U.S. ARMY TEAM ARRIVES TO BEGIN COMBAT UNIT SIGNUP

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Following is the text of a letter received by the Honorable Henry L. Stimson, Secretary of War, from the President:

February 1, 1943

"My dear Mr. Secretary:

"The proposal of the War Department to organize a combat toam consisting of loyal American citizens of Japanese descent has my full approval. The new combat team will add to the nearly five thousand loyal Americans of Japanese ancestry who are already serving in the armed forces of our country.

"This is a natural and logical step toward the reinstitution of the Solective Service procedures which were temporarily disrupted by the evacuation

from the West Coast.

"No loyal citizen of the United States should be denied the democratic right to exercise the responsibilities of his citizenship, regardless of his ancestry. The principle on which this country was founded and by which it has always been governed is that Americanism is a matter of the mind and heart; Americanism is not, and never was, a matter of race or ancestry. A good American is one who is loyal to this country and to our creed of liberty and democracy. Every loyal American citizen should be given the opportunity to serve this country wherever his skills will make the greatest contribution-whether it be in the ranks of our armed forces, war production, agriculture, government service, or other work essential to the war effort.

"I am glad to observe that the Nar Department, Department, the Mar Manpower Commission, the Mavy the Department of Justice, and the Mar Relocation Authority are collaborating in a program which will assure the opportunity for all loyal Americans, including Americans of Japanese ancestry, to serve their country at a time when the fullest and wisest use of our manpower is all-important to the war

effort.

Taylor Voices Gratification

Addressing a meeting of the Center's appointed persomel this afternoon, Project Director Paul A. Taylor expressed his personal gratification over Secretary Stimson's announcement that loyal nisei will be given an opportunity to serve in the Army.

He agreed with Dillon S. Myer, national WRA director, that the announcement had made Jan. 23 the most significant date of the past 10 months for persons of Japanese ancestry in the

United States.

He called attention to the fact that the President has given his full approval to organization of the announced combat team. (The President's statement is in the adjoining column.)

· The meeting was called as part of a two-day Centerwide educational program planned to familiarize each resident with all of the facts concerning the registration, which will probably begin Tuesday or Wednesday.

Details On: VOLUNTEER COMBAT

Further details concerning the establishment of the Army combat team composed of American citizens of Japanese ancestry were announced by the War Department.

All American citizens of Japanese ancestry whose loyalty has been satisfactorily established, who are 18 years of age and not over 37, who meet physical requirements for general military service, and who speak English, are eligible for the combat team. Representatives of Japanese ancestry, to the extent that of the War Department will shortly ar- men with the requisite military experible for the combat team. Representatives rive at each relocation center to explain the program in detail and to receive applications for voluntary induction from . individuals residing there.

American citizens of Japanese ancestry

who are not residents of War Relocation centers should make application for voluntary induction through their local Selective Service boards.

The combat team, to which qualified volunteers will be assigned, will have the customary infantry, artillery, engineer, and medical components, and will be trained for combat service in an active theatre. The registration, Taylor said, will be Center-wide including all persons 17 and older excepting those who have requested repatriation. He made . it clear that the War Relocation authority is not going to force people to relocate when they do not want to be relocated. But ho pointed to the registration as an opportunity for greatly accelerating leave clearance program.

At the time it became known that the War Department would make the registretion of draft-age nisei men, it was decided by the VRA to include all adults in the registration, he

explained.

"Not only will it speed up or clearance procedure,"
Taylor added, "but it will

Just three days before the Pearl Harbor attack, Yoshihata entered the U.S. Army and was stationed at Camp Roberts. After 13 weeks of basic training. he was transferred to Camp Robinson for four months.

Transforred to Camp Savage for Military Intelligence service in April, 1942, he was graduated Nov. 31, 1942. Since his grad-uation, he has been stationed at Washington, D.C., from where he was ordered to accompany the Army team to this Center.
