

INSTRUCTION ON SEASONAL LEAVE GIVEN

WASHINGTON, D.C. -- WRA National Director, Dillon S. Myer, has issued the following instruction to evacuees on seasonal leave:

This summer many of you will be going out into the farming regions to help produce crops which are vitally needed in the War effort.

The areas into which you are going will in many cases be districts with which you are familiar.

The high type of conduct and good workmanship of evacuees in the past has been responsible for a continuing demand for your services and the good public relations which evacuees now enjoy.

The following information is given in order that you may more clearly understand your status and responsibilities while on seasonal leave and to help you solve problems which arise in your new job:

1. You are working under contract with the War Food Administration, in cooperation with the State Extension Service, which will be responsible for all placement and transfer on the different jobs to which you may be assigned.

The County Agent of the Extension Service will provide you with information as to prevailing wages which you will receive.

2. If you become unemployed or have any justifiable complaint concerning your employment or need medical care or have any other problems, you should take them up with the placement man at the camp or the County Agent of the Extension Service.

SEVEN INDUCTEES ARE ACTIVATED INTO ARMY

Seven inductees of Japanese descent left this Project Wednesday morning for active duty at Camp Robinson, Little Rock, Arkansas. They constitute the first group of residents of the Jerome Relocation Center to be activated into the United States Army since the reinstatement of Selective Service of Nisei was announced on January 20, 1944.

Those activated included: Hiroshi Fujino (Auburn), 44-2-A; George Ishimoto (Clarksburg), 42-5-C; Kazuo Kanai (Newcastle), 4-1-A; Hachiro Kanow (Long Beach), 5-6-F; Izumi William Nakagawa (Bingen, Wash.) 42-12-F; Kiyoshi George Nakagawa (Bingen, Wash.), 46-12-F; and Kay Keizo Otsuji (San Pedro), 3-5-A.

120 PERSONS NEWELL-BOUND

Balance of 126 Tule Lake-bound persons from this Project entrucked from designated places Wednesday morning for the Rohwer Relocation Center where they entrained in the same forenoon for Newell, California. At Rohwer they were joined by about 200 west-bound persons from the neighboring Project.

En route the same train will pick up 140 segregees from Granada for Tule Lake where they are due on the evening of May 21.

Shipment of the

Jerome segregees' checkable baggages to Rohwer was completed Tuesday.

Proceeded by four cars for medical cases the motor cavalcade of nine passenger trucks, including one spare emergency truck, left this Center Wednesday morning a little after the hospital boiler room's whistle blew for the 8 a.m. work call.

Relatives and friends extended best wishes to the departees before they entrucked from designated points in the Project.

From Lake Village the registrants will go to Little Rock for their pre-induction physical examinations. They are asked to report to Mess Hall 35 on Monday at 3:30 a.m. for breakfast and roll call after which they will entruck for Lake Village.

On the one hand, four Nisei from this Project have been notified to report for induction into the Army on Tuesday (May 23) at Little Rock.

They are Masao Larry Hikiiji, Hisanori Hori, Thomas Noboru Nakaoki and Ben Toshihiro Tagami.

These four inductees are asked to report Tuesday at 5 a.m. at Mess Hall 35.

Of the fourth group of 29 registrants who took their "physicals" on May 5 at Little Rock, 12 have been accepted for general service and one for limited service.

AVENUES LEADING TO RELOCATION

ROCHESTER, N.Y. - Excellent opportunities for family relocation are open to evacuees resettling in the industrial city of Rochester, N.Y., according to Harold S. Figue, WRA relocation supervisor for the Middle Atlantic area.

It is the internationally known center for the manufacture of camera, photographic and other goods. The principal crop of its surrounding agricultural area is fruits and vegetables.

Because of its many employment opportunities, favorable community sentiment, excellent educational and recreational facilities and accessibility to the major cities of both the East and Mid-West, the Rochester area is well suited to family resettlement on a permanent basis.

A relocation office was opened in Rochester in April under the supervision of Claude C. Cornwall, formerly relocation program officer and chief of the employment and housing division of the Topaz Relocation center, Utah.

Superintendent Thompson who was also acting chief of Community Services has been the scene for three of this Project's first four marriages. Nicknamed "The Marriage Parlor," it is located at the edge of beautiful Lake Chicot in Lake Village, Arkansas. Lake Chicot is 18 miles long and three-fourth mile wide and its beach is reported to be the burial place of the Spanish explorer, Hernando De Soto (1499-1542). Chicot County was named after the Chicot Indian tribe who frequented Southeast Arkansas and made it one of their favorite hunting grounds.

