

CHURCH AND SCHOOL LEASE IS INQUIRED

Lead Agent A. R. 1 Burns of the Los Angeles Board of Education informed the local Evacuee Property office that there is a great need for houses and buildings which could be used for child care centers.

Burns' information follows:

Many of the Japanese language schools and churches which are not being used are particularly adaptable for child care centers.

There is a critical need for the establishment of these centers in various locations if these buildings could be made available for this purpose.

The chief difficulty is in locating someone who has authority to execute lease and furnish evidence of authority.

Evacuee Property Officer Gilbert F. Castleberry stated that his office will be glad to assist any group interested in leasing church properties and school buildings.

These properties can be leased on a year to year basis or for a term of years to responsible organization.

NEW SYSTEM

A new system for distributing electric light bulbs and fuses to Center residents took effect on February 1, announced Supervisor J. F. Crump of the electrical department.

Block managers are furnished with a month's supply of bulbs and fuses.

Residents, accordingly, are hereafter asked to see their block managers for bulbs and fuses instead of calling for them at the electrical department.

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Males Between 18-65 Required To Register

All male resident of this Center between the ages of 18 and 65 are required to register at once--if they have not yet done so--at the education office, 35-1-A, stressed Superintendent of Education Amon G. Thompson.

He emphasized that this registration is most important and urgent.

Thompson also estimated that there are about 900 to 1,000 male residents in this Project ranging in years between 18 and 38 and some 100 to 150 who are 18 to 21 years of age inclusive.

Offices Are 'Relocated'

In order to integrate and correlate the functions of the various sections and units of the three main divisions of this Project's machinery--administrative, operations and community management, the following shift of offices has been effected:

Offices of the engineering and agricultural sections of the operations division have been moved from Administration

Building No. 2 to the new maintenance building.

Offices of the social welfare section, including its housing and counseling units, of the community management division have been moved from Barracks 2 in Block 36 to Administration Building No. 2.

William O. Melton, assistant project director in charge of operations, however, has his office in Ad Building No. 2.

FILE-INCOME TAX RETURNS

Income tax returns for the calendar year 1943 must be filed not later than March 15, 1944, with the Collector of Internal Revenue for the district in which the taxpayer resides or has his principal place of business.

While most taxpayers will be able to prepare their returns themselves, a Deputy Collector of Internal Revenue will be here at the Project Attorney's office in Ad-

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EVACUEE PROPERTY IS MOVED

Notification has been received by the local Evacuee Property Office to the effect that all of the evacuee property which was stored in the Nishi Hongwanji Temple at 119 North Central Avenue in Los Angeles has been removed to the WRA warehouse.

All persons having property stored in this temple who have

not filled a request for storage, Form 155, or a request for transportation to this Center, Form 156, are urged to come immediately to the Evacuee Property Office and execute necessary forms so the property may be shipped to this Center, or kept at the Los Angeles WRA warehouse for storage at the evacuee's wishes.

RESIDENTS CONTRIBUTE TO POLIO FUND

To help win the fight against poliomyelitis, residents of this Center--both the appointed personnel and evacuees--contributed a total of \$284.49 to the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Contributions to the March of Dimes drive were realized from many sources:

\$25 from the Denson YBA-sponsored President's Ball which were sent to Washington, D.C.

\$35.01 from the jointly sponsored USO and Community Activities March of Dimes dance and from the collection boxes placed in various mess halls.

\$29.26 from the appointed personnel.

\$195.22 from the card of dimes donated by Denson's school students and children.

Total, \$284.49.

These donations were made to help the humanitarian work of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis whose general purpose is to lead, direct and unify the fight in every phase of infantile paralysis.

RECORD MADE

Eclipsing last August record of 406 visiting servicemen, 408 men in olive drab visited this Center during the month of January.

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REMINDING ALL IN RE REGISTRATION

Registration is an obligation and responsibility of the individual from cradle to casket, from the post-natal to post-mortem period, from our entrance into till our exit from this world.

The various types and stages of registration follow:

1. BIRTHS and DEATHS are registered at the local hospital.
2. MARRIAGES are recorded at the welfare section of the community management division.
3. UNITED STATES CITIZENS OF JAPANESE EXTRACTION OR PARENTAGE should register at the education office, 33-1-A, for Selective Service within five days after attaining the age of 18 years.

