

# INDEFINITE LEAVE BASIS IS MODIFIED

Residents of Relocation centers will be eligible to go out on indefinite leave for a trial period of from four to six months and may secure permission to return to the Center at the end of that period if they find it necessary, according to new regulations of the War Relocation Authority received here today by Project Director E. B. Whitaker.

Explaining the new regulations, WRA Acting Director Ieland Barrows in Washington, said:

"The adoption of this program permitting indefinite leave on trial basis is an effort on the part of the WRA to meet the needs of those evacuees who have been uncertain of their ability to make a success of relocation, and those who have hesitated to leave the Centers without assurance that they could come back in the event they were unable to make a satisfactory adjustment on the outside.

"They will not be able to take employment on a trial basis and to find out for themselves what conditions are like on the outside, with

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the provision that they may secure permission to return to the Center at the end of four months if they find it necessary.

"Applicants must show that indefinite leave for the trial period is a definite step toward permanent relocation. "Individuals and families to whom this (Cont. on page 6)

## RELOCATION PROCEDURE

Luther T. Hoffman, head of the Center Liaison section of the Washington WRA Relocation division, spoke on new procedures of relocation at a joint meeting of this Center's Relocation Executive board, Staff Relocation committee and Relocation Planning commission held Friday forenoon in the Appointed Personnel's Recreation hall in the Administration block.

Project Director E. B. Whitaker and Acting Relocation Program Officer William C. Love also touched on resettlement, their talks being followed by a relocation forum in which those present participated.

Highlights of the meeting follow:

1. RELOCATION ADVANTAGES--Relocation is voluntary and so is continued residence in the Centers but relocation offers the relocatees two choices: Establish himself permanently in his new home in the area in

# AUDITORIUM DEDICATION ON APRIL 14

Official grand opening and dedication ceremonies of the Center's new auditorium will be held on or about April 14, according to Rune E. Arne, assistant project director in charge of community management.

An elaborate program for the grand opening is now being arranged by Acting Supervisor Sam Sene of Community Activities and his committee.

The inner dimensions of the new auditorium, built along the so-called barn style, are: Length 100 feet, width 60 feet, ceiling height 20 feet and overall height 34 feet.

Its total seating capacity is 1,300 spectators--1,000 folding chairs and 300 in the bleacher section which is 75 feet long and 16 feet wide.

The stage is 17' x 36'; the film winding room, 7' x 12'; and the classroom, 16' x 26'

It also contains a ticket office, offices for the physical directors of men and the women, locker rooms for men and women, showers, toilet facilities, boiler room and five exits.

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## SHOWERS OF APRIL, FLOWERS OF MAY

March hailstorm, rainstorm, thunderstorm and windstorm bring forth April showers and April showers bring forth May flowers and May flowers bring forth June brides and also the closing of the schools and the Jerome Relocation Center.

The Mayflower brought the Pilgrims to Plymouth Rock in 1620. The Mayflower of the rails brought the evacuees here from the West Coast and the Mayflowers of the sea and land brought the evacuees here from Hawaii.

In May and June the Mayflowers of the railways and highways will transfer the evacuees from this Project to other Centers.

In the European theater of war operations, however, March rain and mud will bring forth April showers of Lester iron eggs (block busters and block burners) and April showers will bring forth May flowers, (the youth of United Nations' soldiery) and the May flowers may bring forth the June Juggernaut (the much-sSpeculated Western invasion of Germany).

In Burma and along the eastern frontier of India where major operations are being initiated, March rains will bring forth monsoons in April, May and June

through mid-October.

With the advent of April and the imminence of the Anglo-American Western invasion, here is what the belligerents are doing:

UNITED STATES OF AMERICA:

1. President Franklin Roosevelt observed that 5,000,000 men will be overseas by July 1.

2. Selective Service has intensified its drive for able-bodied young men, aiming directly at faster induction of men between the ages of 18 and 25 years, inclusive, for combat service.

