

Leave Action Speeded Up

To speed up the resettlement program, the leave office has been transferred from the west administration building to the Employment office, William O. Melton, assistant Project director, disclosed.

John L. McCormick, head of the Employment and Housing division, is the leave officer with Bob Itanaga and Atsuko Ono as assistants.

Leave procedures have been revised to permit evacuees desiring outside employment to make applications for leave clearance in advance of a definite assurance of a job, Melton said.

The revision was made to cut down the waiting period before release after an evacuee had obtained a position, Melton explained.

Evacuees may still file applications in the Legal department to have property in private storage transferred to central receiving warehouses.

A trust to handle the business and fiscal policies of the Community Enterprises, including five residents and two Caucasians, was appointed recently by Project Director Paul Taylor, announced Wayne Foster, Community Enterprises head.

The five resident trustees are Ryuichi Kurakami, Kaoru Kamikawa, Jiro Omata, Eukichi Shintani and Kan'ichi Komoto. The two Caucasian trustees are James H. Wells, administrative officer, and Wayne Foster.

The five resident trustees were selected from a list of 11 names which was submitted to the Project Director by a committee of

27 delegates representing 27 different blocks.

The duties and obligations of the trust under the Trust instrument are stated as follows:

"1. Legal ownership, with beneficial ownership in the cooperative association.

"3. Be familiar with financial condition of business, and be free to examine books and accounts at any and all times.

"4. To consider at regular trustee meetings any and all matters concerning the business and fiscal policies and conduct of the

Community enterprises owned by the trust, to formulate recommendations in reference to such matters, and to transmit such recommendations to the superintendent of Community Enterprises or to the Project Director, it being understood, however, that under Paragraph 3 of the Declaration of Trust the final decision upon all such matters lies with the Project Director and the superintendent of Community Enterprises during the entire period of the trust's existence, that is, until the business is turned over to the cooperative association which is the beneficiary of the trust."

Paragraph 3, referred to in the foregoing paragraph, states that the management and control of the enterprises shall be in accordance with rules and principles laid down by the WRA.

Funds Made Available for Cripples Here

The U.S. Children's Bureau, working through the Arkansas State Department of Public Welfare, has made federal funds available for the medical, surgical, diagnostic and therapeutic care of the crippled children of the WPA projects of this state.

The Arkansas Public Welfare department defines crippled children as "an

individual less than 21 years of age afflicted with a condition, either congenital or acquired, which is commonly treated by specialists." This applies to all children with acute or chronic orthopedic disabilities, congenital deformities, bone or joint tuberculosis, etc.

A block to block survey is being conducted this

week by the local Public Health and Social Service departments to ascertain the names, ages and afflictions of the crippled children in the Center.

Those who are not contacted at home are asked to report to Amy Furayama or Fred Kobayashi at Ward 14 of the Hospital.

Any service granted the children will be free.

PROFESSIONAL LICENSES

Professional men should obtain information from the legal department on the renewal of their state licenses, advised James H. Wells, administrative officer.

Laws of Arizona, California, Oregon and Washington concerning licensing,

regulations and fees will be explained by the legal department.

Information is available for doctors, accountants, architects, lawyers, barbers, cosmetologists, dentists, nurses, optometrists, osteopaths, pharmacists, chiropodists and midwives.

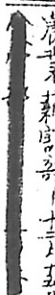
