Under the Selective Service and Training Act of 1940, as amend- Hall. ed, all persons between the ages of 18 and 45 who are required to register with a local draft board must inform local boards, at all times od any change of address, dependenoy or marital status.

To the Residents of Jerome Relocation Center:

Dear Friends:

the past week or so very littl; indication of interest in relocation has been received here from your project, other than inquiries about next spring.

Perhaps it is only a temporary lull due to proparations for Christmas. Families do like to be together at Christmas time. If you are planning to relocate immediately after Christmas, will you please write us about it now?

About 350 Japanese Amoridans will be celebrating Christmas here, many of them around their own family firesides with trees in their homes, Santa Claus, 'n everything.

Many will be invited to homes of newly made friends. Perhaps some will see their first "White Christmas."

We are having our first fleecy show of the season today, and hope it stays awhile.

If you are planning to relocate in the spring, is the wait because of uncertainty about winter problems? Well, we wear the same clothes as do Californians in the winter time, plus (in rough weather) overshoes, a muffler, and a pair of heavy gleves.

Coal for our homes does not cost more here than water for our lawns does in California for the summer. Then, too, winter is mostly over by March I in this area.

Gardens are being spaded, farmers legin their spring work, and an air of expectancy-

of-summer takes hold of people. Farmers want their arrangements completed by then. So, if farmers are planning to relocate in the spring, they should be inquiring and planning about it not later than

January 1. If you are thinking of Cincinnati and area; we shall be gird to hear from you. He think it has proven better to choose a city or an area, come ahead, probably to the Hostel, and then take a job after a personal interview.

I think you should know that we have jobs at standard wages or salaries for office workers, nursery and greenhouse men, nurses and nurse's aides, mechanics, dental technicians, factory workers, restaurant workers, gardeners, caretakers; farmers, disticians, and other workers ..

Porsons have arrived, and in cooperation with our office, answered ads in their own field of work and gotten jobs. Oh yes, there are several jobs for college students' at attractive salaries.

Decent housing is obtainable at prices commensurate with earning ability. Children are happy in schools, Churches welcome evacuees into membership and activities.

Library cards are available to all. Night school opportunities are plentiful, both academic and manual.

Alien Enemy Hearing Board, they were released by order of the Attorney General of the United States.

Project Director . B. Whitaker today warned alien evacuees planning to leave the centers, on seasonal or indefinite leave to be absolutely certain they understand and comply with all Department of Justice regulations governing enemy aliens. "These regulations require that enemy allens apply to the U. S. District Attorney in the State in which they are living at the time for permission to travel' one city or town to another.

Application for permission must be made at least seven days before any trips can

Capt. Katsumi Kometani, who six months ago visited the Center with the 100th infantry ball team, sends the following message to the USO.

"Your encouraging and interesting letters have been sources, of great comfort, not only to those who know the kindness and spirit of the Denson USO but to the entire

men of this outfit.

"It is the thought and the assurance at you and the others back there are that fully behind us, thinking and praying for us and that our action on this front means just as much to you as to us and our loved ones, that urges us on and face the risks that but those facing the enemy can imagine.

"The men of this outfit will go through hell and high water because we have every confidence that people like you will take care of the home front. It is just as important:

The lefthalf spot is four deep with talented Ricky and Sus Ishikawa, Jim Koga and Tom Mukai ready to take turns at the post.


