

SERVICE FOR SHIPMENT OF GOODS GRATIS

Any evacuee desiring to have personal property removed from private storage to government storage, or have shipment made to this Center, or to a relocation address may have this service done without cost by making a request through the local Evacuee Property Office, stated Gilbert P. Castleberry.

Evacuee Property Officer Castleberry and Project Attorney Ulys A. Lovell attended the San Francisco property conference held on January 18, 19 and 20. Castleberry returned here last week while Lovell is due back in this Center on or about March 1.

Project attorneys and evacuee property officers from all the Relocation centers, the administrative staff of the San Francisco, Sacramento, Los Angeles, Seattle and Portland offices, and representatives from the Washington office participated in the conference agenda.

The three-day session was devoted to consideration of evacuee property problems to the end a better understanding could be reached by all concerned and better service rendered to the evacuees and their property.

Following adjournment since dis of the San Francisco meeting, Castleberry went to Sacramento where he spent two days with the office force there and inspected property in the California capital and and nearby communities.

He also spent three days in Los Angeles and inspection tour in that part of California.

NOTICE FOR ALL NISEI MEN OF MILITARY AGE

All Nisei men of military age who are not certain that they listed complete information concerning local Selective Service Boards at the time of registration early in 1943 are required to send name, number and address of their boards to the Relocation Planning Division, Washington, D.C., according to the teletype directive received here from Washington.

While induction will be a gradual process, it is essential that the records of each individual be brought up to date at once, stated the instruction.

Nisei men of military age are reminded also of the importance of keeping Selective Service Boards notified of all changes of address.

Responsibility for such notification rests with the individual.

A man who cannot be located and notified to appear for pre-induction physical examination when his order number appears will be reported as delinquent and is liable to severe penalties provided under the Selective Training and Service Act.

NISEI INDUCTION EXPLAINED

Acceptable Nisei in the Relocation Centers can expect to begin hearing from the Army in a short time, it was learned at Arkansas Selective Service headquarters today. The procedure will follow this pattern:

Names of those passed by the authorities as acceptable for army service will be sent to the Local Board at McGehee and the Local Board at Lake Village.

These boards will ask the Centers for certain information--the name and location of the Local Board with which each individual registered; and the present address of each individual.

The McGehee and Lake Village boards will then send this information to the Local Boards concerned--to the board where the individual registered--Hanford, Fresno, Los Angeles, Sacramento, Honolulu or wherever it may be.

These boards, at the time that the individual's order number is reached and in conformity with their periodic quotas, will notify the McGehee and Lake Village Boards to call that person for induction.

He then will be processed in the same manner as any other American citizen.

He will be sent to the induction station at Little Rock for physical examination. He then will return to the Center.

There he will be advised by the Local Board if he is physically fit for service. After the usual time he will be inducted in the usual manner.

ADDRESS OF CENTER IS "DESIRABLE"

WASHINGTON, D.C.-- In response to recent requests for clarification of Selective Service procedures, the War Relocation Authority recently asked the Director of the Selective Service System to determine whether Nisei young men, resident at a center, reaching the age of 18 and so required to register, should give the relocation center as their place of residence.

Selective Service Director Gen. Lewis B. Hershey informed the WRA that such a practice is "most desirable."

General Hershey's letter to WRA Director Dillon S. Myer, in full, follows: Dear Mr. Myer:

We refer to your inquiry of January 5, 1944, requesting our advice regarding the jurisdiction of evacuees now residing in War Relocation Authority Centers.

REQUIRED TO REGISTER

Section 611.1 of Selective Service Regulations provides that every man required to register during the designated times shall present himself for and submit to registration before a duly designated registering official or "the local board having jurisdiction in the area in which he has his permanent home or in which he may happen to be on that day."

It is clear that any persons obligated to register may exercise his choice of registering in the board having jurisdiction of his home or of the place where he then is.

Selective Service does not in any case attempt to control the decision of the

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BEARING ARMS FOR DEFENSE OF NATION

Major factors in the War Department's plan for the re-institution of general Selective procedures for American citizens of Japanese descent are the excellent showing which the combat team has made in training and the outstanding record achieved by the 100th Battalion (a former Hawaiian National Guard Unit) now fighting in Italy, stated a recent Washington dispatch.

This month marks the first anniversary of the formation of the 442nd Combat team composed of Japanese-American volunteers.

Commenting on the organization of this unit, President Franklin Roosevelt, in his letter to Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson, declared:

"No loyal citizen of the United States should be denied the right to exercise the responsibilities of his citizenship regardless of his ancestry.

"The principle on which this country was founded and by which it has always been governed is that Americanism is a matter of the mind and heart; Americanism is not, and never was, a matter of race or ancestry."

Ability, loyalty and gallantry in action are some of the qualities for which members of the 100th

Infantry Battalion are praised by their officers, according to a letter received in Washington from Lawrence J. (Larry) Collins, formerly WRA senior community enterprise adviser, from an American Red Cross hospital in Africa.

Collins, in his letter dated "Somewhere in Africa" on December 16, said he had been in the hospital for several weeks. Among his fellow-patients are several Caucasian officers of the 100th Battalion.

