

# EXPATRIATION REQUESTS AFTER JANUARY 20, 1944 DEEMED AS DRAFT EVASION

WASHINGTON, D.C.-- Requests for expatriation made since January 20, 1944, on the part of male citizens of military age must be regarded as efforts to evade military service, stated WRA Director Dillon S. Myer.

Several Relocation centers have indicated that a statement has been received from Spanish Consul De Amat to the effect that the United States Government has adopted the attitude that American citizens of Japanese descent who do not wish to serve in the United States army are under no obligation to do so.

## Statement

Myer has sent the following statement to the Project Director of the Manzanar Relocation Center who first reported the Spanish

Consul's statement: "In re your telegram of February 26, the statement attributed to Spanish Consul De Amat is not in accord with regulations of Selective Service.

"A citizen designated as acceptable for service who refuses to be inducted into the armed forces

on the ground that he has requested expatriation will be subject to penalties prescribed in Selective Service Law and the WRA will cooperate with Selective Service Boards and Department of Justice officials in apprehension of delinquents.

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## COURAGE AND HOPE, SPRING IS HERE!

In his "Ode to the West Wind," Percy Bysshe Shelley ponders: "If Winter comes, can Spring be far behind?"

In his "The Seasons, 'Spring,'" James Thomson beckons: "Come, gentle Spring! ethereal Mildness! come."

In his "The Hermit," James Beattie anticipates: "But when shall Spring visit the mouldering urn? O, when shall it dawn on the night of the grave?"

Well, as sunshine always follows the rain, Spring is here--"Spring which unlocks the flowers to paint the laughing soil."

Flowers of March are the jonquils or daffodils, symbolizing the breath of Spring and the fragrance of Springtime blossoms.

Birthstones for March are the bloodstone or aquamarine, expressing courage and truthfulness, respectively.

With the dawn of Spring momentous events affecting the lives of the Center residents and also the life of the Nation are scheduled to take place.

Transfer of the War Relocation Authority to the Department of the Interior will accelerate the relocation program, thereby enabling many loyal and law-abiding evacuees to discard the

Life of "patriotic isolationism" in the Centers for a normal one outside the Projects.

In re-establishing themselves outside the Centers, the relocatees should trace three steps for becoming an integral part of the communities in which they relocate--association, assimilation and Americanization instead of resorting to aggregation, integration and intra-racialism.

As pointed out by Secretary of the Interior Henry LeClair Ives, America is not washed up--opportunities abound and "energy and initiative, and honest-to-God free enterprise will be rewarded handsomely."

With the reinstatement of Selective Service Procedures for United States citizens of Japanese descent, "acceptable" registrants, if physically qualified and not deferred, will be inducted into the United States Army.

"Processing" of "acceptable" American citizens of Japanese ancestry of draft age (18 to 37 years of age inclusive) has already been initiated in all Relocation Projects and outside the Centers.

As regards the state of the Union, race-baiting, persecution of minorities or collisions between different branches of the national government should be replaced by racial tolerance and harmony, governmental cohesion and solidarity.

With the arrival of Spring the United States armed forces are fighting for new springboards or strengthening their already-won springboards to spring at their foes' fortresses and bastions from all points of the compass.

The present urgency is the practice and preservation of the motto of the United States of America: "E Pluribus Unum," one out of many--One Union, indivisible and invincible, out of many races.

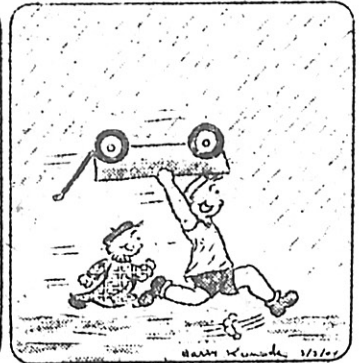

## TRANSFER IS APPLAUDED

Commenting on WRA's transfer to the Department of Interior, the Rockford (ILL.) Register-Republic in an editorial last week said:

"We should applaud the transfer as a move to integrate a special agency into a regular department of the federal government.

## "THE BEST HOPE OF MAN"

Extracts from Attorney General Francis Biddle's speech on "Democracy and Racial Minorities" follow:

What has rendered peculiarly acute any mistreatment of racial minorities--Japanese, Negro, Jewish--is our reiterated insistence on democratic equality of opportunity, irrespective of race, and the total nature of this war compared to the last.

Far more now than then, every man, white or black, Jew or Gentile, is enlisted to fight or to work for the common cause....

I know that there are those who contend that any discussion of these tense and difficult relationships in the midst of a war is unwise.

