

## SENATE COMMITTEE VISITS CENTER

### A Jays Get Cash Prize

It took a little time, but the A Jays finally got their prize for submitting the winning entry in the Center newspaper contest.

Presentation of the cash prize to four representatives of the A Jays was made Saturday morning by Project Director Paul A. Taylor.

The four A Jays who turned in the name Denson TRIBUNE and received the award were Masashi Ono, Dean Ono, Esau Masuda and Koji Shida.

### More Rigid Restrictions Will Be Recommended

Recommendations for more rigid restrictions of evacuees here will be made by U.S. Senator Albert B. Chandler, chairman of the Military Affairs special committee, as the result of an investigation conducted by his group Sunday.

In addition to Senator Chandler, Senator James E. Murray, a committee member, and George W. Malone, special consultant to the subcommittee, were in the inquiry group.

Results of the investigation showed

that 31 nisei out of an eligible list of 1579 had volunteered for the Japanese American combat team. According to results of the recently concluded registration, 30 per cent of the residents here were classed as disloyal.

According to figures which are not official until a check has been made, 5785 evacuees out of 5820 residents 17 and older have registered.

Project Director Paul A. Taylor believes this result indicates that apparently everyone with the exception of confinees and aliens who had previously applied for repatriation had signed up.

The convalescents will be registered as soon as their health permits while repatriating a liens were not required to

## SHOE RATION PROGRAM STARTS

### FORMS MAY BE OBTAINED FROM BLOCK MANAGERS

The anxious question, "When do we get to buy shoes?" voiced by many evacuee residents with thin soles was answered Friday when the issuance of shoe ration certificates was started in the Center.

Residents should make their applications for shoes by filling out a form which may be obtained from their

block managers. The forms, which should be mailed, are self addressed and do not require postage.

Administrative Officer James H. Wells, in charge of the rationing program here, asked residents to refrain from calling for their certificates since they will be mailed.

Wells said everyone who needs shoes is entitled to a certificate.

"Some residents have had the mistaken conception that only a limited number of certificates were available," he said.

Block managers will be supplied with enough applications to meet the evacuees' needs, he emphasized.

If the head of the family desires shoes for other members of the family who are unable to apply individually, he should fill out a form for each of them and sign his name to the ap-

### Volunteers At Minidoka

#### Number 300

Dillon S. Myer, national WRA director, announced that 300 evacuees at the Minidoka relocation center in Idaho have volunteered for the Japanese American combat team.

This figure represents 19 per cent of those eligible for army service there.

The enlistees included the four Sakura brothers and the three Onodera brothers. Forty-one of the volunteers are married and 24 have children.

The list also included 11 issei who are not eligible for the team.

### Taylor Praises Enlistees

Project Director Paul A. Taylor highly praised the 31 volunteers for the Japanese American combat team from this Project.

"Every volunteer deserves the deepest admiration and respect of everyone in this Center--especially so in view of the small number that did enlist," he said.

"I believe the actions of these young men demonstrate a loyalty to the United States that is difficult for any other American regardless of his ancestry to match," he declared.

Taylor said he has not received any definite induction data but was told by authorities that it would be in "about 30 days."

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## JOBS OPEN OUTSIDE FOR EVACUEES

With the increase in demand for evacuee workers this spring, a variety of job offers now are filtering in from all parts of the Midwest.

The majority of the nisei who have left the Center to date have gone out as domestic workers where room and board and \$50 a person and \$125 a couple a month has been the average pay.

Last week a nisei girl qualified for a secretarial position in an eastern university at \$125 a month.

This week three persons have been notified of acceptance as civil service workers at \$1660 a year.

These placements should be an encouraging sign to others wishing employment in similar fields.

In almost every instance, community attitude toward the Japanese has been reported as good.

Filing intention for indefinite leave can be said to be the first step toward making definite plans for one's future.

And thanks to the many others who submitted names for him.

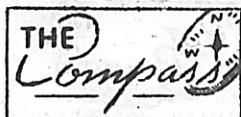

## Cabinet Shop Is One Of Busiest in Center

The agriculture department has received a shipment of sweet potatoes for propagation of plants.

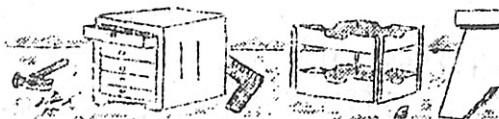
Reputed to be the Center's smoothest operating crew, the cabinet shop manned by 29 male workers and one girl secretary is one of the busiest groups on the production front.

Since the opening of the shop in November, the workers have made approximately 1500 articles vitally needed in the administrative offices, hospital, schools and other departments.

Lacking in materials and machinery, ingenuity is used in revising orders to overcome these handicaps. The group does its own drafting work.

Machinery operated in the shop includes power saws, band saws, a jig-saw, joiners for planing the edges, a surface planer, lathes, a drill press and four different kinds of sanding machines.

Equipment made by the boys for various



departments are X-ray stands, stretchers, pharmacist's cabinets, test tube racks, sterilizer shelves and laboratory technician's kits for the hospital; rice pan covers, rice steamers and wooden spatulas or shamojis for the mess halls; sorting tables and letter cases for the Post Office; file cabinets and boxes, tables and drawers for the Administrative offices. Hard gum wood is used most with some oak.

Some of the recent orders filled by the shop are 60 book shelves and racks, 4 sand boxes and 200 benches for the Education department; 36 bridge tables, 30 ping pong tables and 144 stools for the Community Activities section.

Much credit should go to the crew members who work until late at night to satisfy all departments, says Bill Yamamoto, shop foreman.

### A. Principles of Consumers' Co-operatives

1. Open, voluntary membership.
2. Democratic control: One vote for each member, regardless of number of shares owned. No proxy voting.
3. Interest paid on shares of stock not to exceed a low fixed rate.
4. Patronage dividends: Net earnings (profits, surplus savings) are distributed to patrons in proportion to their patronage.

### B. Practices

1. Religious, political and racial neutrality.
2. Selling at market price.
3. Cash trading.
4. Setting aside a certain proportion of earnings to be used for education.
5. Federation with other co-operatives for business and educational purposes.
6. Setting aside reserves for future expansion.

plication.

These certificates must be presented when buying shoes in the Center dry goods store and must accompany mail orders.

The ration is three pairs a year for every man, woman and child, but members of a family may pool their certificates so that some may buy more if others buy less.

The rationing covers all shoes containing any leather and all rubber-soled shoes, but not slippers, soft-soled baby shoes or storm wear such as rubbers and arctics. Shoe repair work and second hand shoes are not rationed.

Persons going out on indefinite leaves should obtain Ration Books 1 and 2 at least one day before leaving by contacting either Wells or Edith Rodgers, junior procurement officer, in the West Administration Building. Ration Book 1 is for shoes, sugar and coffee while Book 2 is for canned food.

Queries made in five centers revealed that many of the male colonists would prefer serving with regular Army units rather than in units made of persons of Japanese ancestry only, according to Senator Chandler.

Taylor said he was sorry that so many were slow in making up their minds requiring the registration to be dragged out over such a long period.

"It is regrettable that the record of the Center has been marred by this response and by the attacks on the Rev. Yamazaki and Dr. Yababe," he stated.
