

DEPENDENCY BENEFITS ELUCIDATED

Wives and children of dimes soldiers, as well as parents, brothers, and sisters living in relocation centers, are eligible for servicemen's dependency benefits, it was announced by Project Director E.E. Whitaker.

According to advice received from the Office of Dependency Benefits of the War Department, the families of Japanese American soldiers may apply for all dependency benefits provided for under the Servicemen's Dependency Allowance Act of 1942.

If the recipients of such benefits reside in Relocation centers, no deductions from allowances will be made for subsistence provided by JRA.

Class A dependents, which include wives and children, are eligible for allotments on the basis of dependency and not on actual need. Only proof of marital or parental relationship will be required.

Class B dependents, which include parents, grandparents, brothers, and sisters, may receive allotments only in cases

FASTER EGG-HUNT TOMORROW

In appreciation of the hospitality shown them by the two Arkansas Relocation Centers, members of the 42nd Combat Team of Camp Shelby and their godfather, Earl E. Finch of Hattiesburg, Mississippi have donated 10,000 eggs--5,000 to Jerome and 5,000 to Rohwer--dye, candies and other items.

With the arrival here of the 5,000 eggs, a Center-wide egg-hunt will be held tomorrow at 10:30 a. m. in the open space in Blocks 10 and 22.

Participants in the egg-hunt will be

limited to children between the ages of 3 and 12. They are asked to assemble in the Block 10 field where instructions will be given by Mr. Finch.

Following the egg-ticket hunt, distribution of real dyed eggs and prizes and a program will be held in Hall 23 for the participants.

Moreover, boiled eggs and candies will be distributed to all children under 12 years in each block either on Saturday or Sunday at the convenience of the respective mess halls.

U.S. CITIZENS ELIGIBLE FOR FSA LOANS

American citizen evacuees who relocate are eligible for Farm Security Administration loans on the same basis as other American citizens, according to a recent announcement from the Washington office of JRA.

FSA spokesmen have advised JRA that farm loans are made to citizen relocators in accordance with FSA policies for aiding persons in carrying out their own rehabilitation and in increasing production of the nation's food supply.

Loans to American citizens of any ancestry are made only after eligibility to receive a loan has been established by a County committee.

Among the requirements to be met are verification of an applicant's character, loyalty, and integrity.

In cases where these qualifications are confirmed, the county committee may recommend that loans be granted.

If an applicant's loyalty to the United States is questionable, the Committee may make further in-

SEASON OF EASTER, FLOWER FESTIVAL

Last Sunday was Palm Sunday--the beginning of Holy Week which constitutes the last seven days of Lent. Passion Week preceded Holy Week.

Lent is the great period of fasting in the Christian Church. It begins on Ash Wednesday which comes 40 days previous to Easter Sunday, not counting Sundays.

Yesterday was Maundy Thursday, commemorating the Institution of the Eucharist.

Today is Good Friday, commemorating the day of Christ's crucifixion. It marks the 1915th anniversary of His crucifixion.

Tomorrow is the birthday of the Lord Buddha--the 2,512th anniversary of His birth. It is a day of joy and blessing, the day of Buddha's Flower festival.

The day after tomorrow is Easter Sunday, commemorating the resurrection of Christ.

Easter is the chief festival of the Christian year. Symbols of the Easter season of joy are the Easter colored eggs and Easter Bunnies (hares).

In 325 A.D. the Council of the Christian Churches at Nicea in Asia Minor (present-day Nice or Iznik, in Asiatic Turkey) drew up the Nicene Creed, and also

decided that Easter shall be on the first Sunday following the Paschal Full Moon which happens upon or next after March 21.

The principal reason was that the pilgrims needed moonlight to travel on their way to the great yearly Easter festivities. The date of Easter thus may vary between March 22 and April 25, over a period of 35 days.

Because of this wide fluctuation the British Parliament in 1928 passed a permissive statute with the purpose of bringing Easter within the "orderly scope of a solar measurement of time," determining provisionally that it should be "the first Sunday after the second Saturday in April." This reduces the range of variation less than a week.

Jesus Christ, the founder of Christianity, was born in the reign of the Roman Emperor Tiberius on Christmas Day, December 25, circa 4 B.C. in Bethlehem, near Jerusalem in Palestine.

Soon after His birth, He was taken to Egypt to escape the machinations of King Herod and at the age of 12 He was presented by His mother in the Temple at Jerusalem.

He was baptized by John the Baptist about 26 A.D. and began His career of preaching, healing the sick and instructing a small group of close personal followers.

By the treachery of a disciple, Judas Iscariot, He was betrayed to the authorities and by them sent before Roman Governor Pontius Pilate in 29 A.D. when He was about 33 years of age.

On the third day after His crucifixion on Good Friday His resurrection took place and on the 40th day after His resurrection He ascended to Heaven from the Mount of Olivas, a hill near Jerusalem.

The Lord Buddha or "The Enlightened One" was born on April 8, circa 568 B.C. in Lumbini's garden at Kapilavatsu in Northern India on the border of

Nepal in Southeastern Asia.

An early life of worldly pleasures failed to satisfy His desire to help mankind and at the age of 29 He foresook His own home, wife and child.

After six years of wanderings and privations, He remained to fast and meditate under the Bodhi tree (tree of knowledge) at Buddha-Gaya where He received "the enlightenment." Here He found "the Four Noble Truths" and "the Noble Eight-fold Path."

He then began "turning the wheel of the Law." The Buddha preached his first discourse in a deer park, now called Sarnath, in the suburbs of Benares, when He was 35.

