

Departers May Receive Emergency Assistance

Evacuees on leave from relocation centers who get into emergency financial difficulties may receive assistance under an agreement worked out between the WRA and the Social Security board, according to a recent announcement in Washington.

"The new plan," Project Director Paul Taylor pointed out, "does not in any sense imply that Center residents who go out on leave are likely to be unable to make ends meet. It simply means that when they run into a problem too heavy for them to solve alone, the facilities of relief and welfare agencies are open to them, as well as to established residents of the communities."

Most local relief programs provide emergency medical care and living expenses to persons in need. Federal funds from the Social Security board will be allocated to local agencies for aid to evacuees.

At the time of leaving the Center every evacuee will be provided by the Project Leave officer with a statement, "When You Leave the Relocation Center," which is being revised to include suggestions as to what evacuees should do if they find themselves in need of public financial assistance.

AGRICULTURAL WORK OFFERED

Resettlement and immediate employment in the agricultural field in South Dakota is open to evacuees.

Individuals and families who wish to leave will be given immediate indefinite leaves and will be entitled to all grants.

Interested persons are asked to contact the Employment office.

INVENTORY TO BE TAKEN

The quarterly inventory of all physical property will be taken tomorrow, according to Young M. Orsburn, Housing head.

Members of the Education department will assist in checking properties.

Orsburn requested that a member of the family remain in the units to facilitate the checkup.

PLANS REVISED FOR CENTER AUDITORIUM-GYMNASIUM

Plans for the auditorium-gymnasium to be build here have been revised, Frank Arakawa, chairman of the Temporary Community Council, revealed at the regular meeting of the group Wednesday.

Original plans called for a building 80 feet by 120 feet. According to Arakawa, the new blueprint now

being drafted calls for an auditorium 60 feet by 120 feet. It is estimated that the building will have a seating capacity of approximately 1500.

The Council's School Welfare committee which had disbanded in favor of the Center's School Advisory board, was recreated.

VACANT LOTS TO BE MADE INTO RECREATIONAL AREAS

Plans were completed last week to convert the four vacant blocks, 10, 21, 22, and 34, into recreational areas for the school and the community, K. E. Arne, Community Services head, disclosed.

The plans, which were drawn up by Kirk E. Miller, high school director of physical education, met the unanimous approval of Arne, A. G. Thompson, superintendent of school, G. F. Castleberry, Community Activities head, and Shig Tokumoto, mens' athletic chief.

Clearing of stumps, drainage of stagnant water and grading will begin as soon as weather permits.

According to the layout, Block 10 will be provided with softball fields and tennis courts. On Block 21 there will be a quarter-mile track oval which will have a complete section for field events within the track. A 220-yard straightaway, more softball fields, two hardball diamonds and a sumo ring will complete Block 21.

Block 22 will be

the playground for elementary children. This plot will be fully equipped with children's recreational facilities. Two playground directors will be chosen to supervise games during recess and on

Through him assistance will be provided in handling problems of management, operation and disposition of real and personal property or in settling claims held by evacuees. In this work the Evacuee Property office representative will have the cooperation of the Project attorney.

The decision to have an Evacuee Property office representative stationed here came as a result of the uncertainty in handling outside

Fishing Laws Of State Clarified

Some of the game fish abundant in this area are bass, pike, crappie, bream, jack salmon, perch and calico or striped bass.

Black bass either large or small mouth cannot be possessed and retained from March 15 through May 15. Any caught accidentally must be released immediately.

Black bass caught outside that period must be at least 10 inches in length.

Crappie, white perch and striped bass must be more than 8 inches in length.

The daily limit on black bass, crappie



or white perch and striped bass is 15; bream black, goggle-eye, sun or any perch, 25; trout, pike or jack salmon, 6. The aggregate limit for one day is 25 game fish.

All artificial bait is prohibited from March 10 through May 15, but live bait may be used throughout the year for scavenger fishing.

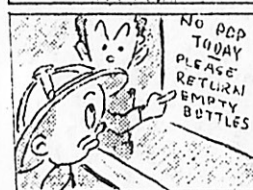
And then in another "contest," the score was 91-53.

FRONT VIEW OF BLOCK DINING HALL



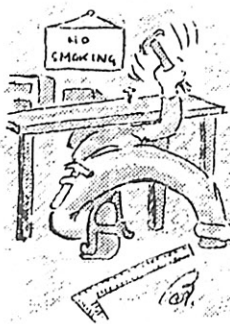
Front view of a block dining hall in the Center is shown in the above drawing by Ben Matsumoto, a staff artist.

Ray Kato in the last period nailed the game for the Wolverines.

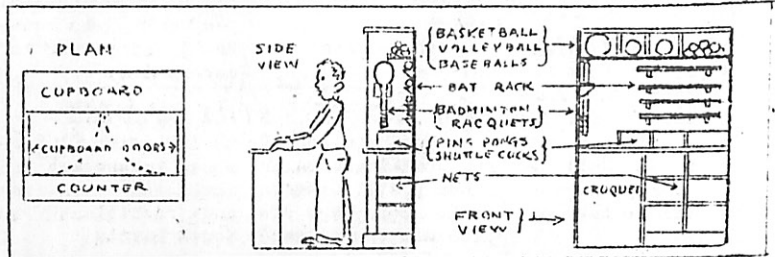
Kato and Toyama tallied 11 and 9 points, respectively, for the winners while Bill Tsukamoto tanked 14.

The Denson TRIBUNE will print several articles setting forth the services which the Evacuee Property office is able to render and what information residents will be required to furnish in order to avail themselves of this service, which will be free to them.

It is to be distinctly understood, Robinson stated, that the Evacuee Property office does not direct what disposition should be made of any property or how it should be managed. Officials, however, will act as advisers when called upon to do so.

The Evacuee Property office is not intended to take the place of any other property agency such as banks, attorneys, real estate agents, etc., but rather to provide an auxiliary service.
