

QUESTION, ANSWERS ON NEW SELECTIVE SERVICE RULES FOR NISEI LISTED

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Questions and Answers on New Selective Service Procedures for Japanese-Americans have been received here.

On January 20 the War Department announced the re-institution of Selective Service for Misoi.

The Questions and Answers on Induction of American Citizens of Japanese Descent for Military Service follow:

1. Q. To what age group will induction for military service apply?

A. To males 18 to 37 years of age inclusive.

2. Q. Will kibei be inducted?

A. Yes, if otherwise qualified.

3. Q. Will issei be inducted?

A. No.

4. Q. Will a man who has left the relocation center be inducted?

A. Yes, if qualified. Induction does not depend on residence in a center.

5. Q. Will an individual of Japanese ancestry who has applied for expatriation be inducted?

A. Generally speaking, no.

6. Q. Can a man avoid induction by changing his answer on the loyalty question or by asking for expatriation at this time?

A. No. A change in his answer or a request for expatriation will not affect his liability for training and service.

The Selective Service Law carries penalties for false statements made for the purpose of avoiding induction.

7. Q. At what rate will men be called for induction?

DEPENDS ON LOCAL QUOTA

A. The rate of call will depend on the local Selective Service Board quota.

8. Q. On what basis does the Army determine "acceptability for service?"

A. "Acceptability for service" is determined by checking individual records.

9. Q. Is there any way for a man not considered "acceptable for service" to change his status?

A. Not at present.

10. Q. How soon will inductees be called?

A. It is impossible to indicate the exact time when a registrant will be called. An individual considered "acceptable for service" will be reclassified by the local Selective Service Board. He will undergo a pre-induction physical examination when his order number is reached, or sooner if he waives this requirement and volunteers. If he is physically qualified, he will generally be called not less than 10 or more than 90 days thereafter.

11. Q. Where will physical examinations be given?

A. At the Armed Forces Induction Station designated by Selective Service, usually the nearest station.

12. Q. If a man originally registered with a Selective Service Board on the Pacific Coast will he go back to that point to be inducted?

A. No. He will be inducted at the nearest Armed Forces Induction Station or Reception Center.

13. Q. How will an "acceptable" nisei be

notified to report for induction?

A. He will receive an order to report for induction from the appropriate local Board. The order will be on DSS Form 150.

14. Q. Where in the Army will the Japanese Americans serve?

A. They will serve wherever the United States sends them; however it is anticipated that after basic training the majority of inductees will be assigned for service with the 100th Battalion or the 442nd Combat Team.

15. Q. Is there an opportunity to get into the Navy? The Marines? The Army Air Forces? The Armored Force?

A. Inductions are authorized only for the Army. Inductees will not be assigned to duty with the Air Forces or the Armored Forces.

16. Q. Are there penalties for failure to notify a local Board of a change of address?

A. Yes. An eligible male who fails to keep his local Board notified of his address will be reported as a delinquent to a U. S. District Attorney, and will be subject to penalties provided in the Selective Service and Training Act.

17. Q. Are niseisoldiers in uniform permitted to go into the evacuated zone?

A. Yes, when on active duty and on leave or furlough.

18. Q. What assistance from the Government does the family of a soldier receive?

FULL INFORMATION AVAILABLE

A. The system of benefits and allotments available from the Government to families of soldiers is too complicated to explain briefly. In a relocation center the Welfare Section has full information outside a relocation center the local headquarters of the American Red Cross has such information; soldiers may receive complete information at Army Posts.

19. Q. What arrangements will WRA make for dependents of a nisei in a relocation center who is inducted into the Army?

A. Policies of WRA which apply to any persons in relocation centers also apply to dependents of soldiers.

20. Q. Will dependents of a nisei who is inducted after leaving a relocation center be eligible to return to a center?

A. Policies of WRA governing the return of any relocated person or family will apply to the family of a soldier. Briefly, the relocation supervisor in the area must give his approval before the project director is authorized to grant readmittance to a person who has been relocated.

