CO-OP SET UP EXPLAINED

"Plans for the Community Enterprise will be set up by the people and solely for them," declared Roy Sellers, Community Enterprise head, speaking before an educational meeting on co-operatives at Hall 4 Saturday night.

Sellers explained that since we are not living in a competitive world, there will be only one co-operative in the Center and all the business establishments will become a part of it.

"The set up in Store 8 is temporary. As soon as a trust is organized the store will be turned over to it. The trust will be responsible for the busi-ness until a co-operative is organized. Then the trust will dissolve and the store will be turned over to the people to operate. Every bit of money in the store will accrue to the residents," he added.

Seller's talk was precoded by a short educational talk on co-operatives by Kiyoshi Hamanaka, chairman of the meeting.
