

NEW TYPE INTERVIEWS CONDUCTED

Another aid to family (and individual) relocation is the new system of interviews conducted by the Project's Relocation division, according to Information Digest No. 63 issued by the Washington office of the War Relocation Authority.

Different from the counselling program provided by the Welfare section at the Centers, the new interviews are designed primarily to provide an opportunity for families to discuss their plans with a member of the Relocation division and determine whether such future plans involve relocation.

The new plan follows:

1. The Relocation division will conduct interviews with evacuees to discover which persons have an active interest in relocation.
 2. If a family is ready to complete relocation plans, the Relocation division will prepare a family relocation summary, including facts on the composition of

Text of the letter sent by Cameron H. King, registrar of voters, City Hall, San Francisco, California to R. B. Cozzens of the San Francisco WRA office follows:

At the request of Mr. H. J. Jepsen of your office, I am stating my understanding of the registration and election laws respecting citizens of Japanese ancestry who have been removed from their California residences to War Relocation Centers.

1. They are citizens. That has been definitely established by recent court

JEROME RELOCATION CENTER'S SEMI-WEEKLY
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WFA TO RECRUIT WORKERS

Evacuees working on seasonal agricultural jobs will be considered as inter-state labor and will work exclusively on contracts negotiated by the War Food Administration, according to a decision made by the Office of Labor of the WFA.

Under the new seasonal work regulations, evacuees will be prohibited from entering into private contracts with farm employers. Instead they will be recruited by the WFA on regular domestic inter-state contracts.

This new policy permits the granting of seasonal leave only for jobs directly related to food production or processing.

decision. Their Japanese ancestry is immaterial.

2. Their permanent residence is the place from which they were required to move by the Army Command as a defense precaution.

3. They have not lost that residence by reason of their removal, because that removal is for temporary purposes.

4. Whether adults or minors, the fact and the law of residence is the same. As for the minors, their residence at the time of removal was the residence of their parents and if

they attain their majority while in the temporary residence of the relocation center, they still retain the right of claiming as their permanent residence the abode from which they, with their parents, were removed.

5. As citizens attaining their majority, they are entitled to exactly the same rights as all other citizens -- the law makes no discrimination against any citizen because of ancestry.

6. The right of citizens of California to register at their

RELOCATION PROGRAM CONTINUES

"May 15 relocation deadline was a deadline of administrative guarantee only -- the date being the last on which any individual could apply for relocation and be sure that the entire transaction could be consummated," stated Relocation Officer William C. Love yesterday.

"It is regrettable that some people got the idea no one could relocate after May 15.

"On the contrary, relocation is WRA's No. 1 program.

"It is the business of the Relocation Division to give every adult in this Center all possible assistance in his relocation plans.

"I hope this work can be continued as long as there is a man in the Center who desires to relocate."

Love repeated that the May 15 "guarantee" deadline was not changed; that his office after that date would be working under several handicaps.

But he insisted that relocation would continue to be possible as long as physical conditions and

Citizens of Japanese ancestry arriving of age while temporarily detained at War Relocation Centers may, therefore, register and vote as "absent voters" from the residences from which they were removed, until they leave the Relocation Centers for new permanent residence.

7. I do not believe any such person can claim a permanent residence for registration and voting in a Relocation Center.

Boys placed in A, B, C order in the Denson "Stork Derby" which began on October 6, 1942 when the first trainload of 202 evacuees arrived at the Jerome Relocation Center from the Santa Anita and Fresno Assembly centers.

First place--Stanley Sunao Miyasaki, son of Mr. and Mrs. Morito Miyasaki (Fowler, Calif.) Born on October 23, 1942 (Friday) at 1:30 p.m. at 16-2-B. Mother and child were attended by Dr. Kikuo H. Taira who weighed the baby boy on his fish scale. Stanley died 23 days later on November 14, 1942.

Second place--Denson Gen Fujikawa, first child of Dr. Y. Fred Fujikawa (Terminal Island, Calif.) and Mrs. Fujikawa (nee Alice Aoki of Sacramento, Calif.) Born on October 23, 1942 (Friday) at 2 p.m. at 7-1-D. Delivery made by Dr. Tom Abe and baby weighed on Dr. Taira's fish scale. Dr. Fujikawa was the first M.D. to arrive in Denson from the Santa Anita hospital. The Fujikawas are presently living in St. Louis, Missouri.

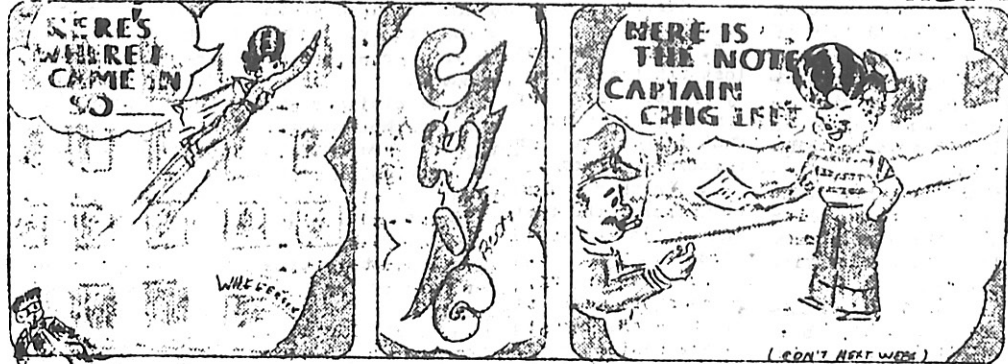

3. Where Relocation officers have extended open community invitations, the community of relocation will be selected at the Center, date of departure set and the Relocation officer notified of the plan through the relocation summary which he will receive one week in advance of an evacuee's arrival.

4. When the Relocation officer has not issued an open invitation for his community, or when an evacuee (or family) is unable to make a decision until he has further information about the community or can be offered a specific job, the summary will be sent to the Relocation officer for him to determine whether there is an opportunity for the resettler in his district.

He cautioned, however, that the day would soon come when there would not be sufficient clerical force in his office to complete the paper work necessary to relocation.

In an earnest appeal for immediate action on the part of those people who would like to relocate rather than transfer to another

Center, he added that other factors might be expected to speed up the actual "deadline" date.

As one of those, he mentioned the possibility that reduction in personnel of the fiscal sections sooner or later will make it impossible for those offices to continue issuance of relocation grants and other financial instruments involved in relocation transactions.

(Cont. from page 2) 1894, he is 50 years old. Reared in Southwest Arkansas, he graduated from Honddrix College at Conway, Arkansas which institution awarded him the degree of Bachelor of Arts.

He also took up post-graduate work in education at the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, Ark., and at George Peabody College, Nashville, Tenn.

He served for 23 months in World War I, remaining overseas for 11 months with the Army of Occupation in Germany until July, 1919.

He devoted 25 years of his life to the cause of education as principal or superintendent of schools.

Mr. Thompson was for many years a member of the American Legion of Arkansas. He organized the Legion post at Amity, Ark. and served as its commander for five years. He was also superintendent of schools there.

Prior to his arrival at the Jerome Relocation Center on October 3, 1942, he was connected for six weeks with the WRA regional office in Little Rock.

Under his principalship the Donson Elementary School has shown a sound development and has won the rating of "A".

A real war veteran and an earnest educator, he well merits the respect and trust of the school children, their parents and relatives, the faculty members, appointed personnel and all residents of the Center.
