GOD IS WITH YOU! GOING FOR BROKE!

"Go for Broke" is an American slang peculiar to the Hawaiian Islands--an incorporated territory, an insulate state and an integral part of the United States of America. It has been defined as "give your all," "all out in everything we do," or "shoot the works."

It has been adopted as the official motto of the 442nd Combat Team of the United States Army, made up of American soldier volunteers of Japanese ancestry from Hawaii and the United States mainland.

They are presently at Camp Shelby, Mississippi, engaged in the final phases of military training for combat duty overseas.

A "Liberty Torch" shoulder patch has been adopted for the unit. The patch is an elongated hexagon with a white torch of Liberty on a blue background.

"Go for Broke" cannot be defined. Only an attempt can be made to define it.

It is pidgin English a la "Hawaiianese" (Chinese, Japanese, Portuguese); a la "Hawaiianish" (Danish, English, Irish, Jewish, Polish, Spanish, Swedish, Welsh).

It is English slang a la "Hawaiian" (American, Australian, Austrian, Belgian, Cana-

dian, Czechoslovakian, German, Indian, Italian, Korean, Mexican, Norwegian, Puerto Rican, Russian); a la "Hawaiitoh" (Dutch, French, Scotch); a la Greek and a la Swiss.

It means hook, line, sinker and anchor. It represents give and take in boxing, to do or die in fighting, give everything for charity, mercy and humanity; and emptying the ice-box or frigidaire in entertaining guests.

It is the translation into deeds of the will to do or die, the resolve to have and to hold, the determination to sink or swim and the earnestness and effort to win in the arena of athletics, the stadia of sports and on the field of fighting.

It denotes "no holding back." It signifies "right to the finish" and give everything to fulfill one's assignment--blood and bones, brain and brawn, corpuscles and courage, flesh and faith, heart and hopes, mind and matter, muscles and might, sweat and service, tears and toil, and veins and valor.

The spirit of "Go for Broke" is immeasurable, incalculable and unweighable. No yardstick can measure it. No comptometer can calculate it. No scale can weigh it.

Men of the 442nd Combat Team have the spirit of "Go for Broke." It is their motto. No can not define it but we are able to feel it.

The history of the activation of the 442nd Combat Team has been written and rewritten.

The 100th Infantry which has already achieved an outstanding combat record in the European theater of war operations is larger than a battalion but smaller than a regiment.

The 442nd Combat Team is larger than a regiment but smaller than a brigade. Its organization, according to the Team's Album, includes:

442nd Infantry composed of the Regimental Staff; Regimental 1st, 2nd and 3rd Battalion Headquarters

Traditionally the infantry is the Queen of Battles. But it has more tricks today than in 1918.


Mothers of the infantry may well be proud of the fact that to this battle-honored branch, now come the all-around champions of the Army--the lads with outstanding versatility.

quarters companies; 12 Infantry companies (A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I, K, L, M); Cannon, Anti-Tank and Service companies; Regimental Medical Detachment and Regimental Band.

552nd Field Artillery Battalion comprising the Battalion Headquarters; A, B, C and Service batteries and Medical Detachment.

232nd Combat Engineers made up of the Engineers Staff and Engineers Company.

Chief of Staff Gen. George C. Marshall and Lt. Gen. Lesley J. McNair, commanding general of the Army ground forces, have inspected the Combat Team.

In his article on "Salute the Infantry!" General McNair paid tribute to the foot soldiers, thusly:

"Today we are dedicated to a fight to the finish. Yet despite the public's fascination with the mechanized phase of modern war, we in the service know full well that the finish must come on land--not on the sea or in the air--and that the decisive struggle will be fought by the infantry and its supporting arms and services.

"Fixed defenses like those of Fortress Europe can be taken and held only by the foot soldier.

"We are fighting this war to the finish. And whether he travels to work in a glider or a truck; a jeep, a parachute or a landing craft, that finish will be fought by the infantryman on foot.

"The infantryman has the post of honor. He is in the vanguard. He finds pride and satisfaction in doing, enduring, and giving the most."

He also declared: "The front lines are simply where the infantryman is."

Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, supreme commander of the Anglo-American invasion forces, in his recent address to the cadets at Sandhurst, England--the British West Point--pointed out: "The gruelling ground battle

must be won before the enemy can be crushed."

Col. Roane Waring, formerly national commander of the American Legion, stressed: "Air bombardment will naturally reduce the enemy's effectiveness, but no country can be conquered until the infantry marches in and occupies it, and this will necessitate invasion.

"No military commander can ever count on his enemy's weakness. He must rely upon his own strength."

After his inspection tour of Camp Shelby Assistant Secretary of War John J. McCloy who was instrumental in the organization of the Combat Team, praised:

"The very favorable impression I had of the organization and the good record it has made justify all the efforts which have been made to organize it.

"I came away from Shelby with a feeling of confidence that when its training period is completed and it is committed to action, this element of the Army of the United States will acquit itself with honor and success."

Men of the Combat Team--infantrymen et al "with the dirt behind their ears"--do not ask for what they are fighting nor inquire for whom they are fighting.

Their war cry is "Go for Broke." Their inspiration is "Right or Wrong, My Home--Hawaii whose motto is 'The Life of this Land shall be preserved in Righteousness.'"

Their creed is "Right or Wrong, My Country--the United States of the America of United Races, One Nation, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

"Go for Broke!" Its essence strikes us. We salute the men of the 442nd Combat Team. May God be at your side--here, there and everywhere. May the Lord bless you--now, then and always.

MAKING GOOD IN CLINTON

Following is Staff Writer J. W. McCormick's article which appeared in the February 28th issue of the Clinton Herald, popular daily of Clinton, Iowa:

Seven American-Born Japanese are braving the wrath expressed toward their race on the streets of Clinton.

They are doing their best to prove the falsity of the snap judgment that "a Jap is a Jap."

Everyone of these new Clinton residents of Japanese descent are American citizens. Their loyalty to the Stars and Stripes is unquestioned.

Shirokihi Sasagawa, a U. S. veteran of World War I, is one of the Miei here. He was born in the Hawaiian Islands and moved with his parents to the United States.

He attended American schools and work-

ed on American farms and in American industries up and down the west coast. He is one of those "Jack-of-all-trades" sort of workmen.

He stays at the YMCA where he is "just another one of the boys" in the self-governing dormitory fraternity.

There are five more Japanese-Americans working at Clinton Bridge Works. Three of them are brothers, Melvin, Rocky and Rick Sato.

Melvin is 24, Rocky is 18 and Rick is 17. They are welders and learned their trade at the industrial schools in Des Moines.

They helped their parents operate a farm near Yakima, Wash., before Pearl Harbor. Their parents and a younger brother and sister are still in a relocation camp at Heart Mountain, Wyoming.

"Tell the people of Clinton we are doing everything we know how to do to help win this war for the United States," Melvin, Rocky and Rick chorused. "We are 100 per cent for America and giving 10 per cent for war bonds."

Much the same story was told by Ray Imamura and Key Fujimoto, also employed at the Bridge Works. They have lived under and loved the American flag since birth and like the Sato's were pleased when the war department opened selective service rolls to them.

Bridge Works employees voted overwhelmingly in favor of employing "Miei" in a poll taken before the relocation administration sent any of the workers here.

The only Miei girl in Clinton is 18-year-
