occur. It seems likely water supply, which is, and will be exposed to contamination while new plumbing is being laid and opened. For this reason it has become necessary to advise the inhabitants of the project to drink no water that has not been boiled, until further notice.

"The kitchens have been asked .to supply boiled drinking water wherever

possible.

"The source of our water is seven to nine hundred feet underground and is the same as that of Dermott and Jerome. These two towns have had excellent water for many years. We may therefore expect the same here when construction is completed and all the pipes thoroughly washed free of chemicals and bacteria."
