ART COMPETITION FOR EVACUEES ANNOUNCED

Art competition open to evacuee artists 18 and older, professional or amateur, of all relocation centers was announced by the Friends Center in Cambridge, Mass.

Contestants may enter one picture in any medium which is an original work of art. The exhibit will last two weeks.

The following prizes will be awarded: First, \$50, second, \$25; third, \$20, and 10 honorable mentions, \$15 each. In addition, special awards of \$20 each will be given for the best flower painting, portrait, landscape, scene at the relocation or assembly center.

WRA To Provide for Free Property Storage

Transportation and storage of personal property will be provided by the WRA through the Evacuee Property office, it was announced by Project Director Paul A. Taylor.

The establishment and operation of warehouses at convenient points for the free storage of evacuee property is being arranged by Russell T. Robinson, Chief of the Evacuee Property Office.

Residents of this Center who desire their property transferred from private to govern-

ment storage should make application to the Jerome Evacuee Property officer as soon as he arrives.

This ruling affects evacuees out on leaves who have reentered the Project, friends of residents from the outside and any evacuee or administrative personnel members who have War Ration Books. An evacuee on indefinite leave may also file such a request with the Evacuee Property officer or by writing to the Evacuee Property office at San Francisco.

The books will be returned to the owner when he leaves the Center, Wells said. Household and personal effects may also be shipped to the Center from the resident's former home or private storage, provided there is available storage space here.

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Alterations Department Kept Busy

The Alterations department under the direction of Mrs. Edward Tsukimura deserves credit as one of the busiest and smoothest-run departments in the Center. Workers make everything from aprons for mess, barber shop and Post Office to dish towels, mail bags, Boy Scout flags and typewriter covers in addition to doing alteration work for residents.

Swamped with requests daily, this department takes in more than 220 garments weekly at its work offices in 36-1.



Future plans are to have block sewing as soon as sewing machines are available.

According to Mrs. Tsukimura, all new garments should go through the Welfare office before entering the Alterations department.

With the exception of school children and emergency cases, no alteration orders will be accepted hereafter on Saturdays, it was announced.

A special contest will also be held for mimeograph art. Any artist may submit one example in this class in addition to a painting.

The following prizes will be awarded in this class: First, \$20, second, \$15, third, \$10, and four honorable mentions of \$5 each.

Pictures must be sent prepaid to the Relocation Center Art Exhibit; Friends Center; 5 Longfellow Park; Cambridge, Mass.

To facilitate shipping and to save expense, pictures must not be framed but simply matted or edged.

At the close of the exhibit, all pictures will be returned at the expense of the Friends Center. All pictures must be received by May 15, 1943.

Artistic merit will be the sole basis in

awarding prizes, it was said. Design, color, originality and skill in execution will be considered in the judging.

The title of the picture, the artist's complete name and address, and the price (if the picture is for sale) must be written on the back of the picture or securely attached to it.

Contest judges are Edward M. Forbes, director of the Fogg Art Museum; Langdon Warner, lecturer on fine arts, curator of Oriental art, Fogg Art Museum, both of Harvard University; Mrs. Barrett Tanner, lecturer, Museum of Fine Arts; Kojiro Tomita, curator of Asiatic Art, both of Boston; and Mrs. Leonard Cronkhite, dean of the graduate school, Radcliffe College.

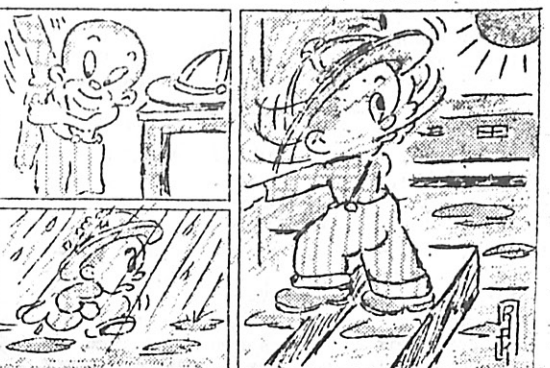

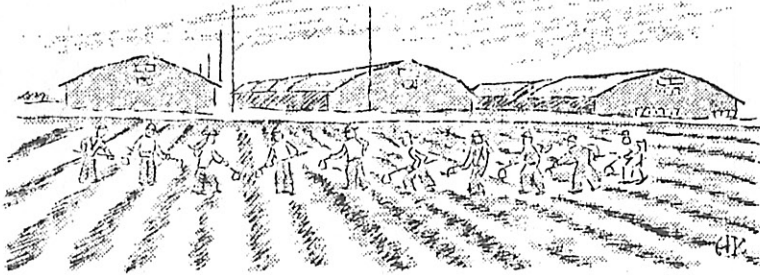

It is detrimental both to the WRA program and to the morale of the evacuees.

