Departing Evacuees With Limited Funds May Apply

Transportation and early living empenses may be paid by the WRA to evacuees who leave the Project on indefirite leave and who need financial assistance, according to an ceed Johnson Kebo as announcement received here this week by chairman of the Tem- Project Director Paul A. Taylor.

This new policy will make it possible for many evacuees with limited funds to accept job offers which they might otherwise have turned down, Taylor explained.

Financial assistance will be rendered by WRA in the form of cash grants made at the time an evacuee leaves the project.

The maximum grant which may be made will cover coach fare for each member of the immediate family; \$3 per person for meals en route for each day of travel; and, to meet initial living expenses at the place of employment, \$50 for the wage earner plus \$25 for each of two dependents.

. Evacuees with indefinite leave . permits who are interested in obtaining this type of assistance should make a written application to Taylor. A statement showing cash on hand and cash income for the last six months is required.

When the statement shows that the evaouce has insufficient funds to cover transportation costs, plus initial living expenses, Taylor is authorized to issue a dash grant to make up the difference.

Enlightened Policy

Following is a news story which appeared in the Arkansas Gazette Friday:

Topeka, Kan., March 25 (AP)--Importation of Japanese labor into Kansas was approved today by Governor Schoeppel. He reported a number of requests for permission to use labor from a Colorado internment camp and said, "Where it is satisfactory to the local communities, I see no reason why these requests shouldn't be granted. I'm going to approve them.

The Santa Fe railway has asked permission to employ 4000 to 5000 Japanese on extra gangs, the governor said, and Southwestern Kansas war project contractors are in the market for 1000 to

15,000 more.

More states are gradually accepting the Japanese Americans as part of their populations. The above announcement should give an added boost to the WRA resettlement program and should encourage other states to follow suit.

Eventually, this enlightened policy must spread to most of the states in order to prevent the concentration of minorities in certain localities. Minority communities have been caused largely by the discrimination in other parts. To avoid these communities, more sections of the country must be opened to minorities.

(Editorial note: The place referred to in the news item is Granada, a WRA center,

not an internment camp.).



High School Science Department Grows


Rating ferociously as if to warn the onlookers, the rattlesnake in captivity at the local high school science department swallowed a fat frog for its breakfast as the TRIBUME staff reporters visited the biology department last week.

A. L. Reed, chemistry and biology instructor, stated, "Although our division is still in its construction stages, we expect to have one of the most well equipped science departments in this region."

The students who contribute various specimens get recognition, and to date, they have brought crayfish, grass spiders, soaly black lizards, tree lizards, snapper turtles, common mad turtles, giant grasshoppers, salamanders and garter snakes to make up the collection.

These specimens are carefully conserved in glass jars which contain a solution of for maldehyde and alcohol. Reed expects to hold "open house" so that the residents may view some of the insects, reptiles and small animals which live in this area.


The formation of an American Legion post here strikes us favorably.

TRIBUNE Staff Men Visit Little Rock

It wasn't the distance nor the destinstion. It is only 125 miles away and Little Rock isn't any more attractive than nor different from many other cities its size, chamber of commerce ads notwithstanding.

It was the idea of getting away from the slow-moving world of black barracks and entering a sourrying ration and priority-conscious world.

We enjoyed every minute of our three-day plunge into the mainstream. We washed out a lot of the Denson mud from our systems.

It feels good to be able to order what we want instead of taking what is handed out ... it's hard on the pocketbook of a \$19 a month man but the stories of outsiders paying fabulous prices for meals seem to have been exaggerated; e.g., we got a substantial ham and eg s breakfast for 45 cents.

Horses seem to be safe in this locality. They are still in pastures, not featuring

meat market displays.

Scattered reports of unfavorable treatment of nisei on the outside either do not hold in Little Rock or we were mistaken for Chinese or Filipino diplomats.

Reporter John Hiroheta end this writer visited the most public places and were accepted with nary a curious glance. We were not treated with any more courtesy, but just as any other "white ran."

Te had a conversation with a typical Bebbit over a cup of coffee about a newspaper article concerning an Allied raid of a Japanese base, not as an ordinary citizen to an evacuee, but as one American to another.

However, we in civvies felt rather out of place on Saturday and Sunday. Conservative ly speaking, servicemen outnumbered the civilians at least 5 to 1 on those days. So much saluting was going on around us that we almost started doing likewise. The WAACs were also in the capital city of Arkensas in force.

It is true a number of articles are difficult to find, but on the whole, the stores are still fairly well stocked with essential needs.

Mo, the United States hasn't changed completely during our year of "protective custody" living. Evacuees may be surprised to find that it is not so horrible on the outside. Life goes on es usual.

We experienced no awkwardness in getting

back into the "groove."

We almost felt that living behind barbed wires was just a bad dream until me drove up to the gate and had to surrender our short-term leave permit to the guard. we really know what we've been missing.


