

## REGISTRY OF BLOOD DONORS IS PLANNED

Pointing out the benefits of scientific blood transfusion for both donee and donor and the advantages of the establishment of a registry of possible donors for Denison, Chief Medical Officer Dr. Douglas R. Collier has kindly contributed the following article to the Denison Tribune:

The present war has proven beyond any possible doubt the great value of blood transfusions following accidents and shock. The percentage of people dying in the present war is the least of any war in history.

The value of transfusion, however, is not restricted to the battlefield. It has been used in increasing numbers in every day life preceding and following surgical operations, accidents and other illnesses. No substitute has yet been found at all comparable to blood.

The first efforts of blood transfusion was done in the 16th century. While a few were successful, some of them resulted in immediate death.

We know now that there are four major types of blood, and possibly several subtypes. A blood transfusion must be made between two individuals of the same type.

Last week the Community Council approved in principle the idea of establishing some form of a blood bank for Denison.

Since a blood bank as operated in a large hospital requires a great deal of elaborate equipment and technical assistants, it is perhaps a better plan

## REGISTER AT WELFARE UNIT

Hereafter all male residents of this Center between the ages of 18 and 65 are required to register at once--if they have not yet done so--at the community welfare section in Administration Building No. 2, the section being headed by J. Lloyd Webb.

United States citizens of Japanese extraction or parentage should register with Webb for Selective Service within five days after attaining the age of 18 years.

## Taxpayers' Instructions

A Deputy Collector of Internal Revenue will be here at the Project Attorney's office in Administration Building No. 2 on February 25 and 26 from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. to give any advice or assistance needed for filing income tax returns for the calendar year 1943--the filing to be done not later than March 15, 1944.

Regarding the assistance to taxpayers, Collector Roy G. Paschal has issued the following instructions:

Internal Revenue

employees will not be able to assist you effectively unless you have the following information at hand:

1. Form W-2 or V-2 furnished you by your employer showing wages received and tax withheld. These forms may be secured from Cost Accountant Ambrose E. Cates in Administration Building No. 1.

2. Form 1125 sent you by the Collector of Internal Revenue with the blank forms for 1943 showing tax reported and amount

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## J. WEBB WILL HANDLE DRAFT NOTICES HERE

Every individual who received any sort of a notice relative to Selective Service or the draft should see Chief J. Lloyd Webb of the community welfare section in Administration Building No. 2 immediately.

Under present procedure, Webb will supply each recipient with a paper to fill out. This will be sent to the Lake Village Local Board which will handle all the paper work in each case.

Each individual's papers will be transferred to the Lake Village Board. No one will be allowed to return to his California draft board, for obvious reasons.

It is each individual's personal responsibility to keep his own draft board advised as to his residence. This is especially true of evacuees who have relocated.

If you have a son outside who is of draft age, write to him immediately and tell him to contact the nearest local board and keep that board advised of his whereabouts. If you receive notice of any kind concerning your son, who is outside, see Webb, wire your son to contact the nearest local board, mail him the notice immediately.

Webb will keep in touch with any changes in procedure and will try to assist each man concerned. But the WRA does not accept any responsibility beyond normal assistance in supplying information and forwarding certain papers.

Staying straight with Selective Service is each individual's responsibility.

## VITAL STATISTICS LISTED

During the period from October, 1942 to February 8, 1944, a total of 211 births, including 5 stillbirths, and 68 deaths has been recorded at the local hospital.

April and August, 1943 were the most prolific months with 21 births each, followed by March with 18.

The largest number of deaths occurred in February, 1943, eight persons demising in that wintry month.

DENSON

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"It is well known that his greater state papers are full of the ideas and the very phrases of the men about him whom he most trusted.

"His rough drafts came back to him from Mr. Alexander Hamilton and Mr. James Madison in great part rephrased and re-written, in many passages reconceived and given a new color."

There is an memorable picture of him "Crossing the Delaware," depicting his majestic and noble figure at the head of the boat. He was a true leader of the nation both in war and in peace.

He liberated the Thirteen Colonies from British rule in the Revolutionary War against the Redcoats and forged them into a Union, "now and forever, one and inseparable."

After the writing of his Farewell Address, he lived for three years in retirement and demised at his estate at Mt. Vernon at about 10:20 p.m., Saturday, December 14, 1799, "amid the mild concerns of ordinary life." "Tolling and knelling, Hear that mournful sound".....