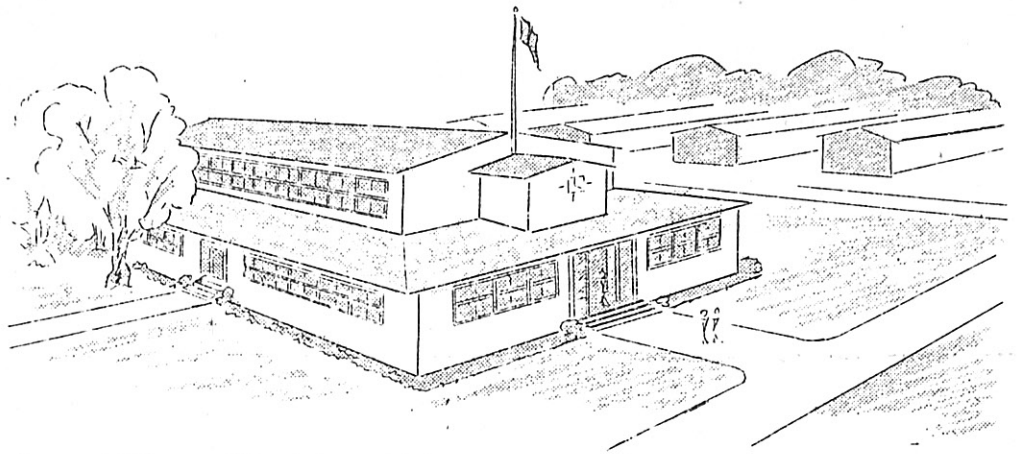
However, if your story is true, the residents in this Center would like to know where our share of the sewing machines went. Surely, we are entitled to the same

benefits as another relocation center. H.K.

(Editorial note: According to Walter G. Merrifield, Property Control officer here, government sewing machines in the Center total 169. They include 155 foot treadle and 14 electric machines. The Community Services division has divided most of these among the Alterations department, sewing classes and home economics classes. An additional 25 sewing machines are expected to be transferred here in two weeks, Merrifield said.

Ten to 12 sewing machines in each block means that Rohwer has at least 330 foot treadle machines. Rohwer, however, does not have an Alterations department as yet, according to Project Director Paul A. Taylor.)

ARCHITECTS' SKETCH OF CENTER AUDITORIUM



Above is the architects' preliminary sketch of the Denson auditorium. Guy Smith, senior engineer, said the plans may be changed to some extent, but that the preliminary sketch already had won general unofficial approval.

Construction, he said, will be undertaken immediately upon completion of the 10 personnel apartments under construction in Block 24. The auditorium will be in Block 21.

A garage and two store buildings also will go under construction at the same time. But one half of the construction men now engaged on the apartment project, Smith said, could complete the auditorium

in less than two months.

R.E. Arné, chief of Community Services, said the auditorium when completed will be available for general Center use. It will be designed to seat 1500 persons, and will have stage facilities adequate for a variety of uses.

The building will be used under the direction of the chief of Community Services for church services, plays, picture shows, forums, music programs, lectures and other functions requiring considerable space.

The seats will be removable, so that the floor may be cleared for large dances, basketball and similar affairs.

Property officer.

Shipments to the projects will not be made in individual lots but in carload lots by lumping together several approved applications.

Only one shipment of household goods and personal effects will be provided by the WRA from the evacuee's place of former residence or place of storage to a point outside a relocation center.

The transportation section of the Evacuee Property office, however, will give traffic information and assistance, without cost to any evacuee, who wants to arrange for transportation and storage of effects at his own expense.

Five hundred pounds of personal effects will be shipped free for residents going on indefinite leave in addition to the baggage transportation to which each person is entitled in railroad traveling.

In order to qualify for this additional freight shipping service, it is necessary that the evacuee going on indefinite leave take full advantage of the baggage shipping privileges.

There are certain exceptions in the shipping of personal belongings. No perishable goods will be shipped by the WRA; no commercial goods, except to a project when the shipment has been approved by the Project Director and no goods will be shipped when in the opinion of the officials of the Evacuee Property office the value or its location would not warrant the cost involved.
