Jobs Available for Husky Men

Two hundred and fifty men are needed by the Agricultural division to cut timber, brush, pull stumps and prepare land for cultivation, William C. Love, placement officer, said today.

One hundred men are needed for wood cutting, 36 men for saw mill operation and 12 men immediately to file saws, sharpen axes, wedges and woods tools.

Fifty men are needed by the Public Works division to work on the construction of a road to the Center's farm section.

Four janitors are needed. "When the lumber arrives for the construction of the school buildings, stores and churches, five hundred carpenters will be needed.

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More Paychecks Received Here

All paychecks for former Santa Anita workers have been received here and should be claimed as soon as possible, announced Thomas B. Lyle, Agent cashier.

Since unclaimed checks must be returned to San Francisco after a five-day period, Lyle urged payees to call immediately for their checks at the north window of the Denson Post office, open 10 a.m. to noon daily for this purpose.

More checks for Fresno workers are expected to arrive the latter part of this week, Lyle stated.

Other Stores To Open Soon

The local store was set up to give the Center residents as much needed service as possible, according to Roy Sellers, Community Enterprise division head.

"The present store in Block 8 is run on a temporary informal basis," he added. "The regional WRA attorney is formulating plans for a trust arrangement to establish business in the Center on a semi-formal basis, and later into a permanent cooperative organization.

"It is the government's policy to allow evacuees to set up local business. The community will have all services found in a normal town such as beauty parlors, shoe repair shops, barbers, dry goods and drug stores. It will be up to the residents to operate these stores."

Within a week or two, two additional stores will be opened, one in the administration area and the other in the southern area.

JEROME POPULATION TO HIT 7678 TODAY

The last trainload of evacuees to this Center is expected to arrive sometime today, disclosed Paul A. Taylor, Project director.

Numbering 419 passengers, the final trainload from the Fresno assembly center will raise the Center's total population figures to 7678.

NIGHT SCHOOL FOR ADULTS

"It will be up to the Center residents to determine what courses they want taught in our night school," says Charles M. Reaves, night school director.

BROOKS HAYS PREACHES HERE

Brooks Hays, Congressman-elect from the Little Rock district and for many years a Baptist Sunday School teacher, preached on "Faith" at the Protestant young people's service on Sunday.

Introduced by E. B. Whitaker, regional director of the WRA, Hays, in a powerful sermon heard by more

than 150 persons, stressed the need of faith in ideals, in man and in God.

With one of the largest Sunday School classes in the country, attendance in Hays' class in Little Rock has gone as high as 400.

The speaker, who ran unopposed on the Democratic ticket, will be one of seven Congressmen to represent Arkansas in the national legislative body.
