READY MARKET ASSURED FOR ALL FARM MACHINERY. CARS

Evacuees who left used farm equipment or automobiles in storage last year can find a ready market for them at fair prices, according to a statement received yesterday by Project Director Paul A. Taylor from Russell T. Robinson, chief of WRA's Evacues Property office of San Francisco.

The serious manpower shortage in agriculture and a sharp ourtailment in the manufacture of new farm machinery make it imperative that all used equipment be made available for this year's food production, Taylor vas advised.

Summarizing the need for such equipment during the coming grop seasons, the Evacues Property office pointed out that great strides have been made in producing machinery for the war program and that much more efficient farm equipment will be made after the

"Farm machinery now in storage is not only badly needed this year," Robinson said, "but it is also becoming less valuable through lack of use and because of the greater efficiency of new equipment which will be produced hereafter.
