QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

ON ARMY COMBAT UNIT For Shipping

. Have Japanese Americans already in the military

service been discriminated against?

It has certainly never been the policy of the Army of the United States to countenance discrimination against imerican soldiers of any rade. Where discomination has occurred, it has been due to ignorance or stupidity on the part of individuals. An Army, in a period of great expansion, camob take Army, in a period of great expansion, carnot account of all the separate acts of its many individuals. The best corrective is to develop a line of policy which will show the individual what is wanted by his government. That is what is being done in this case. The present course is a direct rebuff to any who have discriminated against the American soldier who happens to be of Japanese blood and will go far toward curbing discrimination against you both in and out of the Arrye

10. How will we be treated by other Americans?

A partial answer already has been made to this guestion, There are many Americans who because of ignorance think of you as a Jap and nothing elas. They are aroused against Japan, and they feel hostile toward you simply because you are of Japanese extraction. That is the kind of thing we are working against. No American is in a position to look with contempt or speak slighting of a man who is in the uniform of his country. Therefore, the steps now being taken are the surest way to counter discrimination not only now but after the war. Racial projudices cannot be removed in a day but they can be reduced by goodwill and intelligent action over a period of time. The best antidote for prejudice against you will be your own conduct.

11, Besides service with infantry combat forces, can a Japanese American qualify to become an American

flyer?

It is contemplated that if your willing response and loyal action assures the success of the present under taking, the other forms of military service may be opened to you. For the present we are seeking voluntoers for the combat team only.

12. Can I sulist under an assumed name to protect rela-

tives in Japan?

A. If this fear is upported in your mind, it would be better not to volunteer at all but to wait and take your chance on being industed later.

13. What wall appen to me if I am captured?

Thet question cannot to answered but it is assumed that since you are an American, you will be treated as any other American prisoner.

14, What will happen to our property?

There will be no change as a result of your entry into the military service. The maytees of the War Relocation authority will to be at sumitant your disposale


AGED RESIDENT DIES
