managers and councilmen Saturday morning in Dining Hall 23. In answer to rumors of this Center being closed in the near future Taylor said that as far as he knew, Denson's residents will remain here until they are resettled. He stressed the importance of the leaves program and

asked for the cooperation of the managers and councilmen in expediting this fourth WRA step. The necessity of limiting division workers was explained by the director. He asked the two groups' help in making adjustments. He (cont. on page 8)

SIX HUNDRED FACE TERMINATION

Full Use of Aliens in War Industries Urged

The full use of all aliens in the United States, irrespective of national origin or citizenship, in war plants was urged in a joint statement issued by the War, Navy and Justice departments and the Maritime Commission.

The announcement also shortens and simplifies the procedure whereby holders of government airplane and "classified" contracts may obtain permission for hiring aliens within two weeks or less.

"Even on aeronautical and classified contracts, if a qualified applicant whose services contractor needs is an alien whose loyalty to the United States, the contractor has no reason to doubt, the contractor is obligated to cooperate with the applicant in applying for consent to his employment," the joint statement said.

The statement, signed by Secretary of War Stimson, Attorney General Biddle, Secretary of Navy Knox and Maritime Commissioner Chairman Land, further stated that failure by a contractor to employ such an alien is a breach of the contract anti-discrimination clause and contrary to national policy.

Every evacuee must have an official identification photograph which includes his name before leaving the Center on a pass.

All Project Divisions Must Be Down to Limit by July 1

According to figures released by Project Director Paul A. Taylor, 599 Denson evacuee employees will be terminated from their present jobs by July 1 under the new worker limit ruling.

With its present maximum manpower requirements determined, each Project division is increasing or reducing its staffs in compliance with the national WRA policy applicable to all 10 relocation centers.

Each division has been ordered to start making its adjustments not later than today and to have its personnel trimmed down to the allowable figure by July 1.

For worker allotment figures see page 5. Residents who will be terminated were assured that there will be other jobs available for individuals who really want jobs. But the program will result in a situation where there will be but few more workers than there are jobs. Those being terminated (cont. on page 8)

regulation issued by Project Director Paul A. Taylor are persons with work passes, persons with indefinite leave passes who are actually going out on that leave and for emergency cases. Identification in emergency cases will be determined by the Internal Security section. Taylor explained that this regulation was made necessary because, in at least one instance, an evacuee who was eligible for a pass secured one in his name and let another evacuee who was ineligible use it to leave the Project. Those individuals were sent to jail, he said.

Pictures will be made free of charge in 36-8-F.

To avoid photographing persons ineligible for leave and to guard against duplication, no pictures will be made without a request from the Leaves office.

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PARENTS HAVE A

Great Responsibility

Conditions in the Center have been conducive to the increase to juvenile delinquency. This has come about through the combination of various ills caused by mass living.

One of the contributing factors has been the negligent relaxation of parental supervision over children during the past year. The effect of community dining halls, toilets and shower facilities has tended to accelerate the breakdown of family unity.

Prior to evacuation, obedience to parents was generally recognized, but a year in the centers has led to the deterioration of filial piety.

By now, a large percentage of the youngsters have come to accept the home as just a place to sleep and spend most of their time whiling away the hours in useless pursuits away from home.

The program of resettlement touches few families with children of school age and the majority of such families will probably remain in the Center for some time. And unless parents redouble their efforts in maintaining discipline, their children will be affected permanently.

If nothing else, time in the centers has been a testing period for parents. The most difficult handicaps have been unloaded on parents and many have buckled up under their increased responsibilities. Others have been able to stand up under the overwhelming conditions to lead their offspring successfully.

We congratulate those parents who have stood the test well.

HOSTEL PLAN WORKS

Obtaining employment through correspondence is at best a risky matter.

Opening of more hostels in the Midwest area should aid considerably in resettling hundreds of evacuees.

We had been told that mosquitoes would be the worst nuisance to Center residents during the summer months, but now we find that chiggers are outdistancing the mosquitoes in the degree of annoyance to us.

SPIRITUAL LIFE

A Necessity

One of the unfortunate results of the evacuation has been financial loss to the evacuees. Because of the uncertainty and confusion entailed in the mass exodus, hundreds of evacuees lost millions of dollars in selling property and agreeing to lease terms far below the recognized scales.

Many of them have seen the work of several decades--land which the issei had converted from waste land into fertile agricultural soil over a period of 20, 30 and 40 years--sold for a mere pittance. They were just getting to realize the fruits of their labor when the evacuation wiped away their hard-earned savings.

