

RULES ISSUED FOR FUEL CRISIS

The Emergency Wood committee at its meeting held Wednesday afternoon issued the following rules:

- 1. This Committee shall determine the length of this emergency period.
- 2. All available wagons shall be distributed equally to the blocks.
- 3. Distribution of any surplus wagons shall be by lot.
- 4. Trucks shall not be assigned to any particular blocks but shall be available to any block that has a load ready for hauling.
- 5. All other transportation facilities not au-

thorized by this Committee shall not be used. This applies to tractors and trucks used in other essential work in the Center.

● 6. The park area and the six-man woodcutting team section have been designated as prohibited to woodcutting by the individual blocks.

● 7. Blocks that use any hauling facilities on a day not assigned to them as per schedule (see hauling schedule listed on the bottom of this page) shall forfeit the use of hauling facilities for one day following such violations.

● 8. A daily assignment of wagons will be issued by the Committee. Such orders will be given to the block managers a day previous.

● 9. All block managers shall be held responsible for adherence to these regulations by the residents of their blocks.

The foregoing rules have been approved by the administration, the Community council and the block managers. The rules are subject to change and all such changes will be transmitted to the block managers prior to their taking effect.

Emergency Called by Council, Block Managers

The Center-wide call, which began Monday, of all non-essential workers to out and haul fuel wood, resulted from an emergency meeting of the Council, block managers and the administration last Friday afternoon.

W. O. Melton expressed

his concern over the critical shortage of fuel wood and stated the administration's willingness to cooperate with the residents in this emergency which was

THE KEY

COOPERATION

The solution of the wood crisis depends a great deal upon the cooperation of the Center residents, the Wood committee said, therefore it is the express wish of the Committee that any problem arising from the wood situation be presented to the group for consideration.

The Wood committee also requested that the following precautions be taken:

● Do not trot mules at any time since this is injurious to the animals' hoofs.

● Do not carry people on a loaded wagon unless absolutely necessary.

● Rest the mules from time to time when the haul is long and difficult.

● Do not, for any reason, cut trees outside the Project boundary.

● Try to give the right-of-way to the construction company's vehicles at all times.

● Pedestrians also are requested to use roads other than the construction company's road at the east end of the Center leading to the sewage plant.

also a tremendous burden on the administration.

The present Wood committee was appointed, being granted power and authority to confer with the administration to arrive at the most feasible method of alleviating the present shortage of fuel.

SHARE!

The Wood committee has decided that every block shall contribute some of their fuel wood to Blocks 38 and 39, now inhabited by evacuees from Hawaii.

NEW AREA

The Wood committee has allocated, by lot, a frontage of 200 feet to each block of the wooded area in the northeast part of the Project.

MEMBERSHIP LIST OF WOOD COMMITTEE

HAULING FACILITIES SCHEDULE LISTED

The Wood committee has drawn up the following schedule of hauling facilities available to blocks. A penalty of loss of one day's hauling privileges is faced by any block that violates this schedule.

On Monday, Wednesday and Friday, the following blocks will have hauling facilities assigned to them: 1, 2, 4, 6, 8, 11, 14, 15, 16, 18, 19, 30, 31, 35 and 45.

Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday are reserved for the following blocks: 3, 5, 7, 9, 12, 17, 20, 28, 29, 32, 40, 41, 42, 43, 44 and 46.

Blocks 38 and 39, jointly, will use one wagon daily.

5 CARLOADS

Gypsum Boards

Five more carloads of gypsum boards were received and distributed to the various blocks this week, said L. E. Rice, assistant farm superintendent.

Only the end apartments of each barrack are still being supplied with the boards, he added.

LEAVE FORWARDING ADDRESS WITH P.O.

ARKANSAS STATUTES

Season Closed Now To All Hunting

The following laws governing wild game hunting and possession of estray animals were quoted from the Statutes of Arkansas by Rene Miyake, legal aid assistant:

"It will be unlawful for any person to hunt, chase, shoot, wound, kill or possess in Arkansas any squirrels except during open season for killing squirrels between May 15 and June 15 and Oct. 1 to Jan. 1. Violator will be guilty of misdemeanor and fined not less than \$10 and not more than \$200.

"It will be unlawful for any person to kill deer

in Arkansas outside open season. Violator will be guilty of misdemeanor and fined not less than \$50 and not more than \$300.

"Anyone has a right to take into his custody such domestic animals as he may find running at large with owner unknown.

"No person shall take meat cattle, hogs or sheep running the range or unless the same shall be found within their enclosure from April 1 to Nov. 1.

"Finders of estray animals will report same to office of county clerk in which animal is found. Finder may search for owner or advertise to locate owner. He may receive just compensation for his trouble. Violator of above statute will be guilty of misdemeanor and fined not less than \$5 and not more than \$50.

"Penalty for selling or disposing estray animals taken as estray will be a fine of not less than one-half and not more than double the appraised value of such estray animal so taken up."

TRACTORS, TRUCKS, MUDBOATS, MULES, WAGONS USED IN HAULING

"This effort is by far the best attempt made by the people in solving the fuel wood shortage," said Orren L. Hays in commenting on the present emergency program.

A total of three cater-

pillar tractors and nine mudboats as well as 32 wagons and as many mule teams are being used in the all-out wood drive, he said.

Each block is now being supplied with two mule teams or trucks every other day.

There are 15 stake body trucks being used to haul out wood.

Fine work is being done by Fred Kunishige, truck dispatcher, in directing the motor traffic near the sewage plant, said Hays.

"The evacuee wood committee appointed by the Council and the block managers is doing a splendid job in meeting the critical situation," he concluded.

Hays, who is head of the Transportation and Supply division, together with Public Works Director Guy B. Smith and W. H. Ballard, Agricultural supervisor, are the Administration representatives on the Center Wood committee.

Whitaker Says

'GOOD GOING'

E. B. Whitaker, Regional WRA Director at Little Rock, was in the Center yesterday afternoon on a routine inspection trip.

MEDICAL STAFF SENDS MEN TO WOOD CREW

Only a skeleton crew of the medical staff is left to operate the Center Hospital as they are doing their share in the present woodchopping program, announced the Hospital administration.

These men will continue to aid in the wood effort until the emergency is lifted.

HAWAIIANS MAY GET NEW CLOTHES MADE

First preference will be given to the newly inducted Hawaiian families in having new garments made in the Clothing Alteration department, said Community Activities Supervisor G. F. Castleberry.

This is to relieve the immediate clothing needs of the former Islanders who are unaccustomed to the winter weather of the inland states, he explained.

BLOCKS OF CENTER DIVIDED INTO SIX DISTRICTS

The six districts of the Center are comprised of the following blocks:

DISTRICT 1; Blocks 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5.

DISTRICT 2; Blocks 6, 7, 8, 17 and 18.

DISTRICT 3; Blocks 9, 11, 12, 14 and 15.

DISTRICT 4; Blocks 16, 19, 20, 29 and 30.

DISTRICT 5; Blocks 31, 32, 41, 42 and 43.

DISTRICT 6; Blocks 44, 45, 46, 38 and 28.

A new district is contemplated to include the two latest blocks, 38 and 39. The Block 38 now listed in District 6 is the present Block 35.
