REGISTRATION CONTINUES; QUESTIONS CLARIFIED

Registration of all evacuees 17 and older and enlistment of volunteers for the Japanese American combat team continued in the various dining halls on schedule with but one exception.

Blocks 1, 2 and 3, originally slated to register last Tuesday, will hold their signup Monday. This delay was caused because enough forms were not available.

Misunderstandings have arisen in regard to the wording and meaning of questions 27 and 28 in Form 301A which should be filled out by male American citizens over 17 years of age.

The questions are:

27) Are you willing to serve in the armed forces of the United States on combat duty, wherever assigned?

28) Will you swear unqualified allegiance to the United States of America and faithfully defend the United States from any or all attack by foreign or domestic forces, and forswear any form of allegiance or obedience to the Japanese emperor, or any other foreign government, power, or organization?

are asked to fill out Form 126, the application for leave clearance. The WRA is not going to force people to relocate when they do not want to be resettled, Project Director Paul A. Taylor reiterated.

Any group which wants questions answered are invited to hold a meeting at which persons qualified to answer the questions will be supplied if requested, Taylor concluded.

Japanese translations of all three forms will be posted today in the various dining halls.

TEAM WILL SPEAK

The Army team will be at Dining Hall 33 during the regular adult forum hour at 7:30 p.m. Monday to answer questions on the registration.

WRA OPENS FIELD OFFICES

A network of relocation offices and field stations in the Midwest and Rocky Mountain areas, to aid these in relocation centers in obtaining outside employment, is rapidly being organized after a series of conferences in Chicago and Washington last month.

In attendance at the Chicago conferences, under the leadership of Employment Chief Thomas Holland, were staff and field members of the WRA employment personnel, United States Employment service officials and various citizen groups cooperating with the WRA in the relocation program.

Five principal relocation offices are now open in Salt Lake City, Denver, Kansas City, Chicago and Cleveland, respectively.

Each office is to be responsible for the establishment and operation of from 8 to 12 subsidiary field stations. These offices will have the dual function of seeking employment offers and of aiding the workers to adjust themselves to conditions in the communities where they are placed.

SERVICEMEN ADD COLOR TO CENTER

Adding color and military stateliness to an otherwise monotonous community picture are the young men in khaki who come to visit the Center from army posts all over the country.

These nisei soldiers are a part of the 5,000 Japanese American citizens already serving in the armed forces of the United States.

The servicemen usually come to visit their families, relatives and friends who reside in this Center.

During the past four months, more than 350 soldiers have visited the Center, not including the men stationed at Camp Joseph

T. Robinson, Ark. Including the regular weekend visitors from Robinson, some 500 passes have been issued to the soldiers with the greatest influx occurring during the Christmas holidays.

The ranks of the nisei in olive drab who have visited the Project range from privates to sergeants, with Lieut. Young Kim of Fort Banning, Cal., the only visitor with higher rank.

Their furloughs usually average 10 days in the Center while others from nearby Army posts visit on three-day passes. Still others from Camp Robinson frequently make one-day excursions here on Sundays.

Nisei Living Outside of Centers May Volunteer for Combat Unit

American citizens of Japanese ancestry who are between the ages of 18 and 38 and who live outside the centers may volunteer for active service in the United States Army by applying at the nearest local draft board, according to instructions issued by national headquarters of the Selective Service system and mailed to draft boards throughout the country.

Former Fresno Woman Dies of Arthritis

Mrs. Hamitaro Yokoyama, 53, of 29-A-C died of chronic arthritis on Saturday at 7:35 a.m. at the Center Hospital.

She is survived by her husband. She was formerly of Fresno, Calif.

The instructions make reference to the announcement here last week that a combat team composed entirely of United States citizens of Japanese extraction or parentage is to be formed for active service in a theatre of war. Volunteers for this team, it is announced, must have been born in the United States or its Territories and be able to speak English.

A special form entitled "Statement of United States Citizen of Japanese Ancestry," (Form 304-A), will be used by local draft boards in accepting applications from those who wish to volunteer for the special combat team. This form will also be used by the Army representatives who are scheduled to start receiving such applications at the ten relocation centers this week.

Employment Chief Holland has announced a determination, on the part of the employment divisions, to find acceptable work opportunities for as many relocation center residents as can qualify for them. "The action of the War Department in opening military service for draft-age nisei," he said, "has been our signal to make available to every loyal person in the centers an opportunity to serve the cause of American democracy, either in the Army or on the production front, and to prove his title to enjoy all the rights and privileges that America has to offer. We are not planning to find merely stop-gap and emergency jobs for people who desire work, but employment of the highest order that they are qualified to fill. I sincerely hope and believe that every man and woman in the relocation centers, who can be properly qualified for outside employment, will cooperate with us in our effort to make this program an outstanding success."

As a step to expedite the program in the relocation centers, every man and woman, 17 years of age or older, will fill out a special WRA questionnaire to be used in clearance procedures and classification for outside employment. This registration will begin about the middle of February, and will be conducted simultaneously with the completing of military questionnaires by draft-age nisei men. Men eligible for military service will not be asked to answer the WRA questionnaire, since the military questionnaire will be used in clearing them for outside employment if they are not inducted into the army.

Clearances are to be speeded, both at the centers and in Washington, to amplify as rapidly as possible the register of workers qualified for indefinite leaves.

(This is the first in a series of stories on the Army combat team which will run in question and answer form in the COMMUNIQUE.)

