Queen Contest Voting Closed; Results Awaited

COMMITTEE TO SELECT WINNER FROM THREE TOP CONTENDERS

Voting for Denson's queen closed this noon. Her Majesty will be selected from the three top contestants by a representative committee tomorrow at 2 p.m. in 36-12-B.

Up to 8 a.m. yesterday, Mary Ikeguchi was leading the scmifinal field of six candidates with 127 votes. She was followed by Bessie Makashima with 88 and Kiku Nakamichi with 57.

Behind them were Cherry Yoshimura with 40, Tamako Hiram i with 20 and May Hamade with 11 votes.

The queen selection will be revealed at the Coronation ball Thursday night in the Hospital dining hall. William O. Melton, assistant Project director, will crown the queen in the absence of Project Director Paul A. Taylor.

According to Edwin Funahashi, queen committee chairman, final voting results will be posted in all Conter stores.

Queen contest judges are Melton, G.F. Castleberry, Community Activities head; Mrs. G.F. Castleberry, elementary school instructor; Sam Seno, assistant Community Activities head; Al Tsukamoto, indoor activities head; Mrs. Al Tsukemoto, women's olub head; Frank Arakawa, Community Counoil chairman; Mitsugu Kawaguchi, blook managers' chairman, and Richard Itanaga, TRIB-UNE city editor.

Queen committee members who will also participate in the selection are Funahashi, Yoshiko Nakamura, Yoshiko Shiotsu, Kiyoko Watamabe, Kenji Haruko and Hugh Muranaka.

Rice, assistant farm superintendent.

The immunization will be done free.

RESIDENTS URGED TO TALK OVER EMPLOYMENT OFFERS

Evacuees who are interested in outside employment not covered by job offers received in the Center are urged by the WRA to discuss their situations with Leaves Head John McCormick or Leaves Officer John Tucker, especially where they have specialized skills and professions.

It may be possible to refer their applications for special placement effort by field relocation officers in the cities where employment is desired, it was explained.

Job offers received at the Project are not altogether indicative of actual employment opportunities for evacuees, especially in the less common trades and professions,

it was said.

Relocation supervisors are equipped to make special efforts to place a limited number of persons, provided they know the particular type of employment for which the

applicant is fitted.

While the relocation officer may not always find an employer willing to make an employment offer sight unseen on the basis of correspondence alone, the general employment market may be so good in the applicant's particular line or work that on the relocation officer's recommendation, the WRA will issue indefinite leave to permit the evacuee to go to the area to secure work with the assistance of the relocation officer and the local office of the USES.

TWO MORE ENLISTEES JOIN ALL-NISEI COMBAT TEAM

Two more local volunteers joined the all-misei combat team whon George Oura and Shigeru Sugaya arrived at Camp Shelby, Miss., last week.

They joined Chuji Mayewaki and Frank Seto who went into training the week before.

In a letter to friends, Sugaya said he has been assigned to Service Company, 442 Infantry.

Sugaya is a graduate of the Gressmont high school, Gressmont, Calif. Prior to evacuation, he was employed as a truck driver and did the same type of work throughout his stay in WCCA and WRA centers.

Oura is a graduate of the Lemoore high school, Lemoore, Calif, where he starred in athletics. He was a member of the lettermen's club there. He waked as a tractor driver before his entry into the assembly center. In both WCCA and WRA centers, he was employed as eloctrician.

No word has been received as to when the next local group of enlistees will leave for their physical examination, it was reported.

Food Production

The WRA food budget for the fiscal year 1944 has been approved by the Bureau of the Budget. The approved estimate is based upon the assumption that food costs will not exceed 45 cents per person per day, and that a total of approximately \$5,000.000 worth of food will be produced by the 10 centers for their own use and for shipment to other projects. In other words, funds will be available at the rate of 31 cents per day for the purchase of food.

It is estimated that Denson will produce during the year, food valued at \$326,250,\$306,300 worth to be consumed by the center and \$19,950 worth to be shipped to other centers.

The importance of Center food production cannot be overly stressed. If Denson's production falls substantially below their quote, the WRA will be unable to provide a ration of the quality and quantity now planned. Rationing has greatly reduced the amount of processed fruits and vegetables available to civilians. Fresh vegetables, though not rationed yet, are getting extremely difficult to obtain in variety. The only way to make up this deficit is for the evacuees to raise what is needed.

From a public relations standpoint, too, a successful food raising program is highly important. If agricultural land is held in idleness and full use is not made of evacuee labor and skills, public criticism will make it extremely difficult for the WRA officials to carry on the relocation program with any degree of success.

A great portion of the responsibility of supervisory work as well as actual operations must be borne by the evacuees this coming fiscal year since action by the Bureau has reduced the allotment of appointed personnel in the field of agricultural production and distribution to an average of six percenter.

Those who are unable to resettle have an important task here. We commend those who have already put hundreds of acres into productivity. We beg them to carry on if they remain here. Those in non-essential jobs should place community welfare above personal comfort and join the farm project. The mental and physical well being of the Center citizenry is largely dependent on proper diet. It would be folly to let ourselves down.

We understand that in Blook 19 there's a softball team, an oldsters'aggregation, which may give any other outfit a good run for its money.