"I am happy to see that the battalion of American Japanese that has seen action in this theater has won praise in all quarters for its ability and loyalty," writes Collins.

"Several officers (Caucasians) from that unit are in this war and they laud them to the skies.

"Interesting, too, are the praises they receive spontaneously from other officers here that have seen them in action or just worked with them in adjacent sectors."

Project Press Release 68 reveals that 59 members of the 100th Battalion recently were awarded the Order of the Purple Heart, 58 of whom are American soldiers of Japanese ancestry from Hawaii and the other a Caucasian Lieutenant from Kansas.

The Purple Heart is the oldest military decoration of the United States, the order having been established by Gen. George Washington during the Revolutionary War and is awarded for wounds received in action before the enemy.

Question 14 and its answer in the 20 Questions and Answers on Induction of American citizens of Japanese descent for military service follow:

14. Q. Where in the Army will the Japanese Americans serve?

A. They will serve wherever the United States sends them; however it is anticipated that after basic training the majority of inductees will be assigned for service with the 100th Bat-

CENTER RESIDENTS HELP IN INFANTILE PARALYSIS DRIVE

Liberty dimes and dollars donated last week by the residents of this Center--evacuees and non-evacuees--to the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis helped "to lead, direct and unify the fight on every phase of this sickness."

Proceeds from two dances--the Denson YSA-sponsored President's Ball and the CA-USO co-sponsored March of Dimes Dance--were forwarded to the Foundation.

Moreover, students of the Denson High school mailed the cards of dimes to President Franklin Roosevelt on his birthday and all moneys taken in the collection boxes placed in every mess hall have been sent to the humanitarian foundation.

The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, Inc. makes grants for work in several fields, all of which are essential to victory in the fight against poliomyelitis. They include:

1. Virus research to determine the nature and action of the virus which causes the disease.

2. Treatment research to find a drug, chemical or serum which will cure or stop the infection once it has gained a foothold in its victim.

3. After-effects research to find ways to lessen the crippling effects of paralysis.

4. Nutritional research to find the relationship, if any, between diet and susceptibility to this disease.

5. Educational activities to increase public and professional knowledge of Infantile Paralysis and to train new scientific fighters, Kenny technicians, nurses and physicians.

6. Epidemic research to determine how and why the disease spreads from one home, one community to another.

7. Prevention research to find some means of checking the spread of the disease from person to person by use of some vaccine or chemical or physical agent.

Regarding reinstatement of Selective Service procedures for American citizens of Japanese parentage, the War Department plans to specify that Japanese Americans considered acceptable for military service will be reclassified by their Selective Service Board on the same basis as other citizens, and called for induction if physically qualified and not deferred.

A Washington teletype directive states that all Nisei men of military age (18 to 37 years of age inclusive) who are not certain that they listed complete information concerning local Selective Service Boards at the time of registration early in 1943 are required to send name, number and address of their boards to the Relocation Planning Division, Washington, D. C.

(cont. from page 1) prospective registrant. However, it may be pointed out that it is most desirable that any prospective registrant register in the area in which he will likely be during the period in which his case will be considered by the local board.

Such action avoids unnecessary difficulties in the transmitting of forms, files, and essential information.

Likewise, it permits the registrant to have his case con-

sidered by a board which is familiar with the current situation regarding his case.

It is advisable that all evacuees who are hereafter obliged to register, in compliance with the Selective Service Law, give the address of the Center on line two of the Registration Card as the "place of residence."

This will automatically give the local board nearest the Center jurisdiction of the case. Your cooperation

THEY FOUGHT, DIED AND BLED FOR FLAG AND FOR COUNTRY

Discussing the battle record of the 100th Infantry in the Italian campaign, Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson on January 20 declared that 96 Japanese Americans have been killed, 221 have been wounded and 17 others missing in action.

An Associated Press dispatch paid the following tribute to the American soldiers of Japanese descent from Hawaii:

It is practically impossible to evacuate to rear areas any of the Japanese American troops fighting in Italy, except in case of very severe wounds.

These boys don't want to go back, even with injuries requiring days of rest, for fear they'll never catch up with their friends again.

EVACUEE GOODS DISCUSSED

(cont. from page 1) of the work of the warehouse section in San Francisco, Sacramento, Fresno and Los Angeles was devoted to shipping personal property to evacuees who have relocated.

"These shipments which are made in small lots or less than carload shipments are well packed and crated by the WRA at WRA expenses and shipped at WRA expense.

"With reference to personal property, I found that since evacuation a great number of people have come into California to engage in war work and it was the opinion of those attending the conference and through my observation, that it is advisable that all personal property now in private storage at any place be removed to government storage or shipped to this Center or to a relocation address. "I found that much

limited," he explained, "to get a complete report on individual cases but I would be happy to make a personal report to any individual on conditions as I observed them during my inspection tour of California if the interested parties will call at the Evacuee Property office.

GOVERNMENT STORAGE

"The packing and crating is done by professional warehouse or storage men and an excellent job is being done. The property in storage in the warehouse appeared to be well packed and crated and well cared for.

"One carload of evacuee property was loaded from the Los Angeles warehouse while I was there and is now on its way to this Center. I should reach here within a few days."
