All those with interned family members are asked to attend tonight. Major Masahide Inai (Salvation army), Seiichi Mikami and others of the Social service office will be there to interpret these new regulations.

READY MARKET ASSURED FOR ALL FARM MACHINERY, CARS

Evacuees who left used farm equipment or automobiles in storage last year can find a ready market for them at fair prices, according to a statement received yesterday by Project Director Paul A. Taylor from Russell T. Robinson, chief of WRA's Evacuee Property office of San Francisco.

The serious manpower shortage in agriculture and a sharp curtailment in the manufacture of new farm machinery make it imperative

that all used farm equipment be made available for this year's food production, Taylor was advised.

Summarizing the need for such equipment during the coming crop seasons, the Evacuee Property office pointed out that great strides have been made in producing machinery for the war program and that much more efficient farm equipment will be made after the war.

"Farm machinery now in storage is not only badly needed this year," Robinson said, "but it is also becoming less valuable through lack of use and because of the greater efficiency of new equipment which will be produced hereafter."

Many of the questions asked Consul Garay were not within his jurisdiction and were answered by E. B. Whitaker, regional WRA director, and Paul A. Taylor, Project director.

In an interview with the COMMUNIQUE, Garay said that any problem dealing with a Japanese national may be referred to him or to the Spanish embassy in Washington, D.C.

SIXTY MORE COLLEGES CLEARED FOR STUDENT RELOCATION

Sixty more colleges and universities have been cleared by both the Army and Navy for student relocation.

The list includes American university, Bryn Mawr, Boston university, Detroit university, Fordham, Holy Cross, the New School for Social Research and the Rochdale institute.

Another list of twenty names has been submitted to the War department for

clearance. Forty-five students have been cleared from the 10 relocation centers since Dec. 15, enabling them to enroll for second semesters. Of this number, 34 have been cleared since Christmas.

Others have been given leave clearance but cannot be released until their records are received from the West Coast committee of the National Student Relocation council.

(continued from page 1) nation's welfare; the greatest values can be realized by putting all used farm machinery and automotive equipment now in storage into essential services as soon as possible."

Evacuees having farm equipment or automobiles in storage and who desire to dispose of them are requested to write to the Evacuee Property office, War Relocation authority, Whitcomb Hotel building, San Francisco, Calif.

It is particularly important that the letter state the exact location of the equipment, the make,

model, age and condition.

The evacuee is also asked to state what he considers a reasonable price and should indicate whether he has clear title to the property.

If another person has a lien or mortgage on the property, his name should be given and the amount of the lien or mortgage also stated.

No charge is made for the services of the Division of Evacuee Property which will attempt to bring the evacuee's property to the attention of interested and reliable purchasers.

Beauty Is Not Only Bark Deep

There is beauty hidden under the rough bark of the gnarled roots that protrude from the numerous trees which surround this Center.

This is evidenced at the exhibit featuring novel tree roots, in Dining Hall 42.

No two shaven tree roots are similar. Each has its individual design and shape. Some are of smooth white persimmon, others come in rough moire patterns. Most common is multi-colored oak tree roots.

One unusual object is a beautiful spiral form which

is the result of poison ivy entwining itself around a young hickory root.

Pin cushion stands, toothpick holders, ash trays, plaques and numerous other useful as well as decorative objects can be made from these vari-shaped roots nurtured by nature.

Flower stands are the most common objective of tree-root enthusiasts who will brave even the winter cold and the possibility of getting lost in the dense growth of their hunting ground to pursue this hobby. --TO

RESETTLEMENT NEW PLAN BEING TRIED

MANZANAR—With the release of a group of evacuees to eastern and mid-western localities, a new and promising experiment is being tried whereby religious groups will provide living quarters and maintenance for the Japanese until jobs are found.

The advantage of this plan allows the WRA to introduce evacuees to localities where there is employment. It also gives the worker an opportunity to make applications for work in person.

The Washington office is closely watching the experiment as further usage of the plan will depend upon the success of the first group.

"The plan is particularly hopeful for the placement of men with skills or profession," said Walter A. Heath, director of Manzanar relocation center.

Maw told Associated Press reporters last week that Japanese-Americans at the Central Utah (Topaz) relocation center are "pioneering a project--not living the life of Riley, and they're not being pampered," in answer to prevalent rumors that the evacuated Japanese

were being coddled.

"It's not a luxury when six persons of a family live in a single room. I found that those thousands are not getting more than their share of coffee, sugar, meat or any other commodity," Maw told reporters. He said the attitude of the 8500 in the new town was "very good."