From a log cabin in Hardin County, Kentucky, to the White House in Washington, D.C.--this in brief describes the career of Abraham Lincoln. He started from the bottom rung and reached the top rung of life's ladder--the presidency of the United States.

Excerpts from Lincoln's immortal Gettysburg address delivered on November 19, 1863 follow:

"Four score and seven years ago our fathers brought forth on this continent a new nation, conceived in liberty and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal.

"It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us--that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion--that

"If we remain one people, under an efficient government, the period is not far off when we may choose peace or war, as our interest guided by justice, shall counsel."

President Woodrow Wilson said of him:

"George Washington set an example which few of his successors seem to have followed.

to establish a registry of possible donors.

That should be entirely satisfactory in a small community where the donors are quickly reached and available at all hours of the day or night.

It is, therefore, proposed that a number of individuals, preferably young male adults, be asked to volunteer, possibly six from each block.

These individuals would come to the hospital and be checked over physically and a small sample of blood taken for examination. If satisfactory, their names will be placed on a register according to their type of blood.

When a blood transfusion is advised by the medical staff, individuals from that group will be requested to come in and donate blood.

This plan would give protection to the entire Center in case of accident or illness.

It would give additional protection to those who volunteer, since should they be the ones suffering an accident, their blood would already have been typed, and a donor could be found very readily.

Many millions of individuals throughout the United States have been giving their blood for war. While the Red Cross has recommended that blood not be given oftener than once in six months, some individuals have been giving repeated transfusions at intervals of one month.

Nature very quickly restores blood given in transfusions and often supplies a little extra for good measure, so that within two weeks' time, a person's blood may be actually

richer than before the transfusion.

A friend of mine in college gave twice the ordinary amount of blood one Friday morning, and then the following day, he went with me on a climb to Long's Peak, which is 14,256 feet in elevation. He showed no sign that the large transfusion has weakened him in any way.

To sum up, we would like to recommend that we establish a blood donor registry for Denver. This would consist of volunteers who are willing to give blood as needed to other members of this community.

No individual will be called on for transfusions oftener than once in six months. No blood will be used for transfusion until it has been tested and found satisfactory,

## SPECIAL PERMIT REQUIRED

Any person of Japanese ancestry who enters the prohibited areas of the Western Defense Command without a proper permit will be either prosecuted or forcibly removed, Lieutenant General Delos C. Emmons, Commanding General, Western Defense Command, announced on February 14, following the forcible removal of Masanobu Hatain Southern California.

Hata, 27-year-old Japanese American recently released from a War Relocation Project, entered the evacuated areas on January 24, 1944, without a permit, went to his former residence at Lemita, suburban community

of Los Angeles, obtained his automobile which had been stored for him by a friend, and was apprehended by the Federal Bureau of Investigation near Blythe, California, on route to his destination at St. Louis.

Hata was one of the 110,000 persons of Japanese ancestry evacuated from the coastal areas in 1942 under Public Proclamations issued by Lieutenant General J. L. Doherty, then Commanding General.

"Today's action of the military in evicting Masanobu Hata is strictly in accord with the terms of the Public Proclamations heretofore issued governing the exclusion of persons of Japanese ancestry from specified areas," said the Commanding General.

"It will serve as notice to any and all of the remainder of the 110,000 persons of Japanese ancestry evacuated from the Pacific Coast that they must not return without the special permits authorized by the original Proclamations. Similar action or rigid prosecution will follow any attempts of other evanescence to enter the area."

## Volunteer to Donate Blood

DENVER, Colo.--Thirty-five Japanese Americans, virtually all of them evacuees from the West Coast, registered at the American Red Cross blood donor center here at 117 15th street recently and volunteered to give their blood as an expression of what a spokesman termed "our intense indignation at the reported atrocities committed on Americans in the Philippines."

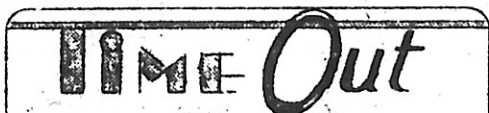

3. If you filed a Declaration of Estimated Tax during 1943, a copy of such declaration, Form 1040-ES, or the Taxpayers Work Sheet used in preparing it.

4. All members of the armed forces and any other taxpayers who do not have item 2 above should have with them a copy of the 1942 tax return and a record of the exact amount of tax paid thereon.

5. An accurate record of all other income besides wages received in 1943.

カリヤ一病院長は血液の寄贈に關し左の如き要旨を發表した。
