

SEGREGATION MAY START AFTER MAY 1

Highlights of Project Director E. E. Whitaker's statement follow:

1. Next segregation movement from Jerome will not take place before April 15 and in all likelihood not before May 1.

2. General transfer of residents remaining in this Center by June 1 will begin after June 3, the closing date of all Center schools.

3. Jerome residents who have not relocated before June 1 will be moved to Rohwer, Granada, Gila, Hoart Mountain and possibly other Relocation centers if more space is needed.

4. Evacuee workers will not be frozen to their jobs to the extent that they could not leave their work when their families move from this project.

"He was particularly pleased with the attitude of the representative evacuees whom he was able to meet in a limited time spent on this project.

"The closing of the Jerome Relocation center was discussed in detail. It is the plan of Secretary of Interior Ickes to move Jerome residents who have not relocated as individuals or families before June 1 to other Relocation centers, in-

7. INSURANCE FEES on parcels are also increased as well as the rate for return receipts, both on Insured and Registered matter.

8. Rates on BOOKS are increased, both individual and library mailing.

9. C. O. D. rates are also increased which will, along with added postage rates, make C.O.D. charges slightly higher.

10. No change has been made in the AIR MAIL rate to Hawaii which remains at 20 cents per half ounce.

11. No change has been made in the rate of third class matter

which includes copies of the TRIBUNE and other matter weighing less than eight ounces. When matter of this class weighs over eight ounces, it must then be mailed at Parcel Post rates.

FURNISHED ON REQUEST

In most all instances the increased rates amount to only a cent or two and a complete list of all changes would be of no assistance in determining the rate applicable to a parcel or to a registered item.

All information, however, is available at the Denson Post Office and will be furnished to patrons when requested.

MAN IS MIGHTIER THAN MATERIEL

Despite the abundance of money, machine and materiel, the trinity of men, might and morale constitutes the deciding factor in war--victor or vanquished, conqueror or conquered.

Mobility and maneuverability also play an important part in waging a victorious war.

Selective Service Director Maj.-Gen. Lewis B. Hershey on March 15 declared that about 1,160,000 men--roughly 700,000 new inductees and 500,000 replacements--must be supplied to the army and navy for the period from February 1 to July 1 to attain the planned strength of 11,300,000 by mid-year.

He estimated that on February 1 the services had about 10,140,000 men.

In a letter to all local boards and appeal panels, he revealed that Selective Service had failed to meet the military draft calls by 100,000 men a month for five consecutive months.

Here is the overall picture of Selective Service:

1. Nearly 1,500,000 men have been reclassified as 1-A. Based on the past rejection rate, fewer than one in three will be acceptable to the armed forces--an optimistic estimate being

2. There are about 3,200,000 in industry, schools and Government classified as 2-A and 2-B. Of 475,000 pre-Pearl Harbor fathers in Government service, deferment has been requested for 190,000. Industrial deferments include more than 1,000,000 non-fathers of whom 380,000 are under 26 years of age.

3. Agricultural deferments amount to 1,700,000, classified as 2-C (deferred solely for farm work) and 3-C (deferred both for farm work and dependency). They include nearly 1,000,000 non-fathers of whom more than 550,000 are under 26.

4. There are 3,485,000 men rejected for physical reasons and classified as 4-F. Constant scrutiny of this category does not indicate that "these constitute a source of potential available men."

5. Rejections which now run from 40 to 60 per cent for physical disability may rise in the coming months due to the selection of thousands with disability who have heretofore been deferred and as they are recalled the percentage of rejections will increase.

6. Approximately 65,000 boys are becoming 18 years of age each month but some 20,000 of these are enlisting before they reach 18. Another source estimated that there are 100,000 youths becoming 18 each month but judging by past standard 40,000 of these will not pass their physical examinations.

