Delivery will be made in the canteen from 5 to 6

PROCEDURE FOR CASHING PAYCHECKS EXPLAINED

Paychecks for Santa Anitans who left prior to Oct. 16 have been received here. A number of checks for ex-Fresno workers have also been delivered.

Persons eligible for paychecks must obtain them within five days after they are received here. If the payee is on leave, the check may be held for 16 days.

Delivered only to the payee in person, checks are being distributed from the north window in the local Post office between 10 a.m. and noon daily.

Government paychecks may be cashed in the following manner:

Deliver endorsed check to your block manager and obtain receipt. Check will be delivered to Agent Cashier who will give block manager a receipt. Cash will be secured and delivered to payee within specified time.
