dropping in the bottom land and also around a orumbling castle on the hill just above.

The Japanese had completed one month of battle in this land half-way around the world from their homes in Hawaii. The net verdict of other troops in the sector is that they are very good soldiers, note-worthy especially for their aggressiveness and stamina.

They looked good. They were neat and alert and said "Good morning" cheerfully as we walked toward their camp over the country roads and sunken lanes and olive groves of Campania,

ROCKET STOPS TANK

Near a solitary house by a curve in the road stood an enemy tank, full of holes outside and full blood inside. When we reached the camp a little farther on the unit commander, Lieut. Col. Farrant Turner of Honolulu was taking notes on the story of Private Masao Awakuni, a bazooka gunner who shot up this tank.

The bazooka, as you may know, will raise hell with a tank but the gunner must be pretty close and tanks are not comfortable

to be close to.

With only the road bend for cover Private Awakuni got within 25 feet. He sighted along the hig, grotesque tube, fired the rocket shell which leaves a wake of flame, killed the tank's gunner, His next shells emptied the vehicle. The crew of the tank was incautious enough to start talking in the gilley behind the tank Awakuni's sharpeared mates piled them with grenades. It was a nice haul.

"What Awakuni did needs a good soldier," "These fellows are said Colonel Turner.

all very good."

Colonel Turner, born and raised in Hawaii himself, feels his Hawaiian Japanese are fighting a orusade for Americans and Japanese descent as well as killing Germans for demogracy. He brought them here from Hawaii himself by way of the training ground at Camp McCoy in the United States. They are the first combat group ever to leave Hawaii, the first American-Japanese unit to be trained in this war and the first Japanese to fight in American uniform abroad .

They are all second or third generation Japanese, known in Hawaii as nisei and sansei. Migtrusted after Pearl Harbor their aim, according to their officers, 15 of whom are Japanese, is to prove beyond question they can fight loyally and well, and thus directly protect the honor and reputation of Japanese in America.


