

FARMING, ENGINEERING HEAD VISITS PROJECT

PLANS FOR BUILDINGS, ROADS WILL BE SUBMITTED TO WPB

E. J. Utz, national WRA agricultural and engineering director, left the Center today after conducting a four-day inspection of the Project's agricultural and engineering program and facilities.

Since War department engineers had not made any arrangements for agricultural and engineering equipment maintenance shops, Utz will submit plans for their construction to the War Production board.

Plans for roads and buildings to house agricultural and engineering equipment will also be submitted for the WPB's approval.

Unlike the other projects, Jerome's and Rohrer's biggest problem is drainage instead of irrigation, according to Utz. He expressed his belief that this problem would be solved here with the completion of the Beouf River main and its tributaries this June.

Utz said the food raising program was being pushed because it was the belief of WRA leaders that regardless of how successful the resettlement program is, a large percentage of

New streamlined regulations regarding seasonal work leaves were announced by John C. Tucker, Leaves office head.

All those planning to leave shortly for seasonal sugar beet work will be considered for permits at the Leaves office without waiting for clearance or indefinite leave from Washington.

Arrangements are now being made by Arthur Eskelson of the Utah-Idaho Sugar company to have the first group of sugar beet workers leave by April 1 and additional groups of 20 to 25

persons leaving every two weeks thereafter.

Any person, family or group interested in immediate seasonal work leaves are requested to contact the leaves office of Ken Imamura at Warehouse 2 at once.

With a green background and lettering in black, the badge serves as a worker's identification as well as a time saving device for the timekeepers.

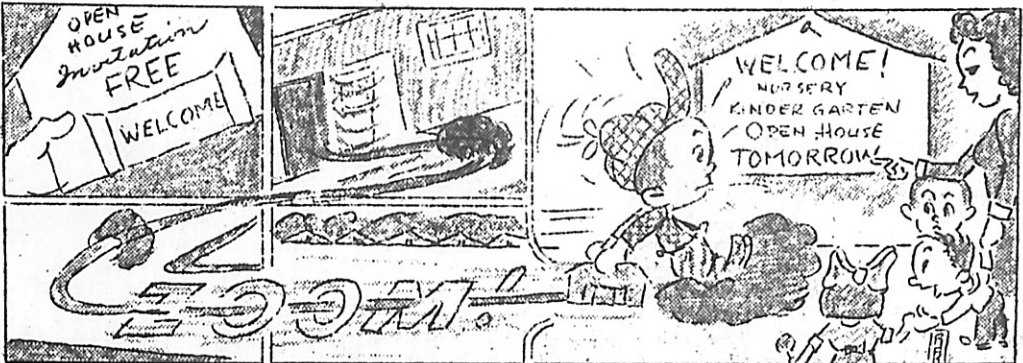

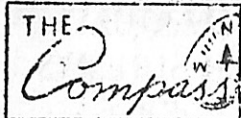

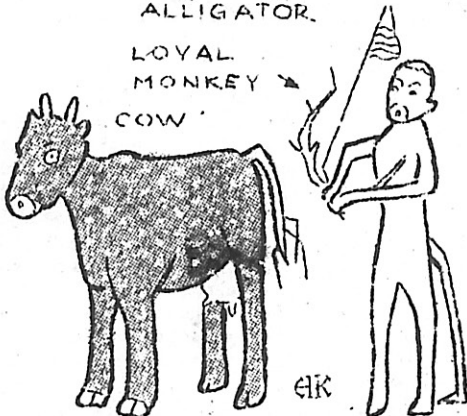

"It is important to grow vegetables and livestock in order to insure an adequate supply of food for these people because of the rationing and the actual scarcity of certain types of food," he stressed.

Utz believes that climatically, this Project compares favorably with other centers.

"The heavy soil here is excellent for certain crops but not too suitable for most vegetables," he said. The vegetables are to be planted in the sandy land near the bayous.

He said the heavy soil would be planted in feed crops for the livestock.

Present plans call for the raising of hogs and poultry here. Beef cattle may be added in the future.

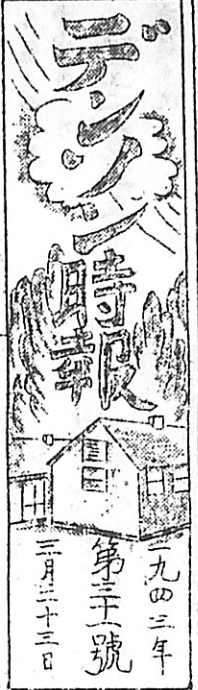
Sermons on "Ohigan," or spring equinox, were given by the Revs. Tadao Kouchi and Shizuo Kai at the young people's morning services.
