# INDEFINITE LEAVE BASIS IS MODIFIED

Residents of Relocation conters will be eligible to go out on indefinite leave for a trial period of from four tosix months and may secure permission to roturn to the Center at...the end of that period if they find it necessary, according to new regulations of the War Relocation Authority received here today by Pro-ject Director E. B. Whitaker .

Explaining the new regulations, WRA Acting Director Leland Barrows in Washington, said:

"The adoption of this program permitting indefinite leave. on trial basis is an effort on the part of the WRA to meet the needs of those evacuoes who have been uncertain of their ability to makoa success of relocation, and those who have hesitated to leave the Centers without assurance that they could come back in the event they were unable to: make a satisfactory adjustment on the outside.

"They will now be able to take employment on a triel basis and to find out for themselves what conditions are like on outside, with

opening and dedication coremonies of the Conter's new auditorium will bo held on or about April 14, according to Runo E. Arne, assistant project director in charge of ocmmunity management.

An elaborate program for the grand opening is now being arranged by Acting Supervisor Sam Seno of Community Activities and his committee.

The inner dimensions of the new auditorium, built along the socalled barn style, are: Length 100 feet, width 60 feet, ceiling height 20 feet and overall height ·34 feet.

Its total seating capacity is 1,300 spectators--1,000 folding chairs and 300 in the bleacher section which is 75 feet long and 16 feet wide.

The stage is 17' x 36'; the film winding room, 7' x 12'; and the classroom, 16' x 26 \*

It also contains a ticket office, offices for the physical directors of men and the women, looker rooms for men and women, showers, tollet facilities, boiler room and five exits.

## RELOCATION PROCEDURE

Luther T. Hoffman, he d of the Center Litial division, spoke on new precedures of relocation at a joint meeting of this Center's Relocation Executive board, Staff Relocation committee and Relocation Planning commission hold Friday forencen in the Appointed Personnel's Recreation hall in the Administration blook.

Project Director E.B. Whitaker and Acting Relocation Program Officer William C. Love also touched on resettlement, their talks being followed by a relocation forum in which those present participated.

Highlights of the meeting follow:

1. RELOCATION ADVANTAGES -- Relocation is voluntary and so is continued residence in the Centers but relocation offers the relocatees two choices: Establish himself permanently in his new home in the area in

which he has relocated or return to his former home on the West Coast when military restrictions are lifted.

Resottlement is a matter strictly to be decided by the Centor residents themselves but as the result of a survey of the various phases of relocation, changes or modifications have been brought about for the benefit of the residents of each Center.

The object of the WRA is to help and facilitate in making the proper contacts regarding relocation.

2. PRE-RELOCATION FACILITIES -- Relocation advising service is available to every individual or family of the Project at the Relocation office in Barracks 2, Block 36.

Staff of the Rolocation office -- both appointed personnol and evacues -- has been enlarged to give the residents advice on

#### SHOWERS OF APRIL. FLOWERS OF MAY

March hailstorm, rainstorm, thunderstorm and windstorm bring forth April showers and April showers bring forth May flowers anilay flowers bring forth June brides and also the closing of the schools and the Jerome Relocation Center.

The Mayflower brought the Pilgrims to Plymouth Rock in 1620. The Mayflower of the rails brought the evacuees here from the West Coast and the Mayflowers of the sea and land brought the evacuees here from Hawaii.

In May and June the Mayflowers of the railways and highways will transfer the evacuees from this Project to other Centers.

In the European theater, of war operations, however, March rain and mud will bring forth April showers of Laster iron esgs (block busters and block burners) and April showers will bring forth May flowers, (the youth of United Nations: soldiery) and the May flowers may bring forth the June Juggernaut (the much-speculated Western invasion of Germany).

In Burma and along the eastern frontier of India where major operations are being initiated, March rains will bring forth mensoons in April, May and June through mid-October.

With the advent of April and the imminence of the Anglo-American Western invasion, here is what the belligerents are doing: UNITED STATES OF AMERICA:

1. President Franklin Rocsevelb observed that 5,000,000 men will be overseas by July 1.

2. Selective Service has intensified its drive for ablebodied young men, aiming directly at faster induction of men between the ages of 18 and 25 years, inclusive, for combat service.

3. The Army has announced the transfer to ground duty of young men who had 36,000. been earmarked for air training.

4. Whr Manuower Commission and Selective Service officials suggested the possibility that 6,000,000 present and potential 4-F draft registrants will be put into Army work battalions unless they hold essential war or civilian jebs.

5. Informed officials estimated there are at least 40,000 miners under 26, about 25,000 of them in the 22-25 age group.

6. Maj. Gen. Lovis B. Hershey, Selective Service director, said that the Nation has arrived as "the day and hour" when everyone between 18 and 45 who can work, does so.

7. Manpower Chairman Paul V. McNutt gave Government agencies until March 29 to assemble information on the deferment needs of the industries under their jurisdiction to . set in motion the call-up of young workers.



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
