Each individual's papers will be transferred to the Lake Village Board. one will be allowed to return to his California draft board. for obvious reasons.

UNION IS FOREVER ONE, INSEPARABLE

This month-February-we comremorate the birthday anniverseries of two great Americans, George Washington and Abraham Lincoln.

February 22 will mark the 212th birthday anniversary of Weshington and February 12 will denote the 135th birthday anniversary of Lincoln.

Washington founded the Union and Lincoln saved it.

Mashington was the first president under the Constitution—the first president of the United States of America. He was "first in peace, first in wer and first in the hearts of his countryme."

On September 17, 1796, Wash-ington said in an address:

"If we remain one people, under an efficient government, the period is not for off when we may choose peace or wer, as our interest guided by justice, sahll counsel."

President woodrew Wilson said of him:

"George Washington set an example which few of his successors seen to have followed.

"Memade constant and intimate tree of his colleanues in every matter that he handled, socking their assistance and advice by letter when they were at a distance. "It is well known that his greater state papers are full of the ideas and the very phrases of the men about him whom he most trusted.

"His rough drafts came back to himfrom Hr. Alexander Hamilton and Mr. James Madison in great part rephrased and rewritten in many passages reconceived and given a new color."

There is an memorable picture of him "Crossing the Delaware," depicting his majestic and noble figure at the head of the boat. He was a true leader of the nation both in war and in peace.

He liberated the Thirteen Colonies from British rule in the Revolutionary War against the Eedconts and forged them into a Union, "now and forever, one and inseparable."

After the writing of his Farewell Address, he lived for three years in retirement and demised at his estate at Mt. Vernon at about 10:20 p.m., Saturday, December 14, 1799, "amid the mild concerns of ordinary life." "Tolling and knelling, Hear that mournful sound".....

From a log cabin in Hardin County, Kentucky, to the White Bouse in Washington, D.C.—this in brief descriles the careor of Abraha m Lincoln. He started from the bottom rang and reached the top rung of life's ladder—the presidency of the United States.

Excerpts from Lincoln's immortal Gettysburg address delivered on Movember 19, 1863 follow:

"Fourscore and seven years ago our fathers brought forth on this continent a new nation, conceived in liberty and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal.

"It is rather for us to be hero dedicated to the great task remaining before us-that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion-that (Continued on page 3)

It is, therefore, proposed that a number of individuals, preferably young male adults, be asked to volunteer, possibly six from each block.

These individuals would come to the hospital and be checked over hysically and a small sample blood - taken for examination. If satisfactory, their names will be placed. on a register according to their type of blood.

Then a blood transfusion is advised by the medical staff, individuals fromthat eroup will be roquested to come in and donate blood.

This plan would the entire Center in case of accident or illness.

It would give additional protection to those who volunteer, since should they be the ones suffering an accident, their blood would already have been typed, and could be a donor found very reedily.

Many millions of individuals throughout the United States have been giving their blood for war. While the Red Cross has recommended that blood not be given oftener than once in six months, some individuals have been giving repeated transfusions at intervals of one month.

Nature veryquickly restores blood given transfusions and often supplies a little extra for good so that within two weeks!