3. The Army has announced the transfer to ground duty of 36,000 young men who had been earmarked for air training.

4. War Manpower Commission and Selective Service officials suggested the possibility that 6,000,000 present and potential G-F draft registrants will be put into Army work battalions unless they hold essential war or civilian jobs.

5. Informed officials estimated there are at least 40,000 miners under 26, about 25,000 of them in the 22-25 age group.

6. Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, Selective Service director, said that the Nation has arrived as "the day and hour" when everyone between 18 and 45 who can work, does so.

7. Manpower Chairman Paul V. McNutt gave Government agencies until March 29 to assemble information on the deferment needs of the industries under their jurisdiction to set in motion the call-up of young workers.

### GREAT BRITAIN:

1. The British government established a restricted area approximately 700 miles long and 10 miles in depth along the English Channel invasion coast, eliminated commercial airmail service between Great Britain and the European Continent via Portugal, issued an alert order to yachtsmen and small boat owners to hold themselves in readiness during the next six months and also requested Prime Minister

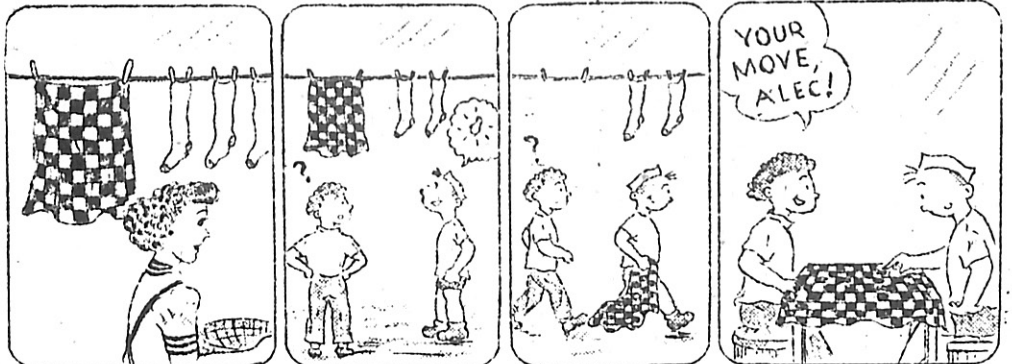

# AVENUES LEADING TO RELOCATION

POCCELLE, Ill.--Caron Spinning Company here needs 10 women between the ages of 25 and 35 for various positions in its spinning mill which manufactures wool yarn. No experience is necessary.

The mill is modern, air-conditioned throughout and very clean.

Wages--50¢ per hour and time and one-half overtime over 40 hours per week for the first two weeks. After two weeks, pay is automatically raised to 60¢ per hour and time and one-half over 40 hours per week; and after six months, one week's vacation with pay is granted.

Hours on duty--48 hours per week. Housing--Cost per room per person will not exceed \$3 per week. House is located about 2½ blocks from the plant and about the same distance from the business district. Medical Attention--Free hospitalization for which no payroll deductions are made.

Bonus plan--3 months, \$5; 4 to 6 months, \$7.50; 7 to 9 months, \$10; 10 to 11 months, \$20; one year, \$40; 2 years, \$50; 3 years, \$60; 4 years, \$70; 5 years, \$75; 6 years, \$80; and 7 years and over, \$85.

About 300 are presently employed by the company and the employees' attitude is favorable.

Kochelle is a town of about 5,000 people. It is located about 90 miles due west of Chicago on the Burlington railroad.

Attorney O. K. Underwood of 617 Barlum Tower, Michigan desired to employ a farming family to work on his farm in Livingston County, located 11 miles from Fowlerville, 7 miles from Howell and 60 miles from the Detroit City Hall.

Acreage--80 acres of farm land--50 acres black muck and 30 acres tillable upland--of which six acres are already under deep plow. If he can secure a good farmer, Mr. Underwood will buy the adjoining 66 acres of land.

Terms--First year the farmer can have all returns. In the second year he can start share-crop basis--percentage to be discussed between owner and tenant. In odd times, his family pick cucumbers, harvest cabbage and do other chores.