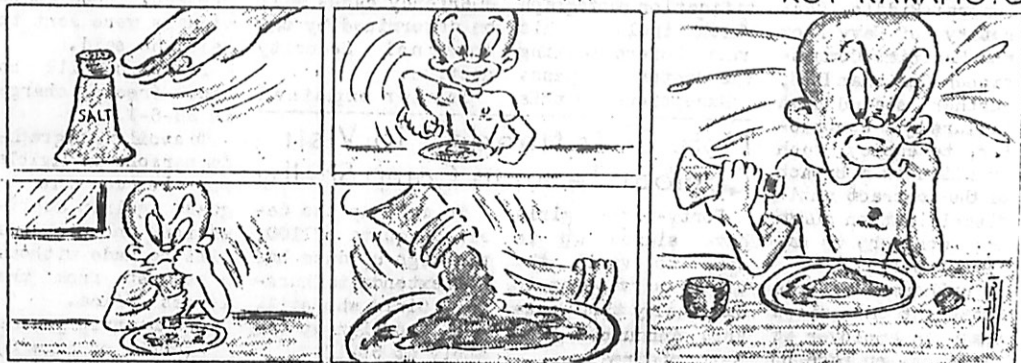
Those who had come to count on wealth as the sole goal of life discovered themselves drifting along without any solid anchor. They were lost and without hope for awhile until they were faced with the fact that material things alone did not encompass all of life.

Time in the centers gave them an opportunity to re-examine themselves and to make a re-evaluation of life. For the first time, many were forcibly confronted with the truth that material things did not govern

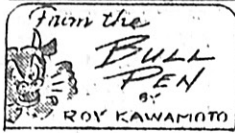

A membership drive is being conducted at the present time in order to obtain adequate financial support from the residents as well as make the Jerome Co-operative Enterprises a truly democratic membership organization.

Your purchase of a membership certificate entitles you to be a member of the Jerome Co-operative Enterprises. This gives you the privilege of voting on important issues affecting policy. It further entitles you to decide how the net savings of the organization are to be distributed.

As soon as the co-op is formally organized its control will be in the hands of the residents through the elected Board of Directors, Congress of Delegates, and Membership meetings. The highest control, however, is in the General Membership Meetings. Matt Niemi and Mauritz Erkkila, are gradually assuming a more or less advising function as the evacuee personnel gain in administrative efficiency.



Farm Labor Shortage Lowered by Evacuees

The total number of persons employed on farms on May first was 10,492,000, or about 304,000 less than on the first of May 1942, says a report from the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Employment of both family workers and hired workers was lower with hired workers down relatively much more than family workers. Compared with a year earlier, hired employment declined 153,000 to 2,244,000 persons employed on May 1, 1943, while family worker employment declined 151,000 to 8,248,000 persons employed on that date. The total number in farm work is about 3 percent less than a year ago.

All geographic divisions showed decrease in farm employment, except the Pacific coast states, where there was a 4 percent increase resulting from the employment of more family workers, and the New England states where a very slight increase was shown.

Probably the most surprising fact revealed in the farm labor figures from the Department of Agriculture is the increase shown in the Pacific coast states. This is largely accounted for by employment of a greater number of family workers.

The Department of Agriculture report recognizes the contribution to the farm labor supply of the country being made by evacuees from the relocation centers. Much of this labor, it is indicated, is in the sugar beet fields of the mountain states and farther south in the production of vegetables.

The need for experienced workers in ranch work continues to cause concern, the report states.

"My son went to school the last day of the semester when the pupils were having their final examinations. He took the examinations and pass-

ed in all subjects so was promoted to the 7th grade. We are enjoying the very healthful climate, the place being located on high elevation overlooking a beautiful river.

"Please convey my appreciation and a million thanks to all the block managers for the hearty and warm send off given me. I intended to write to them all but could not get around to it."

CENTER PREPARES FOR NEW EMPLOYEE RULING

New Nurses' Aid Classes Held Daily

Classes for advanced nurses' aid students began yesterday in the hospital classroom.

Classes are held from 2 to 3 p.m. Monday through Friday. Nurses' aids on the area who have been terminated from the Hospital may take this course and receive certificates issued by the state of Arkansas even though they are working elsewhere or taking other classwork.

Interested girls are asked to see Catherine Q. Lerner, chief nurse. A six weeks' training course is necessary for a certificate.

Some nurses' aids who have gone out have found it impossible to get positions in hospitals without some kind of certificate from the Center hospital. "Therefore, all the nurses' aids who have had experience in the hospital should be interested in taking this course and receive a certificate," said Miss Lerner.

TRIBUNE IS UNAFFECTED

The staff of the TRIBUNE will be unaffected by the new limit rule which becomes effective on July 1.