When you register you are given a small card called a registration certificate which shows that you did register.

It is important that you keep your registration certificate with you at all times. Do not lose it. But if it is lost or stolen, go at once to the education office and they will give you another registration certificate.

Any person obligated to register may exercise his choice of registering in the local Selective Service board having juris-

isdiction of his home or of the place where he then is.

Selective Service does not in any case attempt to control the decision of the prospective registrant, but it is most desirable that he register in the area in which he will likely be during the period in which his case will be considered by the local board.

It is advisable that all Project residents who are hereafter obliged to register, in compliance with the Selective Service Law, give the address of the Center on line two of the Registration Card as the "place of residence."

4. AMERICAN CITIZENS OF JAPANESE ANCESTRY OF MILITARY AGE--18 to 37 years of age inclusive--who are not certain that they listed complete information concerning local Selective Service Boards at the time of registration early in 1943 are required to send name, number and address of their boards to the Relocation Planning Division, Washington, D. C.

It is essential that the records of each individual be brought up to date at once.

5. UNITED STATES CITIZENS OF JAPANESE DESCENT OF MILITARY AGE--18 to 37 years of age inclusive--are reminded also of the importance of keeping Selective Service Boards notified of all changes of address.

Responsibility for such notification rests with the individual.

A man who cannot be located and notified to appear for pre-induction physical examination when his order number appears will be reported as delinquent and is liable to severe penalties provided under the Selective Training and Service Act.

INFORM LOCAL BOARDS

6. ALL PERSONS BETWEEN THE AGES OF 18 AND 45 who are required to register with a local draft board in accordance with the Selective Service and Training Act of 1940, as amended,

AVENUES LEADING TO RELOCATION

NEW YORK, N. Y.--Having the distinction of being the first relocatee known to have opened her own business in this city, Tokiko Ann Tanaka, formerly of Granada, has been successfully operating her own beauty parlor, the Economy Beauty Shop on upper Broadway, since last October.

Most of Miss Tanaka's customers are Caucasians, and she is assisted in taking care of them by an Irish-American girl who worked for five years in the same shop for the previous owner.

BUSINESS IS GOOD

Business is good, according to Miss Tanaka, and she plans to renovate her shop as soon as she can secure the necessary equipment.

She worked for several months as a hairdresser in another New York shop before going into business for herself.

Around the corner from her beauty parlor, in an apartment near Riverside Drive, Tokiko Ann lives with her sister Mae, who is a stenographer in the New York headquarters of the Lutheran Welfare Council.

Mae was attending Manual Arts High School in Los Angeles at the time of evacuation. She continued her education at Amache Senior High School and was a member of the first graduating class a year ago.

The Tanaka sisters plan to bring their mother, Mrs. Kinuko Ito, and their stepfather, Kumayuki Ito, to New York in the spring. Mr. and Mrs. Ito are now living at GE-9-B, Granada.

"My sister and I have liked living in New York right from the beginning," Ann said, "and so far everything has worked out satisfactorily. We felt readjusted soon after our arrival."

One evening weekly, Ann attends an adult

education class in Columbia University, which is a few blocks from her shop.

Alaska-born, the Tanaka girls lived with their parents, prior to evacuation to the Santa Anita Assembly Center, at 3622 So. Normandy Avenue, Los Angeles, where Ann and her mother operated the Fuji Beauty Shop.

Ann was valedictorian of her class at Manual Arts High School in that city.

While at Granada, Ann worked as a cashier in the cooperative and Mae was employed in the mess.

must inform local boards at all times of any change of address, dependency or marital status.

7. RELOCATEES AND THOSE WHO HAVE SETTLED ELSEWHERE, ranging in ages between 18 and 45, must write to their draft boards, indicating their new address, the types of job, and current marital and dependency status.

Each time an evacuee moves, the same procedure must be followed.

Young relocatees reaching their 18th birthday are required by law to register at once with the nearest Selective Service Board.

