## NOVEMBER PAY RAISED UP; LACK OF CASH

Payment of November wages is being suspended pending the delivery of cash, said James H. Wells, administrative officer.

Cooperation on the part of the workers will be appreciated, he said.

## PAY RAISES CLARIFIED

To clear up misunderstanding in regards to reclassification, the administration released the following excerpt from WRA instructions:

"The cash compensation of an evacuee employee for a monthly pay period shall be established at the rate in which he was classified at the beginning of the pay period. A change in classification shall become effective only at the beginning of the pay period following the date of reclassification."

The following example was cited by the administration: If a worker gets a raise on Dec. 10, his salary for December will not be affected. The raise will go into effect in the Fiscal department the first of the following month.

It has been found necessary for bookkeeping mechanical purposes to handle all pay increases on the monthly basis.

Answering the administration's call for 300 to 700 more men for the wood cutting detail, 37 men signed up yesterday, it was announced.

These men were terminated from less essential jobs to augment the crews engaged in the vital fuel wood division.

Paul A. Taylor, Project Director, expressed his satisfaction of the sign-up and declared if volunteers continue to come in at the present rate, the critical wood situation would be solved in a short time.

## RECORD SURVEY AIDS JOB HUNT

To meet the increased demand for Center workers for outside employment, eight additional interviewers have been assigned to the Occupational Classification

and records section to complete the individual record survey now being conducted within the Center.

This Form WRA-26 will be an important factor in securing permits for student relocation or outside employment, said Robert A. Allison, acting occupational coding officer.

"It is the wish of the government to have a fingertip knowledge of the eligible manpower within the Center at all times," he said, "and it is of utmost importance that the residents give their fullest cooperation in this compilation."

The survey will not only serve as a complete family history but will help to adjust the people to jobs for which they are best fitted in the eventual resettlement of the evacuees.

**W.R.A. MINIMUM STANDARDS OF EMPLOYMENT EXPLAINED**

To clarify misunderstandings arising from youths of school age receiving work termination papers, Placement Officer William C. Love refers residents to the W.R.A. minimum standards of employment.

In hazardous occupations, 18 is the minimum age of employment. At the present time, sawmilling, logging and wood cutting have been declared hazardous by the Chief of the Children's bureau in Washington, D. C.

Children 14 years old

may be employed in non-hazardous jobs but children attending school cannot be employed during school hours.

Maximum hours of work for minors under 18 is 8 hours a day and 40 hours a week. The work week is not to exceed 6 days.

A minor under 18 may not be employed between the hours of 9 p.m. and 6 a.m.

A physician must give persons under 18 a physical examination before they will be allowed to accept vocational training work requiring physical exertion.

These requirements, which were drawn up in cooperation with the Children's bureau of the U.S. Department of Labor, calls for standards to be at least as high as those required by labor laws in the state in which the Project is located.

**Center Department Store Set To Open in Hall 35 Next Week**

A Community Enterprises department store, complete with dry goods, shoe and stationery and school supplies departments, will open next week in Hall 35,

announced Tadao Masuda, co-manager of the dry goods and shoe department.

Wearing apparel to be sold in the dry goods department includes ladies' sweaters, gloves and mittens, men, women and children's bathrobes, babies' knitted caps, cotton stockings and men and women's underwear.

"We'll also have flannel. The people have been waiting a long time for it to make pajamas and nightgowns," Masuda said.

Masuda and Frank Hiroyasu will be co-managers of the dry goods and shoe department with Dorothy Masuda, Sue Takayama and Duichi Ishigami assisting.

Ray Takayama, manager, and Ruby Hirota, clerk, will be in charge of the stationery and school supplies department.

When the Center schools open, school supplies will be sold in stores to be located in the school blocks, according to Takayama.

**ALL RESIDENTS MUST HAVE I.D. NUMBERS**

Residents who have not yet been assigned their I.D. numbers are requested to obtain them from James S. Hancock, Office services head, in the west administration building.

This is not only required to differentiate between persons with similar names but to serve as identification for various matters such as payrolls and employment, it was stated.

"The aim of the garage," said Fred McCain, motor pool and repair chief, "is to keep transportation fa-

cilities in safe and dependable condition and operate as economically as possible."

Besides repair work, there will be a painting and washing department and a lubrication division.

McCain also announced that plans are being made to add a blacksmith shop.

At present there are 18 skilled mechanics, 4 part-division clerks and 2 bookkeepers employed. Frank Hirata is service manager and Hank Tashima, shop foreman.

## Blocks To Get Lanterns

Block managers will be in charge of the 24 lanterns allotted to each block to be used, John McCormick, Housing and Employment head, stated, only during emergencies such as are caused by electrical storms.

The lanterns provide more illumination and are safer than the candles previously used.

## Post Office Issues Rules

The following instructions were issued by the Post Office to facilitate holiday mail service:

✂ No Christmas card going for one and a half cents may contain any written message or be sealed. Any Japanese writing, including the customary inscription "kinga shinnen" (happy new year) will necessitate three cent postage.

✂ All outgoing mail and packages should bear the name and return address of the sender. Messages should not be enclosed in parcel post packages.

✂ Breakable articles must be marked as fragile, packed well and insured whenever possible.

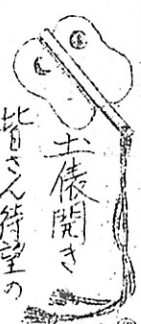

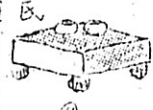