Housing--House has living room, dining room, four bedrooms, furnace, kitchen, electric lights and outside toilet. Owner will furnish essential furniture and plan to install bathroom in house in the autumn. There is wood to last a year.

occupation of all Franco from the Seine River to the Pyrenees. Now she has militarily occupied Hungary, Bulgaria and Rumania to establish the so-called Carpathian line in the south.

2. Germany has also occupied the Aaland Islands in the Baltic Sea between Finland and Sweden in the north.

3. In Western Europe the immediate construction of a second Atlantic Wall has been ordered--doubling the 15-mile deep line of defenses along Franco's exposed Atlantic and English Channel and North Sea coastlines.

all types of jobs and facts, figures and forms regarding resettlement.

3. **TEMPORARY TRIPS**--A group of evacuees whose relocation plans have advanced to a mature state may send a representative to the area where settlement is proposed, subject to the provisions on Issuance of Leave, in order to get a personal and first-hand view of the situation on the spot and report back to the group.

4. **JOB OFFERS**--Tord has been sent by the Washington WRA to the relocation officers in the various area to give the Jerome Relocation Center residents priority in job opportunities, offers and consideration.

There are job opportunities outside for qualified residents of this Center. Representative of five employers are due here this week at the local Relocation office to recruit workers.

A teletype just received from Relocation Officer Roger Clapp of the Boston area revealed that he could place 50 workers in industrial and farming jobs immediately.

Clapp also noted that wages offered on interview basis are higher than those offered on "sight unseen" basis.

5. **TYPES OF LEAVES**--They include the short term leave where the relocatee pays his own transportation; the indefinite leave in which the resettler is granted free transportation and \$25 (for families \$25 per person); and the new type of indefinite leave in which the relocatee goes out on indefinite leave for a trial period of from four to six months and may secure permission to return to the Center at the end of that period if they find it necessary.

6. **GROUP RELOCATION**--Group relocation is defined as the "process whereby a number of families of evacuees relocate together in the same general area." It is not limited to farmers but may include all types of employment, business and professions.

WRA will encourage such relocation only when there is community acceptance for the type of settlement pattern contemplated and

the promise of normal adjustment.

Experience has demonstrated that it is difficult to get community acceptance for groups larger than approximately six families.

7. **FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE** -- Citizens who meet requirements are eligible for financial assistance from the local board of the FGA (Farm Security Administration) in the area in which they relocate. Aliens are not eligible for FGA financial assistance.

Depending on their needs, the relocatees are eligible for grants from the local Social Security and Social Welfare agencies. The WRA Community Adjustment Program has been set up in the field to make proper contacts with the local Social Security and Social Welfare agencies. Its function, however, is not to duplicate the work of such Federal social agencies.

8. **SPECIAL CASES**--Fullman accommodations will be furnished for medical cases in relocation.

9. **SHIPMENT OF COMMERCIAL PROPERTY**--Tools and equipment of fixture of an evacuee's trade, business or profession, including farm machinery and equipment, sufficient only for a family-size venture and not more than 5,000 pounds in weight, may be shipped at the expense of the Authority to the point of the evacuee owner's relocation if he requests in writing that such shipment be made, if the Area Relocation Officer certifies it as to priority and availability and if the Project Director approves it.

10. **ESTIMATE**--Relocation can not be judged by the number of people who leave the Center. It is judged by the number of people who establish a permanent dependable future outside the Center by building up contacts with the various organizations and make themselves acceptable to the communities in which they relocate.

P.S. An opinionnaire on relocation has been distributed by the Jerome Relocation Planning commission to obtain a poll of the opinions of the Center residents concerning resettlement prior to the closing of this Project in June.

"Ordinarily, an evacuee getting trial period leave must finance his own transportation.

"Holder of this type leave may secure permission to return to the Center at the end of the four-month trial period but not more than six months after the issuance date of the leave.