The TRIBUNE has but 11 members, which is probably the smallest number employed by any relocation paper.

Block Help To Face Cut

Evacuee workers employed in the blocks by the Housing department will be decreased by 99, according to figures released by Runo E. Arne, Community Services head.

By July 1, department employees in each block will be limited to one block manager, one block secretary, two janitors, two matrons, two firemen and one internal security officer.

Under the old arrangement, three janitors, three matrons and three firemen were employed.

The block yard men are employed by the Public Works division which has not made its breakdown yet.

not subject to penalty resulting from loss or damage if he has obtained in good faith, the permission of the government department involved before permitting an alien to have access to the work, plans or trial under aeronautical or classified contracts.

Major point of the alien employment policy stressed in the statement follows:

1. Full use should be made of all loyal and qualified workers irrespective of national origin and citizenship.

2. Contractors may employ aliens as freely as American citizens except on aeronautical or classified contracts.

3. Contractors may employ aliens on aeronautical and classified contracts if they obtain the written consent of the head of the government department concerned.

4. The anti-discrimination clause applies equally to citizens and non-citizens.

5. The anti-discrimination clause applies to work under aeronautical and classified contracts.

6. Procedure for securing permission

to employ an alien on aeronautical or classified contracts has been shortened so that the employer should now receive a decision on his request within less than two weeks.

7. An employer is not subject to any penalty, if, in good faith, he obtains the written consent of the Government department concerned before an alien is permitted to have access to the work under aeronautical or classified contracts.

8. The contractor's responsibility for plant security applies to all persons regardless of their citizenship.

nated who want to work were advised by administrators to apply immediately at the Employment office.

The plan to limit personnel was held necessary by Taylor for several reasons. "An overstaffed office inevitably makes for inefficiency," he said. "The general welfare of the Center obviously depends upon the local agricultural program which is originally hampered by a shortage of manpower," he pointed out. "As more people leave the Center it is necessary that the various sections operate with a maximum of efficiency and a minimum of manpower," Taylor explained.

The present number of employees allowed each division will not be permanent. As the population of the center decreases, the allotment will be reduced from time to time as conditions warrant.

Of the 10 Project divisions, four face substantial reductions of personnel, three will be increased and three will remain unchanged.

Facing cuts will be the Administrative Public Works, Mess and Community Services divisions. The Agriculture, Transportation and Industrial (to be created) division staffs will be increased. The Legal, Employment and Reports groups will be the same.

SOCIAL SECURITY CLAIMS

To interview and accept claims from evacuees of California who paid social security to the state of California and who wish to make claims for unemployment compensation, representatives of the United States Employment Service and the United States Social Security board will be in the Employment office June 21 through June 23.

These representatives would like to interview every person who paid social security in California and who has not received unemployment compensation benefits. Those concerned are asked to bring their social security cards

be completed before next winter.

Nine Arrested During Week

Nine local evacuees were arrested by Internal Security officers during the past week on charges of gambling, possession of liquor and illegal use of day passes.

Three men were apprehended on June 7 for bringing in liquor in quantities. They were turned over to the state courts for prosecution.

On the same day, a 19-year-old youth was arrested for lending his permit to leave to an ineligible person. He was sentenced by Project Director Paul A. Taylor

to a 30 day sentence, five of which he served in the Monticello jail and 25 days on parole.

In the first such case, five men were arrested Friday on gambling charges, four for gambling and one for permitting gambling in his house. The host was sentenced by the Project Director to 30 days, two days in the Monticello jail and 28 days on suspended sentence. 我々は此の問題を熟考すべしである。とウツノ初めは農業者部長は説明す。米國は建國以來始めて或種の食物が非常に缺乏して居ると言つても強ら過言では有らまい。初めは今後或種の食料を購買するのに相當苦心するであらう。其の上米國輿論は、所民の如く廣大

な土地を有し、農産物を生産する設備を持つて居る者に対し、農産物を賣却し既に食料のショートレージを告げて居る外部のコムマーシャルマーケットに負擔を加へる様な事を許さないてであらう。米國民衆は食料の緊迫せる状態をよく承解してゐる。そして公共心のある人や団体は出来ぬだけ自給自足すべく尽力して居る。農務省の発表によれば農業に従事する婦女子の数は未曾有である。又老齡者から小学女生徒まで一掃揃つて手傳つてゐる。

若し所民が一九四三年度農業者計畫に従ひ農産物生産を営まざれば今後食卓に上る食物は量質共に低下するであらう。

ウツノ氏は本年度米國內民衆の食料供給量の減少する理由を挙げた。