7. From 500,000 to 600,000 have been classified as psychoneurotics.

8. As of January 1 there were about 9,000 conscientious objectors--6,500 in public service camps and 2,500 in prison.

9. On January 1 known draft delinquents totalled 12,000.

10. More than 1,200,000 have already been discharged from the armed services.

dum to Selective Service Director General Hershey and War Manpower Commissioner Paul V. McNutt, warning that the armed forces were preparing for "crucial campaigns this year which will determine both the length of this war and its price in men and goods."

Following is the plan for "rationing" Selective Service deferments in order to raise 1,160,000 men or more by July 1:

1. From 1,500,000 reclassified as 1-A 420,000 may be available.
2. From 190,000 Government service deferments 114,000 or 76,000 may be inducted, based on 40% and 60% rejections, respectively.
3. From 380,000 industrial deferments under 26 years of age 228,000 or 152,000 may be fit for military service on the 40-60 per cent rejection basis.
4. From 550,000 agricultural deferments under 26 years 330,000 or 220,000 may be drafted on the rejection percentage standard.
5. Some 110,000 specialized training troops may be removed from the college campuses before April 1 and reassigned to combat service, leaving 35,000 students including 5,000 production students. The 17-year-olds will not be affected.

The A.S.T.P. (Army Special Training Program) was organized December 17, 1942. Soldiers who had come through basic train-

ing and showed special aptitudes in technical subjects were enrolled.

6. From 225,000 18-year-olds, assuming that 45,000 per month will become 18 years during the five-month period from February 1 to July 1, 135,000 or 90,000 may be selected according to the 40-60 per cent rejection basis.

7. About 100,000 17-year-olds who are not quite 18 are expected to enlist, the total being based on 20,000 new inductees per month from this age category during the five-month period from February 1 to July 1.

IS INSTALLED VISITING SERVICE MEN

CHICAGO, Ill. (Special)--Rev. Jitsuo Morikawa, formerly of the Poston Relocation Center, was installed here recently by Pastor Dr. Eric L. Titus as assistant pastor of The First Baptist Church of Chicago before a crowd of more than 100 churchgoers.

This is the first time in the history of the Baptist church in America that a Japanese American has gained this position in a church in which the members are not of Japanese extraction, it is said.

Rev. Morikawa was minister of a Baptist church in Los Angeles and is a graduate of the University of California and of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville, Ky.

He has lived in Chicago for several months and has been connected with the Church Federation of Chicago.

Before the congregation which witnessed the ceremony, Dr. Titus said:

"Democracy in America is a reality only insofar as we are able to live together in cooperation across racial lines.

"This service today is a demonstration of the vitality of the democratic ideal even in time of war.

"It is at a point such as this that the Christian idea of brotherhood and that of democracy come together."

THE MILWAUKEE JOURNAL, Milwaukee, Wis., March 11--Before using some wartime adjective in front of the noun "Jap," read the story of Sgt. Gary Hisacka of the American army in Italy.

Read how he rescued his wounded white major from under the very muzzles of the German guns. Or remember the modest way in which Mike Miyake, another Japanese American from Hawaii, passed off commendation of his bravery in bringing wounded men out of Cassino.

A couple of months ago dispatches from Algiers told of the Japanese American surgeon who labored on and on, without relief, to care for our wounded in spite of his four broken ribs.

Wisconsin has reason to have more than ordinary interest in the outstanding record that is being made by these Japanese in American uniforms, for many of them were trained in this State only about a year ago.

Wisconsin will hope, as the men themselves hope, that the bravery and utter devotion to America of these Japanese Americans will convince the rest of us that a man should be judged on his character and his accomplishment and not on his ancestry, the slant of his eyes or the color of his skin.

No better antidote could be compounded for the potent poisons of war-bred suspicion and racial hatreds.

"YEA Director Dillon S. Myer has assured me that the general transfer of Jerome residents will begin after June 3, the closing date of all Denson schools--Preschool, elementary and secondary.

"The War Relocation Authority has also

given no definite assurance that no evacuation personnel would be frozen to their jobs to the extent that they could not leave their work when their families move from this Center."

Project Director Whiteaker also released the following statement:

"Date of the next segregation movement from Jerome will not take place before April 15 and in all likelihood not before May 1."