His mission in life for the ensuing 45 years was the teaching of His new religion, Buddhism. He demised on February 15, circa 488 B.C., surrounded by His devoted followers, between two Sala trees at Kusinara. On that day He entered Nirvana or attained Buddhahood.

Jesus Christ was born, crucified and resurrected "to make men free." Lord Buddha was born and entered Nirvana to free men from their sufferings--salvation--and also spread the Truths of Life, Love, Light and Liberty.

Today we are engaged in a globe-girdling war and battles are raging near the birthplace of Buddha on the frontier of India and near Rome, the seat of Christendom, while Palestine, the birthplace of Christ, is under mandate rule.

Thanks to the Four Freedoms, we residents of the Jerome Relocation Center are fortunate--very fortunate, indeed.

Although living thousands of miles distant from the birthplace of Buddha and from the scene of Christ's resurrection, we are able to observe Good Friday today, Buddha's Flower festival tomorrow and Easter Sunday the day after tomorrow.

Speaking on the Four Freedoms, President Franklin Roosevelt has said:

"The Four Freedoms of common humanity are as much elements of man's needs as air and sunlight, bread and salt: Deprived him of all these Freedoms and he dies--deprive him of a part of them and a part of him

withers. Give them to him in full and abundant measure and he will cross the threshold of a new age, the greatest age of man.

"These Freedoms are the rights of men of every creed and every race, wherever they live. This is their heritage, long withheld. We of the United Nations have the power and the man and the will at last to assure man's heritage.

"In the design for a new and better world, religious freedom is a fundamental prop."

In our observance of the Mid-Spring festivities this weekend, however, let us salute the men and women in uniform who are carrying the flag of freedom to the seven seas of the world and who are bearing the torch of tolerance to the four corners of the globe.

HEARINGS HELD IN TULE LAKE

Leave clearance hearings are being held at the Tule Lake Center for those who have not previously been denied leave clearance by the National Director of WRA and who now wish to establish their eligibility for relocation, according to a recent announcement made at the segregation center by Project Director Ray R. Best.

Any person at Tule Lake who has not been denied leave clearance is eligible to request a hearing.

Hearings will be held as rapidly as possible and the recommendations of the Hearing Board and Project Director will be forwarded to Washington for final action by the National Director.

If leave clearance is granted, applicants will be transferred to a relocation center from which they will be eligible for indefinite leave.

Persons who had received leave clearance before segregation and who remained at Tule Lake or were transferred there for family or special reasons, and who now wish to leave the segregation center, will be permitted to make a new application for leave clearance. Such applicants will receive a supplemental hearing before the Hearing Board.

At the same time, it was pointed out that persons who have been denied leave clearance may appeal such decisions.

A special Board of Appeals has been set up to hear such cases and to make recommendations to the Director.

The final decision in each case will be made by the Director and transmitted to the applicant.

PROPERTY TO BE RETURNED

(Cont. from page 1) posed that in those instances where it is found that the owner of such property is presently residing in a War Relocation Center, the property be transmitted to the officer in charge of the particular Project for subsequent delivery to the alien.

At the time such a shipment is made, an itemized inventory will be forwarded to the officer in charge of the Center, with a request that it be receipted and returned to the Special Agent in Charge of the FBI field division which transmitted the property.

On March 23 WRA Director Myer sent the following reply to Mr. Hoover:

"The procedure proposed in your letter for handling the return of such property is entirely satisfactory, and we are advising our Project Directors accordingly."

All decisions regarding allotments and allowances including the degree of dependency and the amount to be allotted will be made by the Office of Dependency Benefits in the War Department and not by WRA.

Government Storage Urged

Due to the fact that several families have stored their property together, the Evacuee Property Office and the Transportation and Warehouse sections have considerable difficulty at times in removing personal property from private storage to government storage, reminded Evacuee Property Officer Gilbert F. Castleberry.

It is difficult at times to identify property in such a manner that would insure property being stored in the right owner's name.

(cont. from page 1) quiry or refer such a case to another Federal agency for investigation.

At the same time, it was announced that while loans to aliens of enemy nationality will not be made, any outstanding loans which have been made to enemy aliens may be continued if the alien meets the licensing requirements of the Treasury department or the Federal Reserve system.

In making this announcement, the Farm Security Administration stressed that the agency's policies regarding loans to citizens are sufficiently clear to cover all cases with justice and to protect applicants from any type of discrimination.

FSA officials added, however, that funds available for FSA loans at the present time are extremely limited in practically all major farming areas of the country.

Further information on farm loans is available at the office of Relocation Program Officer William C. Love in Barracks 2, Block 36.

HOSTEL IN N.Y.

As an aid to family relocation in the Eastern metropolitan area, a hostel with family accommodations for 35 persons will be opened in New York City on or about May 1.

Relocators from the Jerome Center will be given priority in accommodations at the New York hostel.

Reservations must be made at least two weeks in advance through Ayako Noguchi, executive secretary of Relocation Planning Commission and correspondent of the hostels, at the Relocation library at 20-1-A.

花祭の音心義

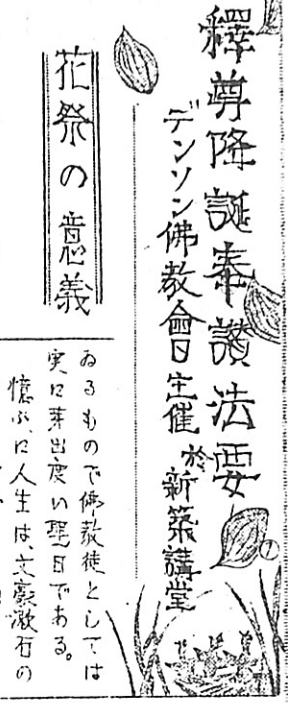
