Meet Set Tomorrow

With an invitation extended to all Center women, the Denson YWCA will hold its first mass meeting tomorrow from 1:30 to 4:30 p.m. in Hall 33.

As an outstanding feature of the afternoon, a recognition service of the five affiliated Y groups will be held.

"Wider Horizons" will be the topic of the talk by keynote speaker Beryl Henry, organizer and adviser of the local Y.

Mrs. Al Tsukamoto will preside at the business meeting when the constitution will be ratified and permanent board members elected.

'Nisei Should Go Outside'

Rundquist

"The greatest contribution the nisei can make to their own cause is to go out and conduct themselves as Americans," declared George E. Rundquist, executive secretary of the committee on resettlement of Japanese Americans, on his arrival here Wednesday.

"People are generally provincial and are not concerned with someone else's problems if he is far away," he said.

"The nisei can gain public acceptance if they can prove they are acceptable. But (cont. on page 2)

Employment Procedure

Outlined

Three WRA relocation office supervisors arrived here this week to acquaint residents with the resettlement program and to confer with local Leaves office administrators.

The visiting executives were Harold S. Fistere, head of the offices in the Michigan and Ohio territory; E. L. Dakan, supervisor of the Columbus, Ohio, branch, and E. G. Kennedy, head of the St. Louis, Mo., office.

The supervisors debunked the belief prevalent here that it "costs a fortune to live on the outside." While they agreed the cost of living had risen considerably, they assured evacuees that people outside were not starving on prevailing wages.

"Job offers are carefully investigated and are not accepted by the WRA unless it calls for prevailing wages of that locality (cont. on page 6)

The desirability of having an auditorium here was discussed. A fact finding committee has been appointed by Johnson Kebo, chairman of the council, to conduct an investigation.

Evacuees wishing to formally apply for expatriation or repatriation may do so beginning Monday morning in 36-8-E.

Applications should be made in family groups. All members

of a family 12 years and older who wish to expatriate or repatriate must apply personally.

Those who are already on the official repatriation list need not apply now.

Persons who are uncertain whether they made previous formal application, should refer to the official list which may be seen on request at the registration office.

unless the people on the outside know the evacuees, they will accept California's judgment of those of Japanese ancestry," he said. "Public opinion of the nisei will not be improved if they stay in these centers."

"The Government wants those of Japanese ancestry to leave the centers to accomplish this purpose---not to get rid of them," he stated. "It is an enlightened policy."

Rundquist said that all employment offers received by his group are cleared by the WRA to avoid mistakes. "The WRA is better acquainted with local labor and industrial problems," he explained.

According to Rundquist, the committee on resettlement was formed to help the government and the evacuees by supporting the plan for dispersal resettlement. The committee is aiding in the resettlement of evacuees in communities where they may pursue normal patterns of life again.

The group is locating living quarters for the evacuees and helping them make social contacts and friends, he said. A personalized education program to acquaint the public with Japanese Americans is also being carried on.

The committee is an organization sponsored by the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America and the Home Missions Council of North America in cooperation with the Foreign Missions Conference of North America.

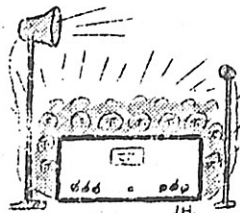
Rundquist will remain here throughout this week. This is the second project he is visiting on his detailed itinerary which will take him to all 10 relocation centers.

We found the following definition for "sacrilegious" in our little dictionary:

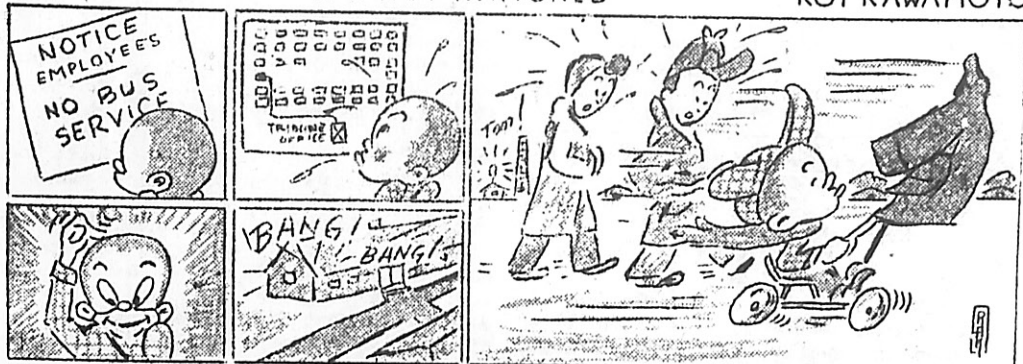

The road construction crew has its headaches, too.

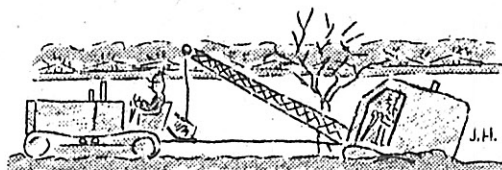
Before any equipment can proceed with construction and maintenance work, drainage must be completed so that the wet ground does not hamper their plans and slow down progress.

Densonites Out on Leave Total 73

According to latest word, received from national WRA headquarters in Washington, D.C., 2571 evacuees from the 10 relocation centers have left on indefinite leave.

Another 2942 persons have been granted advance clearance and are ready to leave the projects as soon as satisfactory employment arrangements have been completed.

Exclusive of project registration applications, a total of 12,600 leave applications have been received. An additional 5900 applications have been received in Washington as a result of the recent registration.

As of Saturday, 73 evacuees from this Project have left on indefinite leaves. An additional 130 persons have obtained advance clearance and are awaiting suitable employment.

In addition to WRA field offices in Cleveland, Chicago, Kansas City, Denver and Salt Lake City, cooperating committees in many different communities are working in behalf of evacuee employment, it was reported.

Because of limited working space, Masao Hatano, instructor, announced that no more students will be accepted in the flower arrangement classes.

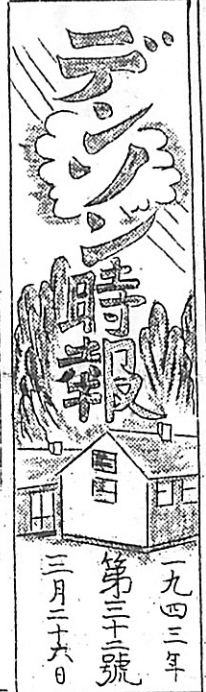
More students may enroll as soon as a larger classroom can be obtained.