3-R'S FOR PEOPLE OF CENTER LISTED

In one of the presidential elections of yore, The 3-R slogan was: Rum, Romanism and Ruin.

In the presidential elections of 1932, the 3-R slogan of the Democratic party was: Repeal, Recovery and Roosevelt.

In recent days the residents of the Center were presented with another version of the 3-R's

1. Relocation for both the non-citizen Japanese and the American citizens of Japanese ancestry.

2. Reinstatement of Selective Service for American citizens of Japanese descent.

3. Registration of alien Japanese concerning change of address.

RELOCATION--The Relocation team which visited this Project last week repeated at every meeting that relocation is voluntary and a matter of individual choice.

They stated that they could place any individual in the Center in a respectable job outside which would pay a living wage for him and his family.

Assistant Secretary of War John J. McCloy has said:

"Anything that can legitimately be done to compensate loyal citizens of Japanese ancestry for the dislocation to which

they have been subjected, by reason of military necessity, has our full approval."

The purpose of resettlement, as pointed out by Acting Relocation Program Officer William C. Love, is to relocate people in happy situations, instead of making the relocates look back and feel that they have been mis-located.

REINSTITUTION--Reinstatement of Selective Service procedures for Japanese-American citizens was announced by the War Department on January 20 and Questions and Answers on Induction of American Citizens of Japanese Descent for Military Service have been published in full on the front page of today's issue of The Tribune.

In his message to the Selective Service registrants, found in the foreword of Form 5, Bulletin of Information for Persons Registered, 1940, President Franklin Roosevelt stated:

"I wish I could personally talk to each one of you about our country's pressing need for a stronger defense, and its vital meaning to you, your family, and the whole Nation.

"I would tell you that the task before us today is as compelling as any that ever confronted our people, and I would add that each of us must willingly do his bit if we are to hold fast our heritage of freedom and our American way of life--our national existence itself.

"And whether or not you are to be among those selected, I welcome you as one whose name has been inscribed on the roll of honor of those Americans ready, if need be, to join in the common defense of all."

The President also said:

"I am glad to observe that the War Department, the Navy Department, the War Manpower Commission, the Department of Justice and the War Relocation Authority are collaborating in a program which will assure the opportunity for all loyal Americans, including

ALL ALIENS MUST FILE CHANGE-ADDRESS CARDS

All alien residents in War Relocation Centers are advised that they must immediately prepare and individually mail to the Department of Justice, Immigration and Naturalization Service, Alien Registration Division, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, an Alien Registration Change of Address Card, Form AR-11 (Revised), stated WRA National Director Dillon S. Myer in his emergency instruction to all project directors.

Alien residents may secure this registration card from their respective block managers. The aliens are kindly asked to promptly fill out the required card and place it in the United States mails after posting a one-cent stamp on the right-hand corner of the self-addressed card.

They are required to give the following information on the registration card:

1. Name in full.
2. Former address reported to the Department of Justice.
3. Present address in this Center.
4. Present occupation.

This is the same card which aliens outside of Relocation Centers are required to use, and it is necessary that every change of address be recorded.

Portion of the Alien Registration Act of 1940 which requires that change of address notices be submitted by alien registrants follows:

Sec. 35--Any alien required to be registered under this title who is a resident of the United States shall notify the Commissioner for Alien Registration of the Immigration and Naturalization Service in writing of each

change of residence and new address within five days from the date of such change.

Any other alien required to be registered under this title shall notify the Commissioner in writing of his address at the expiration of each three months' period of residence in the United States.

In case of an alien for whom a parent or legal guardian is required to apply for registration, the notices required by this section shall be given by such parent or legal guardian.

Sec. 36 (b)--Any alien, or any parent or legal guardian of any alien, who fails to give written notice to the Commissioner of change of address as required by Section 35 of this Act shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined not to exceed \$100,

NOTICE FOR EX-TULEANS?