8. ALL ALIEN RESIDENTS IN WAR RELOCATION CENTERS are advised that they must immediately prepare and individually mail to the Department of Justice, Immigration and Naturalization, Alien Registration Division, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, an Alien Registration Change of Address Card, Form AR-11 (Revised).

This is the same card which aliens outside of Relocation Centers are required to use, and it is necessary that every change of address be recorded.

Any other alien required to be registered under this title shall notify the Commissioner

of the Alien Registration Division in Philadelphia in writing of his address at the expiration of each three months' period of residence in the United States.

9. ALIEN EVACUEES PLANNING TO LEAVE THE CENTERS on seasonal or indefinite leave must be absolutely certain they understand and comply with all Department of Justice regulations governing enemy aliens.

These regulations require that enemy aliens apply to the U.S. District Attorney in the State in which they are living at the time for permission to travel from one city or town to another.

Application for permission must be made at least seven days before any trips can be made. For further explanation of these regulations, contact the local Project attorney's office.

10. VIOLATION OF ANY OF THESE REGISTRATION RULES AND REGULATIONS is liable to penalties.

It is the duty, obligation and responsibility of every resident of this Center and every relocatee to abide by the various registration rules and regulations and comply with the provisions of the Selective Training and Service Act.

THE NEWS EXCHANGE

THE MINIDOKA IRRIGATOR--Commenting on another aspect of the Nisei draft, WRA Reports Officer John Baker of Washington in a telegram to Project Director H.L. Stafford said:

"Residence at Tule Lake of itself will have no bearing on whether or not an individual will be inducted. Acceptability for service is based on consideration of the individual case."

Male residents of this Center between the ages of 18 to 38 years and therefore eligible for the draft total 980; those out on short term leaves, 25; seasonal, 215; and indefinite, 800.

NISEI IN KHAKI

Two weeks ago, some 160 boys, taken from the different companies of the 442nd, were collected to form a contingent to replace the 100th Infantry casualties.

Among them was Min Norikane, whose father resides in Block 45-11-F. Min is perhaps the first center-mainlander to be sent out to a combat zone in the European theater.

He volunteered while out on seasonal work in Montana, and has been training in Shelby since last July. He is now at the Replacement

Yoshio Miyaz, one of the two Nisei called to service from Heart Mountain on January 23, was registered at Santa Anita.

The Pasadena board in July, 1942, registered 1,000 Nisei and announced that reclassification for induction of these men will mean little likelihood for the need of drafting pre-Pearl Harbor fathers in that district for some time.

More than 100 Nisei registered with the board have already voluntarily enlisted in the services.

About 2,000 draft age men of this Center were giving serious consideration to the future in view of their imminent call to service.

58 HAWAII NISEI SOLDIERS RECEIVE PURPLE HEART ORDER

Information has been received here that 59 members of the 100th Infantry Battalion recently were awarded the Order of the Purple Heart.

Fifty-eight of them are Nisei from Hawaii and the other is a Caucasian, 2nd Lt. Edward V. Moran of Kansas City, Kansas, formerly Sergeant Moran, warden of the Sand Island Detention camp in Honolulu, Hawaii.

The Purple Heart is the oldest military decoration of the United States, the order having been established by Gen. George Washington during the Revolutionary War and is awarded for wounds received in action before the enemy.

ministration Building No. 2 on February 25 and 26 from 8 a. m. to 5 p.m. to give any advice or assistance needed. No charge will be made for the service.

Most taxpayers have already made substantial payments on their 1943 Federal Tax through withholding from their wages or direct payments to the Collectors; but nevertheless all taxpayers must file annual returns on or before March 15, 1944, as provided by law.

Those who must file tax returns include:

1. Any single person whose total income in 1943 was \$500 or more.
2. Every husband or wife whose individual income was more than \$624.
3. Every husband and wife whose combined total incomes were \$1,200 or more.
4. Every individual who paid or owed a tax on 1942 income.

FORM 1040A, called the short form, may be used by individuals whose total income was not more than \$3,000 and was ALL received from wages, salaries, other personal compensation, dividends, interest and annuities.

FORM 1040, called the long form, must be used by all other individuals and may be used if desired by any taxpayer regardless of the amount of his income.
