All Center mail must be in the dining hall maildrops as scheduled on the box or in the Post Office by 4:15 p.m. to be dispatched on that day.

Starting yesterday all outgoing mail is being cancelled by machine.

Registration Closes; Signup Near Perfect

The Center-wide registration of evacuees 17 and older was closed Wednesday night.

Project Director Paul A. Taylor said that as far as could be ascertained at present, practically all of the affected residents had filled out questionnaires.

A survey showed that there were 5820 persons who were 17 and older. An unofficial tabulation shows 5763 had registered.

The survey figures included some aliens who were not required to register since they had applied for repatriation. In addition, there were evacuees who left the Project prior to the start of registration, and those who were unable to fill out questionnaires because of illness.

The number of volunteers from this Center was unknown. This information is expected to be received from Lieut. Eugene Siler, head of the Army team, who returned to Washington, D.C.

RATION OFFICE PLANNED

A rationing office to handle the issuance of coupons for all rationed articles is expected to be set up here in a few days, said James H. Wells, administrative officer.

Members of the local rationing board are William G. Bolton, assistant Project director; Wells and a Chicot county OPA board representative.

New System To Be Used For Cooperative Classes

Starting Monday a new method for conducting co-operative classes will be innovated, announced Kiyoshi Hamanaka, assistant co-op educator.

The Center will be divided into five districts with Halls 46, 41, 17, 9 and 11 as the meeting places.

The classes will all start at 7:30 p.m. and will be conducted on the following days in the various blocks: Monday--Blocks 28, 35, 39, 45 and 46 at Hall 46. Tuesday--Blocks 31, 32, 40, 41, 43 and 44 at Hall 41. Wednesday--Blocks 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 29 and 30 at Hall 17. Thursday--Blocks 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9 at Hall 9. Friday--Blocks 1, 2, 3, 11, 12, 14 and 15 at Hall 11.

The students are requested to bring their own chairs, notebooks and pencils. The study materials will be furnished. Mauri Erkkila, head of the co-op educational program; and Hamanaka will supervise the classes.

What a Person Outside Is Thinking

March 5, 1943

Dear Fellow-Citizens of Japanese Ancestry:

Letters asking counsel on registration and the combat unit have come lately from several centers. Instead of simply replying to the individual inquiries, I am going to be bold enough to write this open letter to all Nisei....

Let me say right off, that all of us, without exception, feel it would be a serious mistake for you not to register and to cooperate whole-heartedly with the War Department and the WRA....

We know that you have been cut to the quick by the tough experiences of the last year, not so much the physical hardships, as the denial of a chance to prove your loyalty and make your utmost contribution to the war effort. Many of us have shared your sense of grievance on this account, and have worked persistently to bring about a change in Government policy and in the public mind. But most of you have swallowed your grievances and endured the "slings and arrows of outrageous fortune" with marvelous patience, in the spirit of patriots ready to serve the country to the limit. Knowing as I do the tragedies of which you and your loved ones have been a part, my heart bleeds for you....

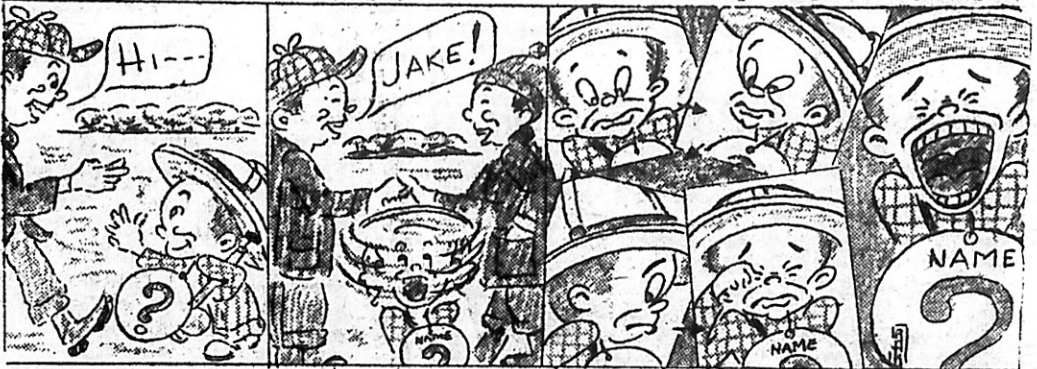
As to the combat unit, high officials labored for months to bring it about. Those who now refuse to cooperate with the War Department will be throwing down, not only liberal Army officials, but also the President, for on February 1st he wrote to Secretary Stimson endorsing the plan and testifying to its high purposes....

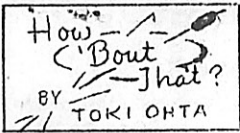
Refusal to cooperate will also poison the public mind against all evacuees, for the anti-Oriental reactionaries could say, "We told you so; they were disloyal all along, and now their true colors have come out." It would give a most effective item of propaganda to the Axis. And it would hamstring groups like the Fair Play Committees that are working to preserve the democratic rights of Nisei and all minority groups. Right now the Committee on American Principles and Fair Play is being formed to carry on that fight. General Barrows, Dr. Henry Grady, Dr. Robert Millikan, Dr. Ray Lyman Wilbur and many other leaders over the West Coast are backing it. I feel sure you won't let us down, but will continue to hold fast to the ideal America, even though the real America, under wartime pressure, has fallen far short of her ideals.

Attractive nameplates adorn the portals of a number of apartments in the Center. Originality, colorful design and expert craftsmanship are shown in many of them.

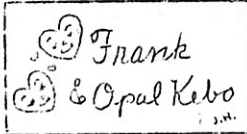

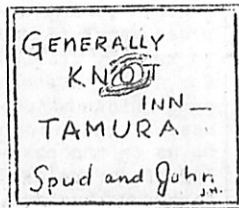
Mountains painted in one corner with the names Mary, Nats and Kazie printed on clouds form the nameplate of the Yamashitas at 5-9-D.

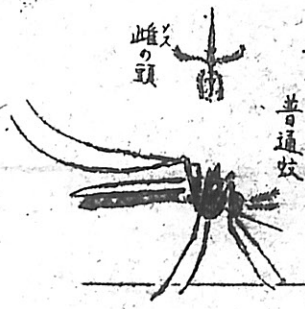
成人に勉学機会

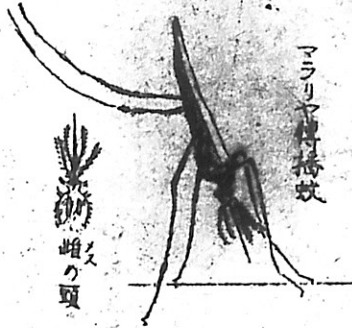
蚊の拡大図

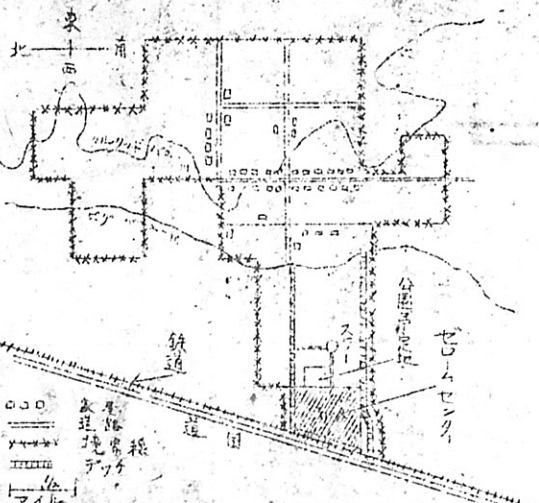