Why stir up trouble--so the argument runs--and give ammunition for propaganda and the appearance of disunity to our enemies?

But when all is said and done, I am less concerned about how the United States looks to her enemies.

What I care about is what she looks like to her friends; to those who love and believe in her; to Americans in the field who fight and die for her; to Americans at home and abroad who want to be able to speak

with pride and without any mental reservation when they say with Thomas Jefferson "this government, the best hope of man."

Race intolerance is no longer a matter merely of domestic concern. For it undermines our moral authority as a nation which apparently can profess but cannot practice democracy.

We have talked much of democracy, of the American way of life, in these last few years. But surely it cannot grow into the fullness of realization, as long as we, through indifference or through fear, permit these bitter injustices to continue. DEMOCRACY IS A GREAT WORD

What we do today will write the history of the years to come. Do you remember what Walt Whitman said?

"We have frequently printed the word Democracy. Yet I cannot too often repeat that it is a word the real gist of which still sleeps, quite unawaken'd, notwithstanding the resonance and the many angry tempests out of which its syllables have come, from pen or tongue.

"It is a great word, whose history, I suppose, remains unwritten, because that history has yet to be enacted."

# UNITY OF COMMON FAITH IS STRESSED BY REV. FREEMAN

Lack of unity of a common faith is the cause of this world's ills, pointed out Rev. Samuel F. Freeman, Jr. of the Pulaski Heights Christian Church, Little Rock, Arkansas who sermonized on "One Faith and One Fellowship" at the Christian English Morning Worship service Sunday forenoon in Hall 35.

"We can see," he stated, "the fault of others but we are prone to neglect ours."

Christ had one common faith and its counterpart was God. All must have a faith and fellowship with all people.

"Faith offers to their own special group and considers other races as slaves."

"Christian democracy offers freedom, equality for all races. It offers refuge to all. It is all-sufficient."

"Christianity teaches and stresses the Fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of men. It is geared to the facts of life."

"Youth has mighty influence today. We must lift up Christ now in church fellowship by actually using the Bible intelligently. By so doing we would be building world-wide citizenship."

The High School quartet composed of Edith Shintaku, Amy Sasaki, Shiro Takemoto and Tom Sugimoto sang a special number "We Would Be Building" and Akini Uyeoka vocal soloed "Abide With Me."

Pianist Mary Kasai accompanied both numbers. Rev. Shinpachi Kanow served as chairman of the morning service.

At the Youth Fellowship which was chairmanned by Ruth Hirose, Mrs. Pronko of the St. Louis area for the Committee of Japanese Resettlers emphasized the mission of the Nisei.

"It is very important," she said, "to make the proper impression when we relocate. Each of us has a grave responsibility."

NISEI IN KHAKI

A penciled missive arrived last week from Moore General Hospital. At first glance one might have thought the handwriting, childish.

A closer look, however, showed immediately that each letter was written in a quivering, yet painstaking manner. Inside the envelope was a full page letter; a work of perseverance. It said:

"Pardon me for not writing. As for me, I am OK and recuperating fairly. I am back in U.S.A. Nothing much, not too bad, but I got wounded in action. My right arm is hurt, so I am writing with the left hand."

And then, he continued: "Before I close, please give PFC Tsuyoshi Furukawa a prayer for you'll never see him again."

That letter was the painstaking effort of Clyde K. Kawakami, now convalescing in Swannanoa, North Carolina's Moore General Hospital. He visited last year with Furukawa, and Pvts. Kaoru Yonezawa and Susumu Yoshioka, all of the islands.

Another 100th Infantry man, PFC Noboru Hirasuna of Co. B, writes:

"Yes, I was wounded; got hit on the 5th of November.....not serious of course, but severe enough to have kept me here in the hospital for the past three months. I'll probably stay here until the end of

next month.

"I was fortunate enough to miss the worst part of the Italian campaign, but that's why I feel a little guilty, lying here in comparative safety and comfort of this hospital while up there on the front, my friends and buddies are sacrificing their lives."

Here, is a boy who had already been exposed to fire and had been wounded, and yet he feels "guilty", lying in comparative safety.....recovering.

PFC Mike Enga visited this center last summer, following a six-week period in the hospital. He was given a special leave. When he returned to camp at the end of July, 1943 the 100th Infantry was put on alert.

However, in his case, the doctor, advised another operation and more rest. But Mike begged to go along with the rest. He went.

Three days ago, a letter to a Center resident arrived. It read: "As predicted by the doctors, my leg has again begun to fail. But thinking back to the time I had a chance to remain behind, I can still say I have no regrets.

"Though I may never feel like my old self again, I'm happy I have a part to play in this war."