1. Where will we fight?
 - A. You will be employed wherever your government and the Army of the United States thinks you should be sent. No other promise than that can be given to an American soldier. However, it is not the intention to use you against the Japanese.
2. Is the formation of a Japanese American combat team a type of segregation?
 - A. The organization of your men into a separate combat team is not segregation. It is the means of making the most effective use of your strength for the good of the national war effort and for the ultimate good of all Japanese Americans. There will be other Japanese Americans taken into the Army and they will be assigned in the same way as any other American soldier. The organization of a separate Japanese American combat team has the distinct and very definite advantage and value of bringing the Japanese American question to the attention of the American public and to establish their position as loyal American citizens.
3. What will happen to Japanese Americans already in the military service?
 - A. Some will be assigned as cadres for the combat team. The others will continue in their present duties or be reassigned as the circumstances warrant.
4. Will our candidates be sent to the regular officers' candidate schools, or will they train separately?
 - A. They will go in the same way, and be given the same training, as any other candidate.
5. What about the Japanese Americans who already are reserve officers but have not been called into active service?
 - A. As they are needed, they will be called, provided they are deemed to be qualified for the work at hand. (It needs to be remembered, however, that there are many reserve officers in all groups which have not been called into active service.)
6. Will all Japanese Americans in the Army be formed into the combat team?
 - A. No, they will not. The combat team is an exceptional organization. Others may be taken into the Army and will be given assignments on the same basis as other American soldiers.
7. Will the combat team be officered by Americans of Japanese blood throughout?
 - A. It is contemplated that at first, your regimental, battalion and company commanders will not be Japanese Americans because of the lack of men who have had training and experience with the higher commands, but that your other company officers will be Japanese Americans insofar as it is possible to supply those who have had the proper training. As Japanese American officers prove themselves qualified for higher command, they will be advanced in grade.
8. What will happen to those who volunteer for service but are turned down for physical reasons? Will they be returned to the Relocation Centers?
 - A. If the loyalty check shows that they have the interest of the United States at heart, they will be given the chance to work in the defense plants. The government cannot promise to find work for you. In some of the plants there is still prejudice against employing Americans of Japanese blood. But skilled workers are needed and the news of the formation of a combat team from among your number will do much to counteract the prejudice already referred to.

Hoop Games To Be in Center

Plans to commence with basketball leagues within the Center when weather permits was the chief topic of the meeting between the athletic board and team managers last Wednesday night.

The first league games were originally scheduled to get underway at the Jerome high school gymnasium last Monday night, but rejection of the plan by the school board necessitated this change.

Construction of three basketball courts on the Block 21 athletic field began yesterday. Additional courts will be established as soon as more hoops arrive.

Lack of transportation facilities formerly limited basketball team sign-ups but since all games will be played within the Center in the near future, more teams may register for league competition, said Mo Donato, head of men's athletics. He added that no entry fee is required and all groups desiring to enter a league are requested to contact the recreation office.

WHAT NATION'S PRESS THINKS ABOUT NEW PLAN

N.Y. HERALD TRIBUNE JAN. 30

That the restrictions on loyal Japanese should now be eased to permit them to serve in the nation's war program seems only just. It is also sensible in view of the present critical need for man power... Organization of the unit, Secretary Stimson indicated, is in recognition of "The inherent right of every faithful citizen, regardless of ancestry, to bear arms in the nation's battle.".... Under precautions, carefully sustained, the restoration to loyal Japanese Americans of their right to share citizens' responsibilities should involve no undue risk. It should serve, rather, to cement the loyalty of those who have patiently accepted as a necessity of war the hardships of leaving their homes and living in internment and who now voluntarily accept the opportunity to work, or fight, for Uncle Sam.

SEATTLE, WASH., POST-INTELLIGENCER JAN. 29

Announcement by Secretary Stimson that a substantial number of nisei... will be admitted to the Army on a volunteer basis, for training as combat teams, is one desirable step toward meeting this vexing problem. It should be only one step. There should be further segregation of those Japanese whose loyalty can be established from those whose loyalty may be suspected, and vigorous action to weed out the active, dissident... Other Japanese can certainly be organized, on a wide scale, for work in war industries and in agriculture... The loyal are entitled to establish their standing.

ST. PAUL, MINN., PRESS JAN. 28

A subcommittee of the Senate Military Affairs committee... Wednesday began consideration of a plan to release loyal Japanese Americans to the Army or to war plants. Needless to say the idea is correct and should be put into effect with all speed consistent with the importance and difficulty of the program. There is no reason why such American citizens should be limited to the Army or to war plants if they have any claim at all to the regaining of their full freedom of action—that a very large proportion of the younger men would embrace the chance to enter the armed forces if it were given them is certain; and it is equally certain from the experience with Japanese Americans who were admitted to the armed forces prior to the war that they would make valuable fighting men. Those who have been in a position to observe and study these citizens closely are also convinced that a large proportion of the 100,000 are perfectly good Americans at heart.

PORTLAND, ORE., OREGONIAN JAN. 31

It is announced by Lieut. Gen. Emmons, that 1500 Americans of Japanese ancestry will soon be accepted as volunteers in the United States Army. This announcement will be pleasing to every believer in the usages of true democracy. There were not a few young Americans of Japanese parentage who may have felt that, somehow, democracy had failed them when they were treated as enemy aliens. Still they were loyal in word and deed, for they understood the seeming necessity of their segregation. It may be said with a good deal of truth that in this also they were admirably American, and perhaps beyond the limitations of an average American patience. Now that the wrong has been righted, the wrong that could not be helped, until matters were sifted, these young men—these young Americans—are bad news for Hirohito.
