If it is right to persecute these Americans for a crime committed by the Japanese in Japan, then it would be as right to punish fellow-Americans of German descent for Nazi atrocities. (What numbers of our best citizens would be made to suffer then.)

Certainly, no decent man would stand for the persecution of Americans of German descent and no decent man can think of punishing Americans of Japanese descent for the crime of Japanese in Japan. They are fellow Americans.

Cincinnatians hope that Mr. Booth, the WRA relocation supervisor here, will continue to have the cooperation of the local citizons. There are quite a lot of decent people here.





"Wild" Lands Turned Into Rich Farms

Thanks to the undaunted efforts of our evacuee farmers, the once "wild" land in Deep Elm is today a land of immense agricultural enterprise.

Our "food basket" is located four miles east of the Center residential axea. Here agricultural products of many kinds---sweet corn, sweet octato, soybean, cabbage, cucumber, melons, carrot and other crops familar to us Californians are growing.

Simultaneously, new land is being cleared to make the Center's recently announced goal a reality.

Clearing a stumpladen land with dead trees is a difficult job but the progress made by these workers is amazing. Vegetable fields are level and hardly a stump may be seen. The work accomplished is evident with a glimpse of these farm lands green with vegetables. The farms are scattered throughout Deep Elm in sections of 60-to-100 acres each. Each section has about 20 workers, its tools and mules. The abandoned FSA homes and barns are being used.

Supplementing these vegetable fields is the hog farm. Almost 500 head are now being raised with new

shipments expected soon. The hogs are raised inexpensively since they are fed the Center's garbage.

Because of the efforts of our men in the agricultural project, the vegetable fields, the hog farm and the saw mill are a going enterprise.