Attention of the members of the Tule Lake Cooperative Enterprises, Inc. at Newell, California, who are now residents of this Center, are called to the following notice:

Certificates of Indebtedness for the period ending June 30, 1943, are ready for redemption. Checks will be mailed to you around the latter part of January or the former part of February 1944.

You are requested, therefore, to send us by return mail your Certificates of Indebtedness, issued to you on June 30, 1943, duly signed.

Earlier discussions with Department of Justice officials had led the War Relocation Authority to believe that during the time that Japanese aliens were residents in Relocation Centers it would not be necessary for them individually to report the fact of such residence.

Recent discussions and communications, however, have made it clear that the Department of Justice does require this information and the WRA has agreed to cooperate in helping them get it.

Americans of Japanese ancestry, to serve their country at a time when the fullest and wisest use of our manpower is all important to the war effort."

On January 28, 1943, War Secretary Henry L. Stimson stated:

"It is the inherent right of every faithful citizen, regardless of ancestry, to bear arms in the nation's battle."

"When obstacles to the free expression of that right are imposed by emergency considerations, those barriers should be removed as soon as humanly possible."

"Loyalty to country is a voice that must be heard, and I am glad that I am now able to give active proof that this basic American belief is not a casualty of the war."

The Select Committee of the House of Representatives, investigating national defense migration, made the following comment in a report to the lower chamber:

"The nation must decide and Congress must gravely consider, as a matter of national policy, the extent to which citizenship,

in and of itself, is a guaranty of equal rights and privileges during time of war.

"Unless a clarification is forthcoming, the evacuation of the Japanese population will serve as an incident sufficiently disturbing to lower seriously the morale of vast groups of foreign-born among our people."

REGISTRATION--All aliens resident in War Relocation Centers are advised to immediately prepare and individually mail an Alien Registration Change of Address Card to the Department of Justice, Immigration and Naturalization Service, Alien Registration Division, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

They may secure this registration card from their respective block managers. This is the same card which aliens outside of Relocation Centers are required to use for recording every change of address.

Let us repeat the 3 R's
1. Resettlement for Issei and Nisei.

2. Reinstatement of Selective Service for Nisei.

3. Recording of change of address for non-citizen Issei.

INFORMATIONAL PAMPHLETS

Informational pamphlets on Washington, D.C., and the states of Ohio and Iowa have been received here for use in the educational program on relocation.

They have been placed in the Relocation office in Block 36 and in the Relocation library at 20-1-A.

These pamphlets constitute the first of about 30 to be issued under the general headline, "Facts About America."

They are intended to give interested residents a picture of the various states which are prospective relocation areas.

Information in the pamphlets covers

such things as types of farming carried on, principal industries, climate, geography, history and a brief description of major cities.

AVENUES LEADING TO RELOCATION

Communities in Nebraska, Iowa, Missouri and Kansas are, in general, very friendly toward the relocatees, stated Relocation Supervisor Walter N. Parmeter of Omaha, Nebraska who is slated to entrain from here tomorrow night for the Heart Mountain Relocation Center.

Highlights of his instructive information on resettlement follow:

PUBLIC ATTITUDES--Very friendly toward the relocatees.

SOCIAL CONTACTS--

There are committees--educational, social and housing--in Omaha and Lincoln, composed of Caucasian residents and non-Caucasian relocatees, whose purpose is to lead the settlers and their children into the regular stream of American life.

JOB OPPORTUNITIES--

There are positions and jobs for professional, skilled and unskilled workers. It is possible to place the relocatees in professions and skills for which they were trained prior to evacuation.

FARMING--Rich asparagus lands are found along the Missouri river from Sioux City, Iowa, to St. Louis, Missouri. There is, also, a 1,6000-acre farm land about eight miles north of Omaha.

COST OF LIVING--It is generally lower than in many areas. Last year the cost of living per month in Kansas City for a family of four was \$142.84 whereas in San Francisco, it was \$167.54.

ADVANTAGES--The job turnover is not as great as in the large cities but work in the Omaha district is of more permanent nature, thus assuring economic security.