Month-by-month record of this Project's marriages follows:

SIMPLICITY IS TREND OF CENTER MARRIAGES

Center marriages are marked by their simplicity. Marital vows are exchanged before justices of the peace outside of the Projects or in the presence of church pastors or ministers and relatives within the Center limits.

Elaborate and expensive wedding parties of pre-war and pre-evacuation days which depleted the coffers of both the bridegroom's and bride's households have been restricted or abolished.

Go-betweens have been used in some marital arrangements but in other instances their good offices have not been used.

In the first wedding featuring a resident of the Jerome Relocation Center, Clara Tomono (Long Beach, Calif.) of 8-5-B was married to Cpl. Kerry L. Seno of the Quartermaster Corps, Camp Crowder, Missouri on October 23, 1942 at Lake Village, Arkansas.

The couple was accompanied by Haruko and Kaoru Tagami, Superintendent of Education. Amon G. Thompson drove the party to Lake Village for the marriage which was performed by Justice of Peace H.R. Sessions.

In the first wedding within the Center, Genji Nakata (Delano, Calif.), 45-5-B, and Yoshiye Yamamoto (Delano, Calif.), 45-6-F, were married on December 26, 1942 in an impressive Buddhist ceremony at Hall 45 with Rev. Gyodo Kano officiating.

The bride, daughter of Mrs. Sada Yamamoto, wore a flowered "kimono" and carried a bouquet of pink carnations. Tsurumatsu Nagatani gave her away in marriage.

The go-betweens were Mr. and Mrs. Tsurumatsu Nagatani and Mr. and Mrs. Kwaniohi Renge. A reception followed the ceremony with 150 guests attending.

(Cont. from page 1) sion Service or his labor representative.

3. Permission to travel outside the travel district specified on the seasonal leave card must be obtained from the District Relocation Officer of the War Relocation Authority, and also from the U.S. District Attorney if you are an alien.

Any travel outside the travel district must be fully justified and will be held to an absolute minimum.

Permission to visit your center before completion of your contract will not be given by the Relocation Officer except in case of genuine emergency.

A visit to the center without permission

of the Relocation Officer may result in cancellation of your seasonal leave permit and inability to secure another seasonal leave without prior approval from the Director of WRA.

4. An evacuee who breaks his seasonal leave work contract without the permission of the Government agent in charge of the labor group or the District Relocation Officer will be required to return to the Center at his own expense.

In no instance will permission be given an evacuee to break his Government labor contract to accept private employment unless indefinite leave has been ap-

plied for.

You may convert from seasonal leave to indefinite leave at any time without returning to the Center provided you first secure the approval of the Relocation Officer supervising the territory which includes the community in which you propose to relocate.

Application for indefinite leave should be made to the Relocation Officer supervising the territory in which you are working.

If you did not apply for a leave assistance grant at your center prior to your departure and you are eligible for one, you may apply for such at the same time you apply to the

All applications for shoe stamps must be sent to the Education Office at 33-1-A not later than May 29 (Monday), or they will not be accepted, stated Shoe Clerk Mary Kube.

Applicants must be sure to answer all questions asked on the blanks, except the block marked "For OPA Action Only" and the "Dealer's Statement Concerning Worn Defective Shoes."

Applicants have often failed to answer "No book" on the blank, "War Ration Book Number," and have also failed to give the date on which the application is filled out.

Please note question 40 carefully and fill out according to instructions, giving the number of shoes and listing them on the reverse side, with descriptions.

All blanks not filled out completely will not be accepted.

5. If you are of draft age, you will receive the same consideration for deferment as any other citizen. Each application for deferment is judged on its own merits by the local selective service board.

As a general rule very few deferments are being granted for seasonal farm work at the present time.

6. Most evacuees will find it desirable to keep a daily work record on time worked or the amount of production in case of piece work.

This record should be checked with the employer at regular intervals.

SANITATION HERE LAUDED

Sanitary conditions here have received favorable comment, stated Sanitarian Daniel B. Langford.

In addition to the protection this has afforded to the community's general health, it must be considered a reward for the whole-hearted cooperation of all residents of this Project.

Much credit is due to Assistant Construction Superintendent Bryan S. Stearns, in charge of ground maintenance and the collection of rubbish, as these factors are in a great measure responsible for the satisfactory sanitary conditions.

A vote of thanks is also due to Frank S. Kusumoto and his crew and to Foremen N. Watanabe, Y. Omaschi and K. Masuda and their ground maintenance crews.

Considering the fact that they had to contend with adverse conditions for proper disposal of the rubbish--and collecting rubbish is a disagreeable task--they did the job well.

Evacuees who are resettling in the Chicago area should not contemplate storing any large amount of personal belongings for more than two or three weeks.
